#### 1.0 Introduction and Background

- 1.1 Application has been made by Joanne Burton for a premises licence which includes regulated entertainment, late night refreshment and the supply of alcohol on and off the premises.
- 1.2 The Operating Schedule, showing the proposed licensable activities and hours are appended at Annex 1. A map of the area showing the location of these premises is at Annex 2.

#### 2.0 General Points

- 2.1 Applicants for a premises licence are required, as part of the licensing procedure, to display a public notice which provides information to the public regarding the manner in which objection may be made. Similarly, public notice of the application should be published in a local newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the premises. These requirements appear to have been complied with. One public objection has been received which is appended at Annex 3.
- 2.2 The applicant is further required to give notice of the application to responsible authorities. The Police have made representations which are appended at Annex 4. Environmental Health have agreed a number of conditions with the applicant which are appended at Annex 5.
- 2.3 The Licensing Sub-Committee will be aware that it must carry out its functions under the 2003 Licensing Act to take steps which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Licensing objectives are:- the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance, and the protection of children from harm. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Sub-Committee must also have regard to its statement of licensing policy and the Guidance issued under the Act.
- 2.4 The four licensing objectives are the matters the Licensing Sub-Committee must address when considering whether to grant or refuse the application. Each application should be considered on its merits. Reasons must be given for any decision made by the Sub-Committee.
- 2.5 Where a premises licence is granted mandatory conditions will apply under Sections 19- 21 of the Act. These refer to irresponsible drinks promotions, provision of free tap water, an age verification policy, availability of small measures, the sale of alcohol below cost, and, designated premises supervisor.
- 2.6 The application should be determined within twenty working days beginning with the day after the end of the period during which representations may be made. Representations had to be made by the 24th May.

#### 3.0 Options

- 3.1 Grant the application with conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule accompanying the application and the times and conditions mentioned at paragraphs 2.2 and 2.5.
- 3.2 Exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.

- 3.3 Refuse the application.
- 3.4 Refuse to specify a person in the licence as the designated premises supervisor. The proposed designated premises supervisor is Joanne Burton.
- 3.5 Grant the application subject to different conditions in respect of different parts of the premises or different licensable activities.

ist here steps you will take to promote all four licensing objectives together.

have stated that i intend to be a family friendly bar restaurant and my premises are to be laid out accordingly i do not want o be a pub. We will have the suitable amount of staff for our needs all staff will receive training when everything is in place risk asesment will be carried out and staff given clear instructions what to do should an emergency occur. Fire extinguishers will be in both the kitchen and the restaurant area. There are doors to exit every side of the building. A lesignated disabled toilet complete with alarm if needed. There will be no gaming machines on the premises. CCTV will operate at all times for the safety of all customers and staff. We shall be operating a strict challenge 25 policy if no suitable ipproved ID can be shown then no drink will be sold also making sure no one else tries to purchase a drink for that person. As i am aware that parents do send their children off to get their own ice creams drinks etc they will be sold from he kiosk area no alcohol will be sold from there. There are no communal toilets to ensure no children will not be in them vith anyone other than their own appropriate adult. There will be no promotion of drinks that would encourage binge frinking. If someone is obviously very drunk then they will politely be refused any further service. Plastic glasses will be used for outside area to prevent any possible harm from breakages. As we are a restaurant we only have a limited amount of seating inside and outside when the seats are full we will have reached our capacity. There is outside lighting and all ustomers will be encouraged to leave quietly as we are a restaurant i can only assume that people leaving will be taggered as meals will finish and customers go at different times. I am placing rubbish bins outside that i will ensure are emptied regularly and will have any rubbish generated by my business removed regularly so as not to encourage vermin. All equipment will be tested regularly in the interests of safety. All used items will be removed swiftly to prevent any iccidents ocuring form breakages. All toilets will be cleaned and inspected regularly to ensure no mis use of drugs on the premises. I will be seeking advise from the local pub watch or equivilent. If I suspect any illegal activities are taking place he police will be called. (please see individual boxes below for further measures)

#### o) The prevention of crime and disorder

Ill staff are to receive training and instucted in conflict resolution. I know several of the local licensees in westgate so i shall be speaking with them in regard to the local pub watch scheme or similar. CCTV will operate at all times inside and out as it often proves to be a good detterant. We will operate on a strict challenge 25 policy. Anyone who appears very drunk will be politely refused any further service. A vigilant eye will be kept at all times and toilets checked regularly to ensure that here will be no misuse of drugs on the premises. Staff will be instructed that if they think something is amiss then they hould contact the police. Tables will be cleared of any used glasses bottles cutlery and crockery as they are finished with as hey have the potential to be quite nasty weapons. There will be outside lighting. The building will have secure metal hutters to be used when we are closed to prevent both burglary and damage. Litter bins will be provide and emptied egularly.

