1.0 Introduction and Background

- 1.1 An application has been received for the review of the premises licence held by Marcus John Hogg, in respect of the premises known as the Little Albion Inn, 40 St Peters Road, Broadstairs from Morgan Sproates, Environmental Protection Manager.
- 1.2 These premises were granted a premises licence in November 2005 having been previously licensed by the magistrates court. In December 2016 Marcus John Hogg became the licence holder and designated premises supervisor at the premises. A copy of the premises licence is appended at Annex 1.
- 1.3 Licensable activities are shown on that premises licence and the times can be found at Annex 1, together with the conditions attached to the licence.
- 1.4 The grounds for review of the licence are set out in the application, which is appended at Annex 2.

2.0 General Points

- 2.1 Applicants for review of a premises licence are required, as part of the licensing procedure, to send copies of the application to other responsible authorities. The Licensing Authority must advertise the review for twenty eight days, giving interested parties the opportunity to make representations. Representations have been received from four members of the public in support of the premises which are appended at Annex 3. Six members of the public have made representations against the premises which are appended at Annex 4. No further representations have been received. The application was advertised by notice on the premises and on the public notice board in the Gateway, the main Council Offices.
- 2.2 Before determining the application, the Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to consider it and any relevant representations. The Authority must, having regard to the application and any relevant representations, take such steps, if any, mentioned under 'options' at paragraph 3, it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Guidance issued by the Home Office should also be considered.
- 2.3 The licensing objectives are the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance, and the protection of children from harm. Reasons must be given for any decision made by the Sub-Committee.

3.0 Options

- 3.1 To modify the conditions of the licence (for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added).
- 3.2 To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence.
- 3.3 To remove the designated premises supervisor.
- 3.4 To suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- 3.5 To revoke the licence.
- 3.6 To take none of these steps and take no action, or, take informal action such as a warning or guidance.

Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence: -

At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or

At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

- 1. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise antisocial behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 2. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 3. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that—
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available."
- 5. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- (2) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1
 - a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
 - b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula –

$$P = D + (DxV)$$

where -

- i. P is the permitted price,
- ii. D is the rate of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - i. The holder of the premises licence,
 - ii. The designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - iii. The personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or

officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

Films

The admission of children (persons under 18 years) to the exhibition of any film is restricted in accordance with any recommendation of the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC) or the Licensing Authority.

Where a film exhibition has not been classified, the licence holder will certify to the Licensing Authority that an assessment of the suitability of the film for exhibition to children, in accordance with the BBFC Guidelines has been carried out, and that this has been confirmed by the Licensing Authority, in writing, prior to public viewing.

Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 1) In pursuit of prevention of public nuisance licensing objective; I make the following observations in support of the review in accordance with Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003.				
The premise licence was transferred to Marcus John Hogg on 20th December 2016.				
A record of all noise complaints received by Environmental Health is attached in Annex 1. All three current complainants were given details of our Nuisance Control Service so they could have any further problems witnessed by Council Officers.				
There has been an intermittent history of noise complaints from this premises since our records began but from April 2017 the number of complaints has significantly increased. All complaints concern loud music and noise from patrons congregating outside the premises. Although there is a micro-pub opposite the premises, the locality is prodominantly residential with minimal separation distance from bedroom windows. The premises has seven large single glazed windows that do not offer significant noise reduction, there is no sound limiting device and the business currently benefits from live and recorded music until midnight daily, with recorded music extended until 1am at weekends.				
Several letters were sent to the licence holder regarding the noise complaints; the letters and Officer Reports are presented in Annex 2. A warning was given by letter on 6th June following an incident witnessed on 2 nd June. Despite this two further incidents were witnessed on 16th and 17th June.				
No response was received from the Licence Holder.

Annex 2

On 20th June 2017 a noise Abatement Notice was served by hand on Marcus Hogg by Amanda Berry, Environmental Health Officer. Advice given in a previous letter dated 6th June about mitigation measures was reiterated. For information, an Abatement Notice must be served where the noise nuisance experienced by neighbour(s) is unreasonable and amounts to a Statutory Nuisance.

On 23rd June 2017 at 22:30hrs Officers from the Nuisance Control Service were again called to witness loud music and patron noise.

Another warning letter was sent on 26th June to the licence holder.

No response was received from the Licence Holder.

Officers were again called out on Saturday 1st July and could hear music within the complainant's bedroom at midnight. On 8th July Officers arrived at 22:10hrs and music levels were much reduced. However, a complainant sent in recorded video clips inidcating significant patron and music noise between 22:30hrs and 23:45hrs.

Despite several warnings, including service of an Abatement Notice, noise complaints have continued.

