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Do I have a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest and if so what action should I take?

Your Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPI) are those interests that are, or should be, listed on your Register of Interest Form.

If you are at a meeting and the subject relating to one of your DPIs is to be discussed, in so far as you are aware of the DPI, you <u>must</u> declare the existence **and** explain the nature of the DPI during the declarations of interest agenda item, at the commencement of the item under discussion, or when the interest has become apparent

Once you have declared that you have a DPI (unless you have been granted a dispensation by the Standards Committee or the Monitoring Officer, for which you will have applied to the Monitoring Officer prior to the meeting) you **must:**-

- 1. Not speak or vote on the matter;
- 2. Withdraw from the meeting room during the consideration of the matter;
- 3. Not seek to improperly influence the decision on the matter.

Do I have a significant interest and if so what action should I take?

A significant interest is an interest (other than a DPI or an interest in an Authority Function) which:

- Affects the financial position of yourself and/or an associated person; or Relates to the determination of your application for any approval, consent, licence, permission or registration made by, or on your behalf of, you and/or an associated person;
- And which, in either case, a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably regard as being so significant that it is likely to prejudice your judgment of the public interest.

An associated person is defined as:

- A family member or any other person with whom you have a close association, including your spouse, civil partner, or somebody with whom you are living as a husband or wife, or as if you are civil partners; or
- Any person or body who employs or has appointed such persons, any firm in which they are a
 partner, or any company of which they are directors; or
- Any person or body in whom such persons have a beneficial interest in a class of securities exceeding the nominal value of £25,000;
- Any body of which you are in a position of general control or management and to which you are appointed or nominated by the Authority; or
- any body in respect of which you are in a position of general control or management and which:
 - exercises functions of a public nature; or
 - is directed to charitable purposes; or
 - has as its principal purpose or one of its principal purposes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union)

An Authority Function is defined as: -

- Housing where you are a tenant of the Council provided that those functions do not relate particularly to your tenancy or lease; or
- Any allowance, payment or indemnity given to members of the Council;
- Any ceremonial honour given to members of the Council
- Setting the Council Tax or a precept under the Local Government Finance Act 1992

If you are at a meeting and you think that you have a significant interest then you <u>must</u> declare the existence **and** nature of the significant interest at the commencement of the matter, or when the interest has become apparent, or the declarations of interest agenda item.

Once you have declared that you have a significant interest (unless you have been granted a dispensation by the Standards Committee or the Monitoring Officer, for which you will have applied to the Monitoring Officer prior to the meeting) you **must:-**

- Not speak or vote (unless the public have speaking rights, or you are present to make representations, answer questions or to give evidence relating to the business being discussed in which case you can speak only)
- 2. Withdraw from the meeting during consideration of the matter or immediately after speaking.
- 3. Not seek to improperly influence the decision.

Gifts, Benefits and Hospitality

Councillors must declare at meetings any gift, benefit or hospitality with an estimated value (or cumulative value if a series of gifts etc.) of £25 or more. You **must**, at the commencement of the meeting or when the interest becomes apparent, disclose the existence and nature of the gift, benefit or hospitality, the identity of the donor and how the business under consideration relates to that person or body. However you can stay in the meeting unless it constitutes a significant interest, in which case it should be declared as outlined above.

What if I am unsure?

If you are in any doubt, Members are strongly advised to seek advice from the Monitoring Officer or the Committee Services Manager well in advance of the meeting.

If you need to declare an interest then please complete the declaration of interest form.

Executive Summary:

To consider an application for a New Premises Licence at The Stone Bay Kiosk Broadstairs.

Recommendation:

The instructions of the Sub-Committee are requested.

CORPORATE IMPLICATIONS

Financial and Value for Money

Costs associated with processing the application are taken from licensing fee income.

The applicant or any other person (objector) may appeal the Committee's decision to Magistrates' Court within 21 days. Should this decision be appealed the Council will incur costs defending the appeal. Should the appeal be successful it could result in costs being awarded against the Council. Therefore all decisions should ensure that they are in line with the objectives of the Licensing Act 2003

Legal

Under the Licensing Act 2003 the Licensing Authority has a duty to exercise licensing control of relevant premises.

The Licensing Sub-Committee is obliged to determine applications with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.

Any decision the Licensing Sub-Committee makes should be made with regard to the Secretary of State's guidance made under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (revised in April 2017) as well as Thanet District Councils adopted Licensing Policy.

Where any decision parts from either the Guidance or the Policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal/challenge is increased. Similarly the risk of appeal/challenge is increased if any decision made is not evidence based and proportionate.