#### :) Public safety

we have a ramp to enable easy access for the disabled. there is a designated disabled toilet equipt with a the nesescary emergency alarm and fitted hand rails. A fixed and stable baby changing unit, we have 6 doors to exit the premises in case of emergency. CCTV will operate at all times both inside and outside for the safety of both staff and customers, plastic plasses will used for drinks consumed in the outside patio area where possible so as to minimise the risk from broken glass is we are near to the beach. There are outside lights. Anyone who appears too drunk will be politely refused any further ervice. Tables will be cleared of used items to prevent the risk of breakages and possible harm if broken. Appliances will be ested regularly in the interests of safety. Fire extinguishers will be in both the kitchen and dining areas for easy access hould the need arise. Staff training will be ongoing and reviewed regularly to ensure all objectives are being met. As the outside patio is a raised area barriers will surround that area to prevent harm and also to separate it from the promenade.

here will be lights outside and CCTV operating at all times obviously customers will be encouraged to leave quietly and quickly. Main doors can be closed if nessecary to minimise noise later in the evenings. I will be placing several bins which i

vill ensure are regularly emptied so the will be no nuisance from additional refuse in the area. I will also ensure that any efuse generated by us will be removed regularly so as not to encourage vermin. As we are a restaurant customers will be eaving at different times when they have finished eating so departures will be staggered. This will not go on late into the right. As we are on the promenade there are several nearby places to park that would cause no disturbance to local esidents. Many of the local residents have taken a great interest in what we are doing and looking forward to joining us for I drink and a meal, and have remarked that the building looks great as it had gone into a state of disrepair and that a place ike ours is needed there. I will constantly canvass the opinions of the neighbours it will always be in my best interest to ensure that we are not causing a nuisance and that we are an asset to their area. Taxis will have to be used at times i am sure out leaving will be staggered so i do not for see any problems with traffic. The building has been insulated for comfort ourposes also it minimises sound. There are outside lights that are positioned not to affect neighbours. The premises has previously been a licensed premises the previous licensee surrendered the license when he left the business. I do not think i vill be the kind of premises that will be in danger of any violence taking place we are not a pub or club, The combined numbers of both the inside seating and outside seating i think will not exceed around 80 obviously during the summer nonths we will be busier as people will be outside but it is a busy place during the summer months its next to the beach. During winter obviously my customers will be far less as weather will not permit seating outside and doors will be closed ilso due to the weather.

#### 2) The protection of children from harm

Ve have a take away kiosk to the side of the building for ice cream food soft drinks as i am aware that children are often ent off to get themselves something no alcohol will be served from there. We will operate a strict challenge 25 policy no approved ID no drink. And to make sure no adults are buying drinks for children. Any 16 or 17 year olds eating a meal with adults will only be served 1 small beer cider or wine after the parent has been challenged as to age a record will be kept of his. There are no communal toilets so if using the facilitys no child should be in there with anyone other than their appropriate adult known to them. Safe baby changing facilitys have been provided within the designated disabled toilet. No gaming machines will be on the premises. Toilets will be cleaned and checked regularly to ensure there is no misuse of trugs ocurring within them premises. Children will not be exposed to anything of an adult or sexual nature. All used items vill be cleared swiftly to remove risk of breakages and harm. CCTV will operate at all times. Staff will receive ongoing raining and will be expected to keep a vigilant eye to ensure the safety of children. As we wish to be a family friendly estaurant, in my own experience when dining out with my children i ate during the early part of the evening and got them some to bed by 8.30 this would be the practice i would like to encourage with my customers. Night times are for adults. Siven my location we will very much be a cafe bar during the day i suppose but intend to provide additions to the menu of n evening which will be more restaurant type food this in the main will enable us to open all year round it would be i relieve less likely that anywhere near as many children will frequent the premises during the winter months.



I wish to lodge a formal objection in respect of the premises licence application made by Miss Joanne Burton for Millie's Beach Bar at Westbrook Promenade, Westgate on Sea, CT8 8FF.

I have recently retired and bought a flat overlooking the premises some 8 months ago. Before completing my purchase the local searches, carried out by my solicitor, had no details of any new proposals in the area and that even the local public house was being converted into residential apartments.

It would appear from the details within the application that it is proposed to be open until at least 11 pm for up to 7 days per week and although I welcome the refurbishment of an empty property I did not envisage it would be used as anything other than a daytime beach bar. Although I have no knowledge of exactly what the applicant is proposing regarding opening hours or entertainment I am concerned that the granting of permission without any restrictions or limits could cause high levels of noise and public nuisance.

I have no particular objection to the selling of alcohol other than it being sold "off the premises"

Despite the notice being displayed on the premises only stating it relates to the sale of alcohol the application however, I believe, also includes details regarding the playing of music both recorded and live and amplified and non amplified.

Without knowing the applicants actual proposals it is difficult to voice a specific complaint but in my opinion there should be strict controls imposed initially regarding the frequency, the times and the volume. The property has opening bi-fold doors to the front and an outside patio area which when being used for music could cause a real noise nuisance without some sort of control or limit being required.

The premises is located at the end of a solely residential street with the potential for disturbance and public nuisance without conditions and restrictions being in place in advance of them opening for business.

I would be obliged for confirmation that an objection by e-Mail is acceptable or whether I need to submit it in writing to the Council offices.