Please provide as much information as possible to support the application (please read guidance note 2)
A map showing the premise in relation to residential dwellings is attached in Annex 3.
As described above noise complaints have been made to Environmental Health and a Statutory Nuisance Abatement Notice has been served following warnings to the licence holder to mitigate the noise.
Given the history of problems that pre-date the current licence holder and the distance to residential properties Environmental Health do not support the premises having live music. The venue is simply is not suitable for live music given the proximity to residential and poor acoustic properties of large single glazed windows.
Consequently Environmental Health is seeking full revocation of live music and a reduction in recorded music, along with a condition requiring a sound limiting device to be fitted at levels set by EHOs.
We are also seeking to prevent drinks from being consumed outside so that patrons are less likely to linger and cause distrurbance to neighbours.
We are concerned that the licence holder does not respond to letters and deal with the issues raised.

My name is the state of the Albion Public House. My name is the Albion Public House.


I have made complaints about the noise level generated at and by the Little Albion several times before but this weekend has been awful both in the loudness and duration of music and people kicking off outside the pub. Cars screeching up and pulling away wheel spinning, people shouting and screaming outside and what occasionally sounds like fighting. Friday night (5/5/2017) the music went on until 1.15am! We could hear the music thumping in our front room and master bedroom to the point where we cannot go to bed until it stops. The same happened last night, the music went off at 12.30am but there were people screaming and shouting outside until gone 1am. We really are getting sick of it. I phone them pretty much every Friday and Saturday night to ask them to turn it off/down and if it's very late (after 12.30am) they comply usually. If before 12.30am then I get "yea, yea, yea" but nothing happens. The other major issues is that they have a double doorway that is constantly left open which lets out the noise.

I won't even go into the problem of broken glass and bottles left on the pavement and road outside and around the pub, this is to the point we won't walk our dog past the pub because of it.

Can you please take this complaint seriously? There's no point filling out a sheet because it's every Friday/Saturday night and has been this way for months. If they have a party night or birthday occasionally during the week the same thing happens.

Can I also have a copy of their licence and conditions please?



I write to you regarding The Little Albion Inn and The Four Candles.

As you will see from the list attached to the Record of Nuisance forms, my complaint is mostly about The Little Albion inn rather than The Four Candles. The issue with The Four Candles is about noisy drinkers outside the pub when smoking/during the warmer weather. The issue regarding The Little Albion Inn is very loud music that seems to be escalating week by week.

I wrote to you last year regarding these issues but never heard anything back.

The noise coming from the Little Albion Inn is getting louder and louder, so much so that I cannot have any windows open whilst their music is being played, I also have to have my TV turned up very loud just so I can hear it over the noise. This is happening frequently and is seriously impacting my quality of life at the weekend.

Would you be kind enough to answer the following questions for me?

- 1) What is the legal noise limit that music can be played at during the evening in a residential area?
- 2) What are The Little Albion's licensing hours and are they allowed to play music during said hours? If their license is until 1pm does this mean they can play music, at any volume they choose, until that time? I have spoken with TDC several times and have asked for their licensing hours and if loud music can be played after 11pm yet no one seems to be able to give me an answer.


- 3) What are the permitted noise levels for the pub customers sitting outside on the benches especially when they are being really loud late at night? Do these benches have a license? Again, if they do, what considerations are given to neighbours when granting these licenses especially given they take up a considerable amount of space on the pavement which at times results in members of the public having to walk in the road due to the overspill?
- 4) What consideration is given to neighbouring properties when the Local Authority decides on licensing for pubs such as the Little Albion? The pub is located in a popular residential area, surrounded by family homes. Is ithis given any thought when allowing said licences? Do residents not have a right to peace and quiet and the ability to get a nights sleep after 11pm? Some days I have to leave home for work at 6.30am, not much fun when the pub 30 metres away is playing ridiculously loud music until the early hours.
- 5) Has anyone else in the surrounding area complained about the noise? If this is a question that comes under the Freedom of Information Act then please take this letter as my official request for said information.
- 6) I submitted Record of Nuisance form WK/201636039 at the end of October 2016 listing dates of noise and asking all of the above questions yet I never heard anything back. What have you done with the Record of Nuisance form WK/201636039? What have you done with the information I submitted online on 2nd April this year? Again, this email included all the questions above and listed all the noise nuisances from the notes app on my IPhone including those from Record of Nuisance form WK/201636039. Lengthy this email may have been however I felt it was significant for you to receive all the past history so you can see how the problems are escalating.

I fully understand that I live near a pub and a certain level of noise up to a certain time is to be expected. When I moved here 6 years ago the only pub in the street was The Little Albion and the noise was on the rare occasion. Now there are 2 pubs to contend with, both of which have a massive overspill outside, even more so in the summer resulting in lots of loud talking. Again, up until 11pm a certain level of noise is to be expected but what is the legal limit for this noise level? Does this limit change after 11pm? With music also from The Little Albion late afternoon/early evening every Sunday the weekend can often be ruined by the noise coming from the pub.

I personally believe the problems are only going to get worse once the warm weather arrives and windows and doors are open meaning not only will the music become much louder but the noise outside will increase. When does all this stop becoming a noise nuisance and actually become anti-social behavior?