The Licensing Sub-Committee must pay proper attention to the applicant's rights under the provisions of the Human Rights Act 1998, which gives further effect in the United Kingdom to the fundamental rights and freedoms contained in the European Conventions on Human Rights. The Licensing Sub-Committee must have proper regard to the rights of the individual applicant when making decisions that affect them. However, it also has to have regard to the safety and protection of the public and therefore to ensure that the right balance

is found and think hard about how it can cause the least possible harm to individuals, bearing in mind its duty to ensure the protection of the public.

The effective regulation of licensable activities and of premises at which licensable activities take place can assist in safeguarding children and vulnerable adults.

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states: "Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that is reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area"

In considering this application the Licensing Sub-Committee will balance the competing Human Rights of the various parties including the right to respect for private and family life, the protection of property and the right to a fair hearing.

There is a right of appeal to a Magistrates' Court within 21 days of the date of the decision of the Licensing Sub-Committee with regard to the grant/refusal of a licence or any of the conditions attached to it.

Equality Act 2010 & Public Sector Equality Duty

Members are reminded of the requirement, under the Public Sector Equality Duty (section 149 of the Equality Act 2010) to have due regard to the aims of the Duty at the time the decision is taken. The aims of the Duty are: (i) eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment, victimisation and other conduct prohibited by the Act, (ii) advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it, and (iii) foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it.

Protected characteristics: age, sex, disability, race, sexual orientation, gender reassignment, religion or belief and pregnancy & maternity. Only aim (i) of the Duty applies to Marriage & civil partnership.

In considering this application it is appropriate to consider the rights of both the applicant and other parties, such as "responsible authorities" and\or "other persons" (objectors). The procedure for determining licences has a prescribed format to ensure fair representation of the relevant facts by all parties.

1.0 Introduction and Background

- 1.1 An application for a new premises licence at the Stone Bay Kiosk Broadstairs has been received
- 1.2 The application is attached at Annex 1 along with the plan at Annex 2.

2.0 The Current Situation

- 2.1 Applicants who apply for a new premises licence are required, as part of the licensing procedure, to display a public notice which provides information to the public regarding the manner in which representations may be made. Similarly, a public notice of the application should be published in a local newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the premises. These requirements were complied with.
- 2.2 A number of representations were received. The representations were sent to the applicant. The applicant sent (via the Technical Support Team) a letter to everyone who had submitted a representation. Three of the representations were then withdrawn.
 - Attached at Annex 3 is the letter from the applicant in reply to the representations.
 - Attached at Annex 4 are 20 representations that are to be considered.
- 2.3 No representations have been received from the Police, Environmental Protection Team, Licensing Officer or Fire Service.
- 2.4 The police have agreed some conditions with the applicant, these are attached at Annex 5.
- 2.4 The Licensing Sub-Committee will be aware that it must carry out its functions under the 2003 Licensing Act to take steps which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Licensing objectives are: the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance, and the protection of children from harm. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Sub Committee must also have regard to its statement of licensing policy and the Guidance issued under the Act.
- 2.5 The four licensing objectives are the matters the Licensing Sub-Committee must address when considering whether to grant or refuse the application. Each application should be considered on its merits. Reasons must be given for any decision made by the Sub-Committee.
- 3.0 **Options**

- 3.2 To refuse the application
- 3.3 To approve the application with any other conditions/limitations that the Sub-Committee feel are appropriate.

The premises are a well established shipping container kiosk serving hot drinks and light snacks. It is desired to serve a limited range of alcohol. There are tables and chairs as set out on the plan (approved by (TDC). CCTV cameras installed at the kiosk for security. The applicant will invite a condition that alcohol will have to be dispensed in non glass receptacles.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

The kiosk will be manned by a person over 18. Under 18's may from time to time assist but no alcohol may be sold by a person under 18. All alcohol will be supervised by the DPS or a person over 18. The removal of the outside tables and chairs will avoid misuse of the tables and chairs when the kiosk is not open.

c) Public safety

The provision of drinks in non-glass receptacles. The limited area in front of the premises enabling supervision by the operators.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

The nature of the premises, the hours requested and supervision from the kiosk at all times when the premises are open is not likely to cause a public nuisance.

e) The protection of children from harm

All alcohol sales to anyone appearing to be under 25 will require production of photographic ID, such as but not exclusively, driving licence or passport. A refusals book shall be maintained. The applicant is agreeable to the standard current Police condition in relation to under age sales, as adapted to the particular nature of the premises.

NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Continued from previous page...

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].







We would like to share with you in more detail our plans.

We are a traditional beach kiosk that has been upgraded to create a family hub for locals to enjoy. Living locally ourselves on Stone Road, we know that Stone Bay is traditionally a local family beach.