This application is not being supported by the Police.

The issue that the Police have is the application is very open to interpretation. Unclear on the nature of the business and if the appropriate planning consent exists.

The Police still have some questions regarding the application. As within the application it states they do not wish to be a bar. Then ask for late hours and extensions for all Bank Holidays, Christmas and New Year's Eve. All of these are consistent with bars and late night drinking establishments. Again this is supported by asking for Regulated entertainment to 30 minutes after you have stopped selling alcohol.

Due to the location the Police would like further clarification on the outside area. Is this area going to be roped off? Clear signage would be required and that no alcohol is allowed to leave this area. Alcohol is not wanted to be allowed to be taken off the premises so that it can be freely drunk on the beach.

Due to location and time of season I would suggest that no person under the age of 18 consumes alcohol even if it was purchased with food by an adult.

Due to conflicting differences in application the Police at this time cannot support this application. The concerns are about the nature of the business, hours, and key extension dates.

As a result of the unclear direction of this premises the Police feel the information cannot support the licensing objectives and therefore do not support this application.

#### 1.0 Introduction and Background

- 1.1 Application has been made by Angela's of Margate Ltd for a premises licence which includes regulated entertainment, late night refreshment and the supply of alcohol on and off the premises.
- 1.2 The Operating Schedule, showing the proposed licensable activities and hours are appended at Annex 1. A map of the area showing the location of these premises is at Annex 2.

#### 2.0 General Points

- 2.1 Applicants for a premises licence are required, as part of the licensing procedure, to display a public notice which provides information to the public regarding the manner in which objection may be made. Similarly, public notice of the application should be published in a local newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the premises. These requirements appear to have been complied with. Four public objections have been received which are appended at Annex 3.
- 2.2 The applicant is further required to give notice of the application to responsible authorities. The Police and Environmental Health have agreed a number of conditions with the applicant which are appended at Annex's 4 and 5.
- 2.3 The Licensing Sub-Committee will be aware that it must carry out its functions under the 2003 Licensing Act to take steps which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Licensing objectives are:- the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance, and the protection of children from harm. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Sub-Committee must also have regard to its statement of licensing policy and the Guidance issued under the Act.
- 2.4 The four licensing objectives are the matters the Licensing Sub-Committee must address when considering whether to grant or refuse the application. Each application should be considered on its merits. Reasons must be given for any decision made by the Sub-Committee.
- 2.5 Where a premises licence is granted mandatory conditions will apply under Sections 19- 21 of the Act. These refer to irresponsible drinks promotions, provision of free tap water, an age verification policy, availability of small measures, the sale of alcohol below cost, and, designated premises supervisor.
- 2.6 The application should be determined within twenty working days beginning with the day after the end of the period during which representations may be made. Representations had to be made by the 24th May.

#### 3.0 Options

- 3.1 Grant the application with conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule accompanying the application and the times and conditions mentioned at paragraphs 2.2 and 2.5.
- 3.2 Exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
- 3.3 Refuse the application.

- 3.4 Refuse to specify a person in the licence as the designated premises supervisor. The proposed designated premises supervisor is Victoria Hazell.
- 3.5 Grant the application subject to different conditions in respect of different parts of the premises or different licensable activities.



Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the following documents (which do not need to be certified).

## Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport
  as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.

**Dear Sirs** 

<u>I wish to lodge an objection</u> to yet another alcohol and music licence in the immediate vicinity of our residential homes on The Parade and the Old Town Margate; in particular, for this location, on the following grounds:

#### 1) Prevention of Crime and Disorder

We have more than enough alcohol fuelled aggression in the Old Town of Margate, and particularly within the Parade and Marine Drive areas whereby too many places are now licensed to sell alcohol and are unable to contain the drunkenness, the urinating in the streets and the loud aggressive behaviour as a result of so many places have all day and all night licensing's to dispense alcohol to whomever they deem fit.

Several locations that applied for licensing under guise of a restaurant or food establishment, are now serving alcohol as their main supply and food as a secondary source of income, which is contributing to an imbalance in the area whereby too many places are now allowed to sell

With the rapidly expanding number if Micropubs and larger pubs as well, the area is quickly becoming a place for drinking; and the local residence must deal with the aftermath of alcohol abuse

Licences awarded to a number of places within our (The Parade/Old Town) residential area are being abused, and bars are turning into late night Night clubs, and the licensing hours are being pushed to the limited... residents no longer feel safe and the ongoing noise and

aggressive behaviour on the public paths and streets has a huge and detrimental effect on us residence.