I would very much appreciate it if you could look into this for me and any advice would be gratefully received.

I look forward to hearing from you.

Complaint of Nuisance from amplified music at The Little Albion Inn, 40 St Peters Road, Broadstairs, Kent, CT10 2AP

The Environmental Health Department has received complaints about loud music from your establishment.

We appreciate that persons living near to licensed premises must expect that there is inevitably some disturbance associated with such premises. On the other hand, it would not be fair for residents to endure unnecessary levels of amplified music in the late evening.

If you wish to have amplified music on a regular basis then to avoid causing nuisance it may be necessary for you to install sound insulation or other noise control measures. We are always willing to give advice on this if you require it.

The complainant has been given the number of our Noise Control Service to contact when the noise is causing a problem. If the Duty Officer is called then an assessment of the noise will be made. If in the Officer's opinion there is an unreasonable interference with your neighbours' enjoyment of their homes we will notify you. We may then be obliged to serve an Abatement Notice under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 requiring that the nuisance is restricted or stopped. It is also possible that if serious nuisance persists a request will be made to the Licensing Board to review your premises licence.

I hope it will not be necessary to go to these extremes and, if a problem is identified, we can count on your co-operation in resolving the matter. If you wish to comment on anything raised in this letter please write or contact me on the telephone number below.

IN THE EVENT OF AN APPEAL this notice shall <u>NOT</u> be suspended until the appeal has been abandoned or decided by the Court as, in the opinion of Thanet District Council, the nuisance to which the abatement notice relates is likely to be of a limited duration such that suspension of the notice would render it of no practical effect and the expenditure which would be incurred by any person in the carrying out of works in compliance with the abatement notice before any appeal has been decided would not be disproportionate to the public benefit to be expected in that period from such compliance.

YOUR ATTENTION IS DRAWN to the provisions of parts of Sections 79 and 80 of the Environmental Protection Act 1990 and in particular to Section 80 (3) which states that the person served with the notice may appeal against the Notice to a magistrates' court within the period of 21 days beginning with the date on which the person was served with the notice. The grounds for appeal are set out in the Statutory Nuisance (Appeals) Regulations 1995, Regulation 2 of which is attached.

IF YOU CONTRAVENE or fail to comply with any requirement or prohibition imposed by this notice without reasonable excuse you will be guilty of an offence against Part III of the Environmental Protection Act 1990. If you commit such an offence on industrial, trade or business premises you will be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £20,000. (In these Regulations "the 1974 Act" means the Control of Pollution Act 1974 and "the 1990 Act" means the Environmental Protection Act 1990 and "the 1993 Act" means the Noise and Statutory Nuisance Act 1993)

Appeals under Section 80(3) of the 1990 Act

- 2 (1) The provisions of this regulation apply in relation to an appeal brought by any person under section 80(3) of the 1990 Act (appeals to magistrates) against an abatement notice served upon him by a local authority.
 - (2) The grounds on which a person served with such a notice may appeal under section 80(3) are any one or more of the following grounds that are appropriate in the circumstances of the particular case -
 - (a) that the abatement notice is not justified by section 80 of the 1990 Act (summary proceedings for statutory nuisances);
 - (b) that there has been some informality, defect or error in, or in connection with the abatement notice, or in, or in connection with, any copy of the abatement notice served under section 80A(3) (certain notices in respect of vehicles, machinery or equipment);
 - (c) that the authority have refused unreasonably to accept compliance with alternative requirements, or that the requirements of the abatement notice are otherwise unreasonable in character or extent, or are unnecessary;
 - (d) that the time, or, where more than one time is specified, any of the times, within which the requirements of the abatement notice are to be complied with is not reasonably sufficient for the purpose;
 - (e) where the nuisance to which the notice relates -
 - (i) is a nuisance falling within section 79(1)(a), (d), (e), (f) or (g) of the 1990 Act and arises on industrial, trade or business premises, or
 - (ii) is a nuisance falling within section 79(1)(b) of the 1990 Act and the smoke is emitted from a chimney; or
 - (iii) is a nuisance falling within section 79(1)(ga) (section 79(1)(ga) was inserted by section 2(2) of the 1993 Act) of the 1990 Act and is noise emitted from or caused by a vehicle, machinery or equipment being used for industrial, trade or business purposes, that the best practicable means were used to prevent, or to counteract the effects of, the nuisance:
 - (f) that, in the case of a nuisance under section 79(1)(g) or (ga) of the 1990 Act (noise emitted from premises), the requirements imposed by the abatement notice by virtue of section 80(1)(a) of the Act are more onerous than the requirements for the time being in force, in relation to the noise to which the notice relates, of -
 - (i) any notice served under section 60 or 66 of the 1974 Act (control of noise on construction sites and from certain premises), or
 - (ii) any consent given under section 61 or 65 of the 1974 Act (consent for work on construction sites and consent for noise to exceed registered level in a noise abatement zone), or
 - (iii) any determination made under section 67 of the 1974 Act (noise control of new buildings);
 - (g) that, in the case of a nuisance under section 79(1)(ga) of the 1990 Act (noise emitted from or caused by vehicles, machinery or equipment), the requirements imposed by the abatement notice by virtue of section 80(1)(a) of the Act are more onerous than the requirements for the time being in force, in relation to the noise to which the notice relates, or any condition of a consent given under paragraph 1 of Schedule 2 to the 1993 Act (loudspeakers in streets or roads);
 - (h) that the abatement notice should have been served on some person instead of the appellant, being
 - (i) the person responsible for the nuisance, or
 - (ii) the person responsible for the vehicle, machinery or equipment, or
 - (iii) In the case of a nulsance arising from any defect of a structural character, the owner of the premises, or
 - (iv) in the case where the person responsible for the nuisance cannot be found or the nuisance has not yet occurred, the owner or occupier of the premises;
 - that the abatement notice might lawfully have been served on some person instead of the appellant being -
 - (i) in the case where the appellant is the owner of the premises, the occupier of the premises, or
 - (ii) in the case where the appellant is the occupier of the premises, the owner of the premises, and that it would have been equitable for it to have been so served;
 - (j) that the abatement notice might lawfully have been served on some person in addition to the appellant, being -
 - (i) a person also responsible for the nuisance,
 - (ii) a person who is also an owner of the premises, or
 - (iii) a person who is also an occupier of the premises, or
 - (iv) a person who is also the person responsible for the vehicle, machinery or equipment, and that it would have been equitable for it to have been so served.