We are offering a service where families can gather and enjoy freshly prepared healthy food, health and well-being classes, and a space to relax.

To allay local concerns, we will agree to limit trading hours to 10 pm only in May, June, July, and August. Outside of these dates, we will reduce the hours to 6 pm.

We intend to serve only plastic glasses at all times, with a limited range of beer, wine, and Pimms to accompany our range of food. We will police our area and the immediate surroundings.

We believe our presence may have a deterrent effect, stopping youngsters from having their own beach parties down on Stone Bay.

We appreciate that local people will obviously have concerns about the possible character change of Stone Bay by the introduction of the supply of alcohol. On the other hand, a recent Facebook post showed more people in favour than objecting. We will attach a printout showing this.

We are looking to achieve a balance to suit all interests.

We are aware that if we fail to operate the business properly, the council has wide powers to limit or remove the licenses.

Finally, we'd like to say that Josh Bay, Viking, Louisa Bay & Dumpton all have licensed kiosks.

This is a family orientated beach. Introducing the sale of alcohol will be detrimental to the family nature of the location and will encourage people to loiter in the area, taking away from the peaceful and relaxing atmosphere. I believe it will encourage potentially rowdy behaviour and am concerned for the safety of my neighbouring beach hut. The queues were bad enough last summer just from the queues for food, not to mention the increased littering.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

Last summer The Hut played loud music daily which spoiled the beach atmosphere. This is not a trendy London hotspot; it is a family beach. Extending the trading hours until 10pm with the introduction of alcohol will just compound this noise disturbance.

Protection of Children from Harm

I am extremely concerned about encouraging the consumption of alcohol around my young children and other children playing in the area, as well as the increased risk of broken glass and plastic. Inebria again take away from the ambience of the beach. Children should be allowed to be children without the worry of this business.

Public Safety

The site has one rickety tap to the rear of The Hut, which serves as the main water site for all of the beach and chalet users so has very high footfall. It often leaks and causes congestion around the point you are proposing to allow the sale of alcohol. There is no proper electric supply to the main promenade, meaning there will be a lack of lighting in the evening. The beach huts are let on the understanding of "dawn til dusk" for this very reason. There is very limited phone signal, making it difficult to call the emergency services should someone have an accident. Finally, there are very few public toilets which are often locked at 6pm, meaning the likelihood is that people will urinate behind the beach huts whilst inebriated. There is a portaloo but that is supposed to be kept locked for beach hut users use only. I think it is really irresponsible to consider allowing alcohol sales at what should be a "tea, coffee, chips, bacon roll & ice cream" kind of kiosk.

I am sure that loud music is not allowed on Stone Bay so I do not understand why "The Hut" got away with it especially as there are supposed to be beach inspectors to ensure rules are obeyed to prevent public nuisance.

Protection of Children from Harm

Children should be allowed to enjoy the beach free from drunks or high spirited youngsters and adults. I fear there will be an increase in litter and anti-social behaviour and a lack of policing.

Public Safety

Because of the lack of lighting at stone bay beach huts are let on a dawn to dusk basis so there is no reason to allow the supply of alcohol to 2200hrs. The nearest toilets are some way away and involve a walk up almost 85 steps. They

It appears obvious to me, as a former secondary headteacher in Thanet and Deal, that the ready provision of alcohol from 8am to 22pm, from a beach kiosk, is almost certainly going to encourage some people to drink to excess. Especially because the alcohol can be consumed on or off the premises.

There are over a half million alcoholics in this country, many of whom resort to crime or are guilty of social disorder because of their addiction. Easy access to the purchase of alcohol would clearly present many more challenges to people with this addiction. Many criminal acts can be traced directly back to the excess consumption of alcohol.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

Many public nuisance incidents arise out of the excessive consumption of alcohol.

This section of the beach is already used by many young people to hold parties set off fireworks and play loud

music. Having lived on Eastern Esplanade for over thirty years, I can testify to the excess noise and disruption cause during periods of intense heat, post examination celebrations and bank holidays. Annex 4

The provision of alcohol from a beach kiosk would undoubtedly encourage young people to drink more and to

congregate in this area more often. I and other residents would be subjected to even more episodes of public disorder.

Protection of Children from Harm

The provision of readily available alcohol, especially if it could be consumed on and off the premises, would be a great temptation to many children. It is well known that older youngsters will readily buy alcohol for younger friends, especially those of the opposite sex.

This would undoubtedly put some children at risk.