## 2) Public Safety

The location of Angelas café (ground floor) has several health & safety concerns; these include

- single gazed windows whereby the sound of all day and late night music is impossible to contain
- inventible tables and chairs will be placed on the pavement immediately outside the 'restaurant' on The Parade which makes it very difficult to walk along the public pavement, especially when disabled. Currently, Café G closed up at around 5/6 PM and their 'obstacles' are put away... with a late-night music and drinking licence the pavements outside of our residential homes will continue to be obstructed by furniture and people hanging around the area making it dangerous to walk along
- passive smoking is now a huge problem in the Old Town and Parade area, so many alcohol and music licences have been granted that the pavements and streets are littered on a more permanent basis with smokers (as they not allowed to smoke inside) and this has a direct bearing on residence health as we live in the properties all year round... not popping out for a social event and then leaving the area!
- Fire escape: Angels is not designed for all day & night drinking with only one exit which is the same as the entrance door, and indeed a door shared by the common entrance the flat upstairs... this would pose a very serious fire hazard with an establishment full of people drinking and no-where to escape to

## 3) Trading Standards

- There is only ONE toilet which is in the rear courtyard which is not compliant with a restaurant that should cater for male, female and disabled toilet facilities... and health standard in term of hygiene and cleanliness
- The licensing hours are unreasonable and far too long for a property that is adjacent to residential homes surrounding the location... there is no other location between No 19 and 22 The Parade that is licensed for such long hours as mainly these are now residential properties and not commercial
- Angela's has always been an unlicensed CAFÉ for the past 60 years or so and it not built or geared up to be a licensed restaurant, with families living above the café and next door and alongside
- Punters will no doubt be crammed into the very small courtyard at the rear of Angela's
  for their smoking (outside) and toilet facilities and will caused yet more noise and
  passive smoking for all hours of the day AND NIGHT, all days if the week; and should a
  fire arise under these circumstances there is no chance at all of safe and proper escape.

I trust this objection is taken up in a serious light as local residences also need some peace and quiet at times.

**Dear Sirs** 

I noticed on the window of Angela's CAFÉ that an application for a combination of a Drinks and Music licence has been applied for by a Mr Lee Paul Coad in relation to the premises known as "Angel's Café" No 21 The Parade, Margate CT9 1EX – ground floor area.

It is only by accident that I happened to notice this application and shocked that the immediate Neighbours are not officially notified in any way of such an application as the notice placed in Angela's window is low down and not in normal eyesight and no doubt done on purposes so that no-one objects!

As I have a property in the immediate vicinity I wish to object to this application as it just serves to fuel the fire of an almighty problem that is omnipresent and daily, as a direct result of the now far too many alcohol and music licences within the residential area that we live in, cheek by jowl with commercial premises...

Firstly, this application does not seem to state clearly whether this is a restaurant-ONLY based licensing and music application or a general Licence that could apply to bar and other drink/music related activities were Food is not necessarily required to be served with alcohol?

I, and 100% of all the other residences in the immediate area (those that have basic and normal living standards) cannot bear much more urinating in the streets and alleyways, vomit on our front doors and footpaths, noise and shouting across the streets and many more aspects of appalling and anti-social behaviour that is caused as direct result of now too many places (be that clubs and/or restaurants) have the ability to sell alcohol on an all day and all night drinking licence. Moreover, the premises that have these licences are mostly ill equipped for the 'parties' that descend on them as they do not have adequate toilet facilities, safety features and security when things get out of hand, and have little to zero control when it comes to their clientele leaving the premises and using the

public places for urinating, shouting and being a general nuisance having fuelled up on alcohol within the premises adjacent to homes and residential flats.

This is aside from the fact that there are less and less Policing of our streets, and little to no CCTV and thus the culprits are never contained and the situation never changes; leaving the residence to deal with the fall out whilst the restaurant, bar and club owners pack up and go home for a peaceful night sleep having made a handsome profit from selling copious quantities of alcohol supported by music (that starts off at acceptable noise levels but rapidly becomes totally unacceptable, then too late to contain) ... always at the residence expense in terms of vastly reduced quality of home life!

I wish to include an extract from the residence of No. High Street that are so exasperated by the hours of licencing provided to the Imperil Bar (note that is started life as a hubble bubble hookah lounge and is now in no uncertain terms a late night Night Club)... which is typical of the licensing applications of late: The Licensee states they intend be quiet restaurants with an image of a few bottles of wine sold to accompanying food, when actually the ability to run a commercial restaurant in an area where the competition for food and drink is already at an all-time high (36 in total in the immediate area) is shared by the relatively few dinners, that then results in food being placed on the backburner and the mainstay for the premises turns into a better income stream by selling alcohol all day and night for whoever wishes to drink with or without eating on the premises.

Quote: [Issue not solely noise but the threatening effects of all day/night drinking licences]

"Imperial Bar had the 3 am licence from Rokka and it was just transferred. So it stays noisy until 4 am ish with drunks screaming and shouting but I expect your bedrooms are at the back unlike our building. The Imperial bar has no sound proofing and to sound proof our flats is roughly £1500 per window as we can not have double glazing due to it being a listed building.

and I usually find our front door covered in urine on Saturdays and Sundays, a few weekends ago 4 men urinated against the Imperial Bar wall, and I were awoken with people from the flats above the Imperial Bar screaming at the men to stop.

Every weekend there are domestic issues, people screaming at each other, being aggressive and sometimes erupting into violent acts and usually very drunk.

I think TDC should spend a month of weekends in the old town at this time and in the Summer, living here to see what it's like. Because I am not doing justice to what it's like.