Environmental Protection Act 1990 – Section 79 (1) at The Little Albion Inn, 40 St Peters Road, Broadstairs, Kent, CT10 2AP

I write to inform you that a complaint was made to the council's Nuisance Control Service on Friday 23rd June alleging that excessive noise from your property was causing a disturbance to nearby residents. Officers visited at 22:40hrs and witnessed unreasonable loud music coming from your premises.

You have been given advice on measures to control noise and you must ensure that any further music is adequately mitigated. Whilst no further action will be taken at this stage, the situation will be monitored and if a further breach of the Abatement Notice is witnessed served on you dated 20th June will result in this matter being passed to the Councils Solicitor with a view to prosecution.

I would recommend that no further music events are held at the premises until you are confident that the music will not cause a nuisance to neighbours.

Please note that should you choose to install a sound limiting device to control the volume of music; Officers from Environmental Health will be pleased to come along and recommend appropriate levels. If you wish to discuss this matter further please contact me on the details above.

Dear Licensing,

We own the house which is to the Little Albion and this is our recent experience of the late live music played in the pub. On Saturday 1 July at about 10.30 pm we were aware of a loud conversation that appeared to be coming from just outside our house. On investigation, there were 2 women from the pub sitting on the steps leading to our front door drinking and talking loudly. They took no notice when I switched the hall light on or when I opened the front door. I asked them to move as I had a baby in the house trying to sleep. One of them acknowledged me and said as I had a child they would move which eventually they did. They were going to leave their glasses on the steps but I asked them to take them which they did by throwing them in my wheely bin. The steps were left very wet which I had to wash down. The music that night went on until 1am which seems very unreasonable in a residential area.

The pub is fairly small and I imagine gets hot very quickly and as a result the entrance door is kept open to provide ventilation. When the pub gets overcrowded, people spill out onto the narrow pavement by the junction of St. Peter's Road and Sowell Street. As a result, not only do local residents hear the unwelcome increased noise of the music but also groups of people socialising loudly outside the pub at the junction.

I saw in the local paper that a petition had been started to support the pub and I feel I must object to the wording of this petition which is inaccurate. 'The Little Albion, a lovely family friendly pub'.....if only.

Local residents are not complaining about a family friendly pub, the problem comes when it/becomes a late night party pub at weekends for which it is too small to hold all its customers and in the process is regularly disturbing local families who are trying to sleep. This is a residential area away from the town centre and main roads. Playing live music after 10 to 10.30pm with the pub door open is pretty anti-social and unreasonable behaviour on the part of the pub management.

I do not know what the licensing laws currently are for The Little Albion but feel as part of the licence review, regard must be given to the reasonable wishes for those living nearby to peacefully enjoy their weekend evenings and nights.

Dear Sir/Madam

As close neighbours of the Little Albion Public House we have been subjected to excessive and unreasonable late night noise mainly on Friday and/or Saturdays nights since around the middle of 2016. The noise is in the form of extremely loud music, on one night there was a horse race evening and we could clearly hear the compare's amplified talking and the shouting when the races started in our property in the same way that we can hear the music on the weekend music nights. Apart from the obvious nuisance of the unreasonable noise level the main impact has been that, as the noise can be heard in the bedrooms, we are unable to go to bed until the music stops which often goes on until midnight or 1am or later.