Our airbnb guests have commented on how 'edgy' it is, they have asked us to warn guests of the drunks and noise. It's not a place for families after 8 pm.

I am afraid I have lost faith completely in the system.



#### 1) Protection of Children

Children and family and friends use the garden room at the rear of Nor High Street (that shares a party wall with 21 The Parade) and with a drinking licence the clientele will have to use the rear toilet in their courtyard which is immediately against our building;

Smokers will be standing outside in the courtyard all day & night (as it's the only outside space for the café) whilst the licencing hours are valid, causing ill health and stress to the children through ongoing passive smoking, coupled no doubt with disruptive behaviour and noise/singing to the music in an extremely confined space (small courtyard and outbuilding) directly and constantly interrupting the lives of the residence of the 4 flats at no 19 The Parade, the Residential House of 20 The Parade, the Residential section of No 5 High Street and indeed the 3 flats at No 1 High Street ... all interlocking to the location referred to as 21 The Parade.

#### 2) Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Already too many places are now licensed to sell alcohol (and mostly with permission for all day and night licences) and the Police and Council are unable to contain the rowdiness, drunkenness, the urinating (on your doors, fences, pavements etc.) let alone the aggressive behaviour when we try to calm things down to get a decent night's sleep or watch or entertain children, family & friends in a residential environment.

Licences awarded to a number of places within the very neighbourhood of this premises (The Parade/Old Town) regularly push the boat out and churn up the volume of music, sell alcohol and thereafter stay open hours after the expiry of the licence and the Police and Council seem unable to rectify this situation... pushing the residence to breaking point; we are now surrounding by drinking establishment (aside from cheap off the shelf drink available at Corner shops to add further flames to the fire).

As a woman, I feel totally vulnerable and unsafe to walk the street of the Old Town now, as mostly people are pouring out of establishments fuelled with alcohol – why can't we work towards a more balanced community and allow for CAFE's and Delicatessens and/or eating establishments Without the need to sell yet more alcohol on the premises that is directly adjoined to residential properties?

#### 3) Public Safety

We are mainly living in Grade 2 Listed buildings in this area and we all (including premises licensed and unlicensed) have single glazed windows and none of the properties have been built with modern day sound proofing and insulation... loud sounds AND SMELLS travel readily between the properties and a combination of alcohol and music contributes 100% to increases in sound/noise emanating from a licensed premise.

Clientele and hangers on stand outside the <u>entrances</u> to licensed premises, smoking or drinking in the street having purchased alcohol on the premises, and this makes for a frightening situation at times when you walk home, either alone or with children... the

Council needs to desperately look at ways to curtail this street crowds on premises entrances and one way is to curtail the handing out of Drinking and Music licences like sweets and on the back of broken promises by the Licensees, PLEASE!

#### 4) Trading Standards

- The licensing of alcohol and music for such a small commercial area that has a questionable toilets, extraction and fire safety environment is totally unreasonable for adjoining residential properties, and this location has always been an unlicensed café which is more in line with living cheek by jowl with residence in a confined space.

I am all for the regeneration of Margate and the Parade area but we need a happy community and a balanced environment to prevent this 'strip from becoming an alcoholics paradise (e.g. Ibiza) or worst still.... Which will result in a <u>turn off</u> for the very people and visitors the Council (and other businesses) are trying to encourage to the Cultural attraction Margate has to offer and its investment in the Turner Gallery, local Museums, and Dreamland et al.

We need the Council and its respective departments and Officers to listen to us after all we have helped with and supported the regeneration of Margate and play our part as well as the businesses.

I trust this objection is taken up in a serious light as local residences also need some peace and quiet at times. This (Angela's) Café has for over 60's been a greasy spoon café and has no history since its inception of being allowed/licensed to sell alcohol and music on the commercial aspects of the premises, thereby directly affecting the lives of all the surrounding residence.

**Dear Sirs** 

An application for a day & night Drinks (Alcohol) and Music Licence has been put forward to the Local Council Authorities by Mr Lee Paul Coad for the abovementioned premises that has been a day-time only café for the past 60 years or so, being sandwiched between residential houses and flats. The location Mr Coad is applying to operate from is "Angel's Café" of 21 The Parade, Margate CT9 1EX.

This is a part ground floor commercial premises that is currently undergoing access alterations to share the ingress/egress of the upper flats and the ground floor commercial area... a most unsuitable alteration for a licensed premises.

Consideration needs to be given to the suitability of the location and the premises, the nuisance and disruption to the neighbouring properties (residence/homes) as well as the unsuspecting public residing in the flats immediately above the commercial premises (this might be long term tenant or indeed short term holiday lets); and the overall health & safety of both the neighbours and the visiting public (clientele).

Local Authorities have been able to grant such licences in the area as there has been little resistance to date (and less residence but now Margate has become a popular location to set up home) and many residence are now suffering the consequences of not 'speaking up' in good time before.