Unfortunately, Summer has made a bad situation worse. The warm weather means that we need to have our windows open at night and unfortunately the Pub has had theirs open as well, as have been both front doors.

Apart from specific event-noise the other issue is with the associated antisocial behaviour of people coming out of the pub and causing disturbances. The nature of this noise varies from loud talking to shouting and arguing and occasionally fighting. Quite often there are more than 10 people outside the pub and in the beer garden to the side being very loud. Then after the pub is supposed to close at 1am there can be 30 minutes to an hour of people hanging around outside talking and shouting. We frequently get couples or groups of people shouting or arguing as they leaves the pub and go past our property. There are cars arriving to pick up people revving, car doors banging, people sitting on the benches outside or in the beer garden talking loudly until way after closing time.

Even though the noise from whatever specific pub event was over we cannot sleep until the antisocial behaviour and associated noise has stopped. Specifically, recent incident have included a late night noise outside our property, on looking out of the window there was a drunk guy urinating in the street up a neighbour's fence. Another time a young girl, so drunk she fell over in the road, was being shouted at by presumably her boyfriend, this one was on 14th July 2017. The same evening at 12:45am the publican could be heard shouting and arguing in a loud and aggressive manner with another man outside the pub for at least 10 minutes. These are just a couple of examples of the many antisocial noises and incidents that we have had to put up with over the last 10 months or so. Despite calling the pub (occasionally going in there personally to complain) nearly every weekend up to the start of July asking them to turn the music down or off there has been no attempt to curtail the noise at all by the landlord until the middle of June (when the council got seriously involved). Before then it was getting worse and worse in terms of volume and frequency of music events but even though the antisocial behaviour has reduced because of the fewer music events the landlord and the pub's customers are still causing problem for local residents.

Since Thanet District Council's Environmental Health Department got involved in this case the music has quietened down but we've still been affected by people-related noise and heard a couple of weekend lock-ins or late-night parties spilling out into the beer garden or upstairs where the windows were open until gone 3am. Again, with taxis arriving at all hours to pick people up with the associated drunken loud goodbyes outside the pub and slamming car doors. I mean they don't even try to leave quietly.

Nobody wants the pub to close and I'm sure we've all got better things to do than deal with this but we are all supposed to live in a civilised society and behave in a reasonable way. It is very unfortunate that the landlord of The Little Albion Public House puts his business and his staff's jobs at risk because he will not take responsibility for himself, his pub or his clientele and clearly believes that he can do what he wants when he wants until silly-o'clock and the local residents local just have to put up with it.

The comments that we would like to make in response to your email and for this license review are as follows, We understand that there have been complaints regarding noise levels at The Little Albion. Our comments below are made as neighbouring residents.

As residents living nearby to a local pub we accept that there are times when there will be some noise nuisance. There have been occasions in recent months, however, when noise levels at The Little Albion have been significantly increased in comparison to similar events in previous years. This is mainly at times when bands have been playing or dj events. These have mainly been on a Friday or weekend night. To be fair to the Little Albion these are not every weekend, but when they do happen they have caused increased noise during and after the event when people leave the pub.

One of the main areas of our concern is the permanent siting of 2 tables with benches on the pavement. These generate significant noise with people drinking on the street. Frequently, they also become a point of congregation for people returning from premises elsewhere after closing time and resulting drunken conversations. In recent weeks there have been examples of this at 2am and 3.30am

Whilst not wanting this license review to result in the landlord losing his license, our request would be for an outcome of reduced noise levels at the time of events at the pub, and for the removal of the pavement tables and seating which are the cause of noise nuisance particularly late at night and early morning Yours Sincerely

Background & Relevant Legislation

The Licensing Act 2003 sets out the regulation under which a licensee should provide the sale and supply of alcohol, the provision of entertainment and the provision of late night refreshment, and about offences relating to alcohol and other connected purposes. A Premises License is a license granted under Part 3 of the Act that authorises the premises to be used for one or more licensable activities.

The Premises is currently licensed for the provision of Live Music (indoors) until midnight every day (2am on New Years Eve) and for the provision of Recorded Music (indoors Sunday – Thursday until midnight, Friday & Saturday until 1am. Notwithstanding this fact, it is still the responsibility of the Licensee under the Act to promote the Licensing Objectives, one of which is 'the prevention of public nuisance'.

When considering issues of public nuisance, one should also take regard of the Antisocial Behaviour Act 2003, as well as the relevant licensing regime. Music should not cause a Statutory Nuisance. A Statutory Nuisance is defined as something that unreasonably interferes with the use and enjoyment of a neighbour's home.

The GLA Licensing Act 2003 [GLA], published 7th April 2017, states 'it is important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable.' The Sowell Street/St Peter's Road Junction is at the heart of a primarily residential area set back from the main thoroughfares in Broadstairs Town. A resident must expect to be able to enjoy their

homes without noise nuisance on a regular occurrence across many months at unsociable hours.