It's not easy to spot a small window notice which is the only way the neighbours are drawn to the attention of a new licensing application - why are letters not sent to the immediate neighbours or notices put on lamp posts for all to read?? In the Old Town of Margate alone, there are nigh on 36 licensed establishments, either cheek by jowl or a short walking distance between. Quite a number of these have turned out to be wholly unsuitable for operating as a licensed premises, be that through excess on the clientele behalf or licensees pushing their licensing limits without any regards at all to the surrounding neighbours;

This results in excess drinking and unbearable music volume causing huge disruption to normal family life... and complaints by residential neighbours is proving to be a huge trial and tribulation to get anything done or a control measures put in place... difficult for the authorities and nigh impossible for the legitimate complainer as there are simply too many mountains to climb.

To this end, it is imperative that the Council does take stock and does listen more carefully to the needs of the residence in these areas and looks to support a more balanced close-knit community, and a balanced provision of services for the commercial areas so that it leads to a balanced life for both business and resident... after all, it's the residence that are at home all the time and cannot shut up and leave to 'get away' and it's the residence that have to face the ugly results of excessive drinking or indeed music permeating their homes for hours on end; and the spill-out in the streets, and urinating/sick on the front doors, pavements alleyways and other public access paths that the residence have to use on a daily basis.

## Overview - Applicant and Organisation

The applicant. Lee Paul Coad has very recently (Nov '16) registered a company called Angela's of Margate Ltd. (Companies House No: 10457804) and classifying its operations as "Licensed Restaurants"... but as yet the company and its shareholders (of which Mr Coad is one) are not trading nor is there any record of trading in operating or running restaurants (licensed or unlicensed). It seems to me that they have assumed the licence is pre granted is that a possibility? As a number of people have already been told by Ms Wood that a licensed restaurant will operate from Angela's Café ?? How is that possible??

However, there appears to be no commercial lease lodged at Land Registry for the operation of a restaurant under Mr Coad to take place at 21 The Parade CT9 1EX, only the Freeholders (Ms Jessica Woods and Mr James Roe) are listed as the freehold owners of the commercial aspect (Angela's Café) and accommodation above.


Is it, therefore, possible for a licence to be granted carte blanche to a person that is using an address that perhaps he/she does not currently hold any legal right to operate from; and how can a licensed restaurant operate within the premises if there is no long term commercial lease in place prior to the Authorities granting a licence... or perhaps there is and it is not yet disclosed?

## Overview - The Premises


The location of Angela's café is not conducive to a licensed restaurant or indeed selling alcohol and operating music to unspecified levels for a number of reasons and concerns, these being summarised as follows:

The entrance and exit is very tightly adjoined (in fact shared) with the residential accommodation entrance which could be used by children as well; there is no disabled access and there is clearly not enough space to evacuate the premises quick enough in the event of an emergency or a fire etc. as there is no rear escape route; illustrated as follows:



otally enclosed rear courtyard with no escape route in emergencies from the commercial area; noise an toilet flushing by the public is compounded to all residential properties within a deep, small enclosed courtyard. A licensed premises will further enhance this discomfort to others.




Enclosed courtyard with outside toilet which is not conducive to public gatherings all day & night, drinking at the premises, and smoking in a tiny courtyard... giving off unhealthty passive smoking and noise to all the surrounding residence as the only way is UP (for the noise, smell and smoke) from an enclosed courtyard surrounded by residential homes.



All these residential homes that immediately surround 21 the Parade that would be affected by drinking, smoking and noise all day/night as none of these actions can be adequately controlled, despite promises given!


This is not taking into account No 5 High street that adjoins the rear of the courtyard to No 21 The Parade that has 3 floors of residential accommodation above.



This is what the Parade (No's 19-22) currently look like after 6pm; with all-day & night options for serving drink and food chairs will be outside to cater for smokers, lights on, music on, people hanging around outside and thereafter, once the 'restaurant' closes the serving of alcohol for the day, the urinating against the residence doors and walls begins.


This particular side of the Parade should remain as peaceful and clear as possible after a hectic day time trading hours from the ample bars and restaurants along the Parade area and the Old Town.

The courtyard of 21 Parade abuts the large wooden shed/studio (No 5) where children will be playing and in danger of passive smoking during the licensing hours when the smokers outside or licensed music pipe to the outside or extension areas... aside from the increased fire risk! With No Escape!!



## Rubbish etc.

All establishments offering eating & drinking that are open for long hours have proper rubbish handling <u>and rear exits etc.</u> to carefully getting rid of empty bottles and rubbish from all day eating, *how would this be handled* – in the front of the property on the street? or collecting in the enclosed rear courtyard which enhances noise and smells affecting all the residence?

Bins were originally kept in the courtyard behind a door, now its converted to a toilet and a large plate glass window next to the toilet as part of a small extension... how can this be safe?

## **Grade 2 LISTED**

All our buildings are in the main single glazed and no modern day sound proofing therefore noise (music, loud talking etc.) carries through these buildings and all day & night music already drives people mad from a residential neighbours, let alone an licensed establishment that has permission to play music over and over again.. through NO sound proofing and

SINGLE glazed windows: all these Grade 2 properties can only be single glazed and NOT conducive to music at such levels to be heard by gathering of crowds.