The Effect of The Premises on the quiet enjoyment of my home

I, reside at Sowell Street, Broadstairs, and thus would be regarded as a 'neighbour' to the Premises. Since August 2015, I have recorded numerous occasions when the Premises has caused significant interruption to the quiet enjoyment of my home, both during and outside of Licensed Hours.

I have made several attempts to speak with the operator (Saturday 6th May 2017 @ 23.52 and Sunday 13th May @ 01.30). On both occasions, I contacted the Little Albion to ask for a reduction in the noise as the recorded music could be heard clearly above my TV with my windows closed. I explained that I was a neighbour and on the latter occasion he explained to me that he had a license for the activity, although polite, he clearly had no regard for his neighbours. You will note that the music was still on at 01.30 – in fact after his licensed hours. The current operator has no regard for the prevention of public nuisance to his neighbours and therefore the Licensing Authority must act to regulate this Premises in order that it can achieve the Licensing Objectives, in line with Thanet District Council's Statement of Licensing Policy updated January 2016.

I append at Annex A, a log that I have maintained since August 2015 detailing all issues of noise-related nuisance from the Premises. On multiple occasions there has been both live and recorded music being played on until 01.30.

Often the music causes a public nuisance much earlier in the evening, with it hard to hear the TV inside my house from 21.00, with the windows closed due to the levels of the noise coming from the Little Albion. [See Log 10th Feb 2017, 8th April 2017 & 25th March 2017 as examples.]

The operator has continually shown disregard for the authorities as proven when the local environmental nuisance control team visited my home, took down evidence including the titles of each song heard whilst in my bedroom, and then visited the premises in order to ask for a reduction in the noise as well as ancillary matters including closing of the windows, but within 7 days the same noise nuisance could be heard and similar levels, and continuing passed the prescribed licensing hours.

The fact that the operator 're-offended' and the team were called out on multiple occasions over the 8 week complaint period shows that he has very little respect for the approach as set out in GLA 11.10 'where authorised persons and responsible authorities have concerns about problems identified at premises, it is good practice for them to give licence holders early warning of their concerns and the need for improvement, and where possible they should advise the licence or certificate holder of the steps they need to take to address those concerns'. None of these steps were undertaken until the matter was escalated to a license review.

The licensee's disregard for the law in spite of advice and guidance from the Local Authority must prove to the review that a condition of the premises license preventing all live and recorded music should be imposed.

I must draw your attention to Saturday 1st July 2017. At 4 am, the noise could be heard from within my house, both verbal and amplified recorded music. It was clear that there were multiple patrons or guests still in the beer garden part of the premises. [Enclosed by email date stamped video footage of the exterior of the premises where the noise is clearly audible together with examples of volume that can be heard from] Although the License Holder lives at the premises, he fails to recognise his duties that the prevention of public nuisance apply at all times to the premises.

With regard to other public nuisance, despite a polite request to move the times of the collections of the bottle bins, this continues to happen at unsociable hours ranging from 04.58 to 06.13. In order for the Little Albion to continue to trade, a condition restricting the collection of bottle bins to between 08.00 and 18.00 should be placed on the license.

On frequent occasions the patrons of the pub, upon leaving or using the pavement as a smoking area, are extremely loud. It is the licensee's job to minimise this risk by advising his patrons to leave quietly and respect the premises' neighbours. This has not been done (see 3rd March 2017 and 13th July as an example).

The licensee's disregard for the law makes it incumbent on the local authority to add conditions to the license preventing recorded or live music at this venue at any time of the day under section 177A(4) in spite of the fact that deregulation allows for a premises to play both recorded and live music between 08.00 and 23.00 without a license. In doing this, the business can continue to trade, whilst the authorities can satisfy themselves that there can be no noise nuisance from live or recorded music and that there will be no late night public nuisance caused by patrons leaving or using the St Peter's Road pavement as a smoking area.

I write to you regarding The Little Albion Inn and The Four Candles.

As you will see from the list attached to the Record of Nuisance forms, my complaint is mostly about The Little Albion inn rather than The Four Candles. The issue with The Four Candles is about noisy drinkers outside the pub when smoking/during the warmer weather. The issue regarding The Little Albion Inn is very loud music that seems to be escalating week by week.

I wrote to you last year regarding these issues but never heard anything back.

The noise coming from the Little Albion Inn is getting louder and louder, so much so that I cannot have any windows open whilst their music is being played, I also have to have my TV turned up very loud just so I can hear it over the noise. This is happening frequently and is seriously impacting my quality of life at the weekend.

Would you be kind enough to answer the following questions for me?

- 1) What is the legal noise limit that music can be played at during the evening in a residential area?
- 2) What are The Little Albion's licensing hours and are they allowed to play music during said hours? If their license is until 1pm does this mean they can play music, at any volume they choose, until that time? I have spoken with TDC several times and have asked for their licensing hours and if loud music can be played after 11pm yet no one seems to be able to give me an answer.