Everyone would suffer as the sound WILL definitely carry through the building and affect all homes along the entire road.

#### Margate Regeneration

We all support the regeneration of Margate but now there are so many comments of *Trip Advisor* warning of the edgy side and the fact that the Old Town and Parade area is NOT recommended for families (with children)...

... The Old Town and Parade should not be an area of licensed premises only – there are already far too many (36 at last count within staggering distance of each other). This is a happy, relaxed, enjoy yourself area and needs the encouragement of families and a break from drinking with eating for a more balanced community offering and spirit.

Already we have Woody's Café G, Milos, Cinnamon along the Parade, but these have rear or second entrances and separate toilet facilities that can handle the collation and noise from bottles etc. for clearing up and cleaning up with lesser impact on residence trying the enjoy the peace of their home or even sleep.

Not everyone comes to Margate to drink; it's also about cultural, art, Dreamland etc. which clearly caters for families... walking on the beach, fish & chips and antiques shopping; too many drinking places means the residence have to clear up and disinfect the urination and vomit on our floors... this easy to gain licence policy the council(s) are adopting is slowly turning the area into an Isle of booze.

Guised as a "licensed restaurant" (and there is no proof the applicant for the licence can even run a restaurant) as soon as a licence is granted the music and drinking will start and then we have another establishment for late drinking; a far cry from a family sea side location.

The active premises in estimated apprx 35m2... which is not sufficient to run a true restaurant but more a bar or lounge bar offering café style food... and once the selling of food no longer pays for itself, drink will be the main supply line.

There are more than enough pubs, bars and drinking establishment with eating to cater for people on all budgets... there is not enough people in Margate to SUSTAIN another licenced restaurant that is wedged within a residential area; that's why Bentleys closed and the Primark is struggling to find restaurant tenants... and with the new restaurants opening up at the sea front by Dreamland (promoted by TDC) there will be more eating elsewhere but more drinking in the Parade area. Oh yes, and then the Old Cottage is to open as a massive brewery with large restaurant - Policing will be at further stretching point with ineffectual protection of both the public and local residence going about their daily living.

We have human rights as well; it's not just Booze Rights... we really all need to learn from the other towns around here (Broadstairs etc.) all suffer from too many licensed establishments – needs to be contained and curtailed around the Parade and Old Town of Margate.

### 1) Protection of Children

21 The Parade and the location for Angela's Licensed restaurants is inter-locked both front and rear with residential homes that house families and long term residence, rather than holiday lets.

Serious consideration is required to protect children (aside from adults) from the effects of licensed establishments check by jowl with people's homes, from rowdiness, anti-social behaviour, passive smoking, and urinating in the streets, to say the least!

\*\* A licence for this particular premises (location, size, layout & structure) would in addition be detrimental to the welfare of families (living locally or checking in to air B&B/ holiday lets), be that walking along the street having to avoid tables, chairs, gatherings outside and unpredictable anti-social behaviour that licensed premises attracts.

## 2) Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The Police readily agree that they are at stretching point when it comes to anti-social behaviour in the Margate and Old Town area at knife point times... and this is through inexperienced applicants for alcohol and music licences that have no recorded ability in running a licensed establishment with controls and considerations.

Licensees regularly ignore the discomfort of their neighbours and residence and use their licences to the extreme in terms of all the hours possible and the highest volume possible, with no responsibility to clear and clean up the surrounding streets after closing hours.

\*\* Additional drinking establishments exacerbate the extreme problems that residence already suffer... and Police struggle to cope with.

families and visitors and locals need to come to the Parade area for OTHER reasons beyond drinking with eating; tea rooms, cafes, delicatessens etc. would all help break the cycle of excessive drinking and excessive disturbance already felt by most residence in the immediate area.

## 3) Public Safety

This is covered in details above with regards Fire escape, Health & Safety, Passive smoking, nuisance, noise....

\*\* Already walking along the pavement is n fact walking along the road, prams, mobility scooters, pedestrians etc. are forced into the road all along the Parade area... and it's a busy junction for cars, vans, delivery trucks etc and there is NO SAFE delivery of suppliers and goods for a licensed establishment outside of No 21 The Paradel

## 4) Trading Standards

Do these premises meet the required standard for Trading as a licenced establishment; and should this not be inspected and met prior to any licence consideration?

## In Closing

The irony of the application based from 21 The Parade is the Ms Woods, the co-owner of 21 The Parade, was the first to complain about the application for Woody's restaurant licence some 2 years ago as she claimed that her residential home would be unduly disturbed by noise from a licensed premises... now the same person from the same premises has no concern whatsoever about all the other residence in the area (... and there are a lot more private permanent residence in Margate Old Town as it becomes popular have a home).

We need the Council, the Police, Fire Brigade, Environment and Community Services to better understand the stresses and strains the LOCAL residence of The Parade area are facing, day after day; not just see the bright lights and carefree sundowners on the Parade/Piazza as the answer... most of these licenced premises is the start of issues that arise and left for the residence in situ to deal with!

A finer balance is therefore a better solution going forward in The Local Plan for the area.