- 3) What are the permitted noise levels for the pub customers sitting outside on the benches especially when they are being really loud late at night? Do these benches have a license? Again, if they do, what considerations are given to neighbours when granting these licenses especially given they take up a considerable amount of space on the pavement which at times results in members of the public having to walk in the road due to the overspill?
- 4) What consideration is given to neighbouring properties when the Local Authority decides on licensing for pubs such as the Little Albion? The pub is located in a popular residential area, surrounded by family homes. Is ithis given any thought when allowing said licences? Do residents not have a right to peace and quiet and the ability to get a nights sleep after 11pm? Some days I have to leave home for work at 6.30am, not much fun when the pub 30 metres away is playing ridiculously loud music until the early hours.
- 5) Has anyone else in the surrounding area complained about the noise? If this is a question that comes under the Freedom of Information Act then please take this letter as my official request for said information.
- 6) I submitted Record of Nuisance form WK/201636039 at the end of October 2016 listing dates of noise and asking all of the above questions yet I never heard anything back. What have you done with the Record of Nuisance form WK/201636039? What have you done with the information I submitted online on 2nd April this year? Again, this email included all the questions above and listed all the noise nuisances from the notes app on my IPhone including those from Record of Nuisance form WK/201636039. Lengthy this email may have been however I felt it was significant for you to receive all the past history so you can see how the problems are escalating.

I fully understand that I live near a pub and a certain level of noise up to a certain time is to be expected. When I moved here 6 years ago the only pub in the street was The Little Albion and the noise was on the rare occasion. Now there are 2 pubs to contend with, both of which have a massive overspill outside, even more so in the summer resulting in lots of loud talking. Again, up until 11pm a certain level of noise is to be expected but what is the legal limit for this noise level? Does this limit change after 11pm? With music also from The Little Albion late afternoon/early evening every Sunday the weekend can often be ruined by the noise coming from the pub.

I personally believe the problems are only going to get worse once the warm weather arrives and windows and doors are open meaning not only will the music become much louder but the noise outside will increase. When does all this stop becoming a noise nuisance and actually become anti-social behavior?

I would very much appreciate it if you could look into this for me and any advice would be gratefully received.

Saturday 20th May - Little Albion Inn. Loud music until 1pm

Saturday 27th May - Little Albion Inn. Music at a perfectly acceptable level until 10.20pm. After this it was very loud, same as previous weeks as in I could hear it over TV and with windows closed.

Letter received from Environmental Services – Noise Control Services, on 30th May 2017 with contact details for out of hours noise nuisance reporting.

2nd June 2017. Little Albion Inn. Very loud band. Called Nuisance Control Service at 10.26pm. They were already at another address within the area. Came and monitored the noise.

5th June 2017. Little Albion. Bottle bin emptied at 5.39am.

I was away on holiday from 11th to 17th June, returning the evening of 17th June.

17th June 2017. Little Albion. Very loud band. Called Nuisance Control Service. They came out at approx. 9.40pm. Also told me they listened at front door last night as also had a complaint last night. Listened at front door as we were away.

19 June 17. Little Albion. Woken up by bottle bin being emptied at 5.45am

23 June 17. Little Albion loud band and noise outside. Foreign students. Called Nuisance Control Service at 22.25. Came out. Music was much quieter at that point, possibly had door closed. Could still hear base very clearly. Lots of loud talking outside both pubs. They left about 22.50. Music got louder at just after 11pm, assumed was the finale. Ended at 23.20. Some noise outside pub, loud talking and music continuing to be played but not at same volume as earlier.

Sat 1st July 17. Little Albion. Woke up by loud music at 3.43am. Could not call Nuisance Control Service as this service is only available until 2am. Sounded like music

was coming from the Little Albion but couldn't be sure so I drove past. The music was definitely coming from the Little Albion. Drove for security at that time of the morning. Back room light on but couldn't see if anyone was in the bar. Could hear people in garden. Music appeared to be coming from upstairs. Called pub, got through on 2nd try, asked them to turn music down which they did after about 5 mins. Followed by lots of loud talking. I recorded the activity and can forward to you if so required. They had had a band on the previous evening which finished early and wasn't too loud.

Sat 1st July. Little Albion. Came home at 23.40 and called Nuisance Control Service immediately due to noise from pub. They came out just after 12.15am and listened to noise in bedroom. On way home was lots of patron noise and people outside pub and 2 people sitting behind mosaics drinking from glasses. Photographs taken if so required.

Sat 8th July - Little Albion. Called noise nuisance officer at 9.44pm as loud musician. Not as loud as previous times but still loud enough to prevent us from sleeping. They arrived at about 10.15pm just as the music had got quieter. They said the windows were closed. Left at 10.20pm ish. Said if it gets loud again then just note it, don't need to worry about calling them. Music from Little Albion got very loud again at 10.50pm.