The application for a licence to sell alcohol with or without food, coupled with a music licence is unwelcomed, unhealthy and unsupported for reasons of health, safety and security... the moreover, on this occasion, is totally unsuitable.

It must be rejected; to is end, your consideration to this valid objection and representation is greatly appreciated.



  - 1) The Parade, Margate, the sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment on the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> August between 10 a.m and 7.30 p.m.,
  - 2) The Piazza, Margate, the sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment on the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> August between 10 a.m and 7.30 p.m.,
  - 3) Duke Street, Margate, the sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment on the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> August between 10 a.m and 8 p.m.,
  - 4) Fort Hill, Margate, the sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment on the 5th and 6<sup>th</sup> August between 12 noon and 7.30 p.m.,
  - 5) King Street, Margate, the sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment on the 6<sup>th</sup> August between 12 noon and 7.30 p.m.

In each case the maximum number of people to be present will be 499. The applicant is the holder of a personal licence.

1.2 Part 5 of the 2003 Licensing Act provides a system of permitted temporary activities, under which licensable activities can be carried out on a temporary basis (for a period not exceeding 7 days) without the need for a premises licence or a club premises certificate. Copies of the notices are appended at Annex 1.

#### 2.0 General Points

- 2.1 The Act provides for periods of notice and the number of events that may be held. Notice must be given to the Licensing Authority, Police and Environmental Protection ten working days before the beginning of the event period. The Police and Environmental Protection then have three working days to lodge objections with the Licensing Authority and applicant. Copies of the Police objections are appended at Annex 2. Environmental Protection are making no representations having agreed a number of matters with the applicant.
- 2.2 Objections must relate to the undermining of the licensing objectives, the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance, the protection of children from harm.

Your Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPI) are those interests that are, or should be, listed on your Register of Interest Form.

If you are at a meeting and the subject relating to one of your DPIs is to be discussed, in so far as you are aware of the DPI, you <u>must</u> declare the existence **and** explain the nature of the DPI during the declarations of interest agenda item, at the commencement of the item under discussion, or when the interest has become apparent

Once you have declared that you have a DPI (unless you have been granted a dispensation by the Standards Committee or the Monitoring Officer, for which you will have applied to the Monitoring Officer prior to the meeting) you **must:-**

- 1. Not speak or vote on the matter;
- 2. Withdraw from the meeting room during the consideration of the matter;
- 3. Not seek to improperly influence the decision on the matter.

#### Do I have a significant interest and if so what action should I take?

A significant interest is an interest (other than a DPI or an interest in an Authority Function) which:

- Affects the financial position of yourself and/or an associated person; or Relates to the determination of your application for any approval, consent, licence, permission or registration made by, or on your behalf of, you and/or an associated person;
- 2. And which, in either case, a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably regard as being so significant that it is likely to prejudice your judgment of the public interest.

An associated person is defined as:

- A family member or any other person with whom you have a close association, including your spouse, civil partner, or somebody with whom you are living as a husband or wife, or as if you are civil partners; or
- Any person or body who employs or has appointed such persons, any firm in which they
  are a partner, or any company of which they are directors; or
- Any person or body in whom such persons have a beneficial interest in a class of securities exceeding the nominal value of £25,000;
- Any body of which you are in a position of general control or management and to which you are appointed or nominated by the Authority; or
- any body in respect of which you are in a position of general control or management and which:
  - exercises functions of a public nature; or
  - is directed to charitable purposes; or
  - has as its principal purpose or one of its principal purposes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union)

An Authority Function is defined as: -

- Housing where you are a tenant of the Council provided that those functions do not relate particularly to your tenancy or lease; or
- Any allowance, payment or indemnity given to members of the Council;
- Any ceremonial honour given to members of the Council
- Setting the Council Tax or a precept under the Local Government Finance Act 1992

If you are at a meeting and you think that you have a significant interest then you <u>must</u> declare the existence **and** nature of the significant interest at the commencement of the

matter, or when the interest has become apparent, or the declarations of interest agenda item.

Once you have declared that you have a significant interest (unless you have been granted a dispensation by the Standards Committee or the Monitoring Officer, for which you will have applied to the Monitoring Officer prior to the meeting) you **must:-**

- 1. Not speak or vote (unless the public have speaking rights, or you are present to make representations, answer questions or to give evidence relating to the business being discussed in which case you can speak only)
- 2. Withdraw from the meeting during consideration of the matter or immediately after speaking.
- 3. Not seek to improperly influence the decision.

#### Gifts, Benefits and Hospitality

Councillors must declare at meetings any gift, benefit or hospitality with an estimated value (or cumulative value if a series of gifts etc.) of £25 or more. You **must**, at the commencement of the meeting or when the interest becomes apparent, disclose the existence and nature of the gift, benefit or hospitality, the identity of the donor and how the business under consideration relates to that person or body. However you can stay in the meeting unless it constitutes a significant interest, in which case it should be declared as outlined above.

#### What if I am unsure?

If you are in any doubt, Members are strongly advised to seek advice from the Monitoring Officer or the Democratic Services and Scrutiny Manager well in advance of the meeting.