Sun 9th July - Little Albion Inn. Music being played quite loudly. Sounded live at around 9pm and then recorded at 9.30pm. Patron noise and argument with lots of swearing just after 9.30pm for about half an hour.

Thursday 13th July. Little Albion. Lots of outside patron noise. 21:10. Lots of patrons on benches outside Little Albion, Sowell Street side. Called Nuisance Control Service at 22.07 as got very very loud. They asked if it was worth them coming out as have to come from Birchington. I said I was more than happy with logging the nuisance with them over the telephone. Said to call out again if music from Little Albion gets louder. Music from Little Albion wasn't the problem, it was the patron noise outside. Videoed from bed, bedroom window and front of house. Drinkers outside Little Albion noticed me videoing so went inside.

Monday 17th July - Little Albion bottle bins emptied at 5.49am

I would like to comment on the review procedure regarding the Little Albion Inn pub in Broadstairs. We live in close proximity to the pub and we have had some issues over the past few months.

There has been regular occasions when the noise level has been what we considered unacceptable, going on until 1/2am. It is not the live music which is the problem - that is perfectly fine. However the party nights or DJ nights are at a much higher volume and go on into the early hours in what is a quiet residential area. This also brings with it rowdy behaviour from some, which involves shouting and swearing and some instances of fighting. 'We've lived here f quite a few years and never had any real problems with the pub until the current management.

We don't want the pub to lose their license but do think it should be modified to take into account local residents environment and music not go on beyond 11/12pm.

Your Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPI) are those interests that are, or should be, listed on your Register of Interest Form.

If you are at a meeting and the subject relating to one of your DPIs is to be discussed, in so far as you are aware of the DPI, you <u>must</u> declare the existence **and** explain the nature of the DPI during the declarations of interest agenda item, at the commencement of the item under discussion, or when the interest has become apparent

Once you have declared that you have a DPI (unless you have been granted a dispensation by the Standards Committee or the Monitoring Officer, for which you will have applied to the Monitoring Officer prior to the meeting) you **must:-**

- 1. Not speak or vote on the matter;
- 2. Withdraw from the meeting room during the consideration of the matter;
- 3. Not seek to improperly influence the decision on the matter.

Do I have a significant interest and if so what action should I take?

A significant interest is an interest (other than a DPI or an interest in an Authority Function) which:

- Affects the financial position of yourself and/or an associated person; or Relates to the determination of your application for any approval, consent, licence, permission or registration made by, or on your behalf of, you and/or an associated person;
- 2. And which, in either case, a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably regard as being so significant that it is likely to prejudice your judgment of the public interest.

An associated person is defined as:

- A family member or any other person with whom you have a close association, including your spouse, civil partner, or somebody with whom you are living as a husband or wife, or as if you are civil partners; or
- Any person or body who employs or has appointed such persons, any firm in which they
 are a partner, or any company of which they are directors; or
- Any person or body in whom such persons have a beneficial interest in a class of securities exceeding the nominal value of £25,000;
- Any body of which you are in a position of general control or management and to which you are appointed or nominated by the Authority; or
- any body in respect of which you are in a position of general control or management and which:
 - exercises functions of a public nature; or
 - is directed to charitable purposes; or
 - has as its principal purpose or one of its principal purposes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union)

An Authority Function is defined as: -

- Housing where you are a tenant of the Council provided that those functions do not relate particularly to your tenancy or lease; or
- Any allowance, payment or indemnity given to members of the Council;
- Any ceremonial honour given to members of the Council
- Setting the Council Tax or a precept under the Local Government Finance Act 1992

If you are at a meeting and you think that you have a significant interest then you <u>must</u> declare the existence **and** nature of the significant interest at the commencement of the

matter, or when the interest has become apparent, or the declarations of interest agenda item.

Once you have declared that you have a significant interest (unless you have been granted a dispensation by the Standards Committee or the Monitoring Officer, for which you will have applied to the Monitoring Officer prior to the meeting) you **must:-**

- 1. Not speak or vote (unless the public have speaking rights, or you are present to make representations, answer questions or to give evidence relating to the business being discussed in which case you can speak only)
- 2. Withdraw from the meeting during consideration of the matter or immediately after speaking.
- 3. Not seek to improperly influence the decision.

Gifts, Benefits and Hospitality

Councillors must declare at meetings any gift, benefit or hospitality with an estimated value (or cumulative value if a series of gifts etc.) of £25 or more. You **must**, at the commencement of the meeting or when the interest becomes apparent, disclose the existence and nature of the gift, benefit or hospitality, the identity of the donor and how the business under consideration relates to that person or body. However you can stay in the meeting unless it constitutes a significant interest, in which case it should be declared as outlined above.

What if I am unsure?

If you are in any doubt, Members are strongly advised to seek advice from the Monitoring Officer or the Democratic Services and Scrutiny Manager well in advance of the meeting.