Public Safety

Finally, I am concerned for the safety of the many older residents of Eastern Esplanade, myself included.I am the Chair of the local Neighbourhood Watch group and we are dedicated to the concept of keeping local areas both peaceful and law abiding.

To allow the provision of a kiosk selling alcohol for twelve hours a day is simply asking for trouble and risking public safety in the Eastern Esplanade area.

On occasions (last season) the sale of food and the customers remaining around the kiosk and sitting around caused considerable congestion to people wishing to stroll along the promenade.

The granting of an alcohol license and the extension of the hours 10.00 to 2200 will cause additional bad behaviour in the evenings and an increase in noise. Already the area is subject to imprompt batheques and frowdy behaviour. Probably enhanced by the number of discarded nitrous oxide canisters (laughing gas) laying around to be cleared in the morning.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

Stone Bay is a quiet family bay in the main with many private and council beach huts on it during the season. These are used heavily during daylight hours although less so on cool evenings as the sun leaves the beach at about 1600 being blocked by the cliffs above.

There is a Toilet block provided by the council at street level above the cliffs. Additionally there is a single portable toilet at the eastern end of the beach for the exclusive use of beach hut owners and renters.

The council toilets are closed at 1800 each evening and the single toilet at the eastern end is closed to kiosk customers. This will lead to people urinating etc on the beach in the evenings.

Protection of Children from Harm

An environment where alcohol is served and consumed without the ability to segregate customers. ie by being within the premises own area is not good when the beach is used by many young children.

Public Safety

As previously mentioned the Kiosk has no outside space it is simply a converted shipping container. They presently put tables and chairs outside the kiosk on the beach side of the promenade and on the sand.

I note that they have just cleared the area behind the kiosk which which runs up to the cliff walls. The cliff is unstable and small/ medium sizes piece's of chalk and rubble frequently fall.

It certainly would not be a safe area to extend any eating or drinking area.

Until recently it was a quiet beach that attracted predominantly family groups that appreciated its low key nature. This has already been affected by the change in emphasis of activities at the kiosk, including the playing of amplified music, which I think is contrary to the local bye laws. While it's impossible to say that the sale of alcohol will definitely lead to crime and disorder it must increase that possibility. There have been outbreaks of alcohol related violence on Broadstairs beaches.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

The supporting notes say that the sellers of alcohol generally cannot be held responsible once clients have left their premises. This is Ath nex because how are you to define the premises? Two of the access points lead to quiet residential areas and there is a distinct possibility of noise and antisocial behaviour.

Protection of Children from Harm

This, and public safety are my main areas of concern. Children of all ages are at a degree of risk on beaches and need to be carefully monitored by their parents or guardians. The easy availability of alcohol has the potential for those in charge of children to lose concentration, putting their charges at greatly increased risk. The combination of alcohol and hot weather can be particularly potent.

Public Safety

My comments re the protection of children also apply to public safety in general. Hot weather and alcohol can lead to dehydration, poor judgement and and the undertaking of risky activities. The lifeguards do not need to have their work made more difficult.

I cannot see that this application has any merit at all, and if granted, I believe it will detrimentally change the nature of Stone Bay.

Availability of all-day alcohol could alter this as it is more likely to lead to people being disorderly and possibly to petty crime, which would cause a nuisance to families having a quiet day out. Over time, this may deter such families from frequenting this beach. Also, due to its remote location, should a disturbance occur, there is no-one to turn to for help.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

Stone Bay beach is considered to be a very safe environment for young children. It is also a safe location for lone adults wishing to walk along the beach in the evening. Sadly, people's behaviour is prone to change if consuming too much alcohol. My serious concern is that if individuals have easy access to alcohol throughout the day and into the evening, it has the potential to alter the environment on Stone Bay beach to the detriment of families, young children and adults alike. In addition, I'm concerned that with The Hut selling alcohol until 10pm, it will attract older teenagers and adults in the evening, leading to parties and loud music which would cause a nuisance to local residents, as well as those wishing to stroll along the beach in the evening.

Protection of Children from Harm

As stated above, Stone Bay is a guite location frequented by young children and adults during the day. It is as safe an environment as is possible in a public place at the moment but I have concerns that by selling alcohol throughout the day, The Hut could attract a different group of beach-goers which has the potential to have a detrimental impact on the safe haven for young families. I'm also concerned that it could attract older children to the beach in the evening and encourage them to consume alcohol too easily when perhaps they shouldn't (ie under-age whilst appearing 'of age'), thus making drinking too accessible.

Prevention of Crime & Disorder

I am the nearest resident to the premises in a house that includes 2 holiday flats and a Stone Bay beach hut owner. I strongly object to the granting of an alcohol to Stone Bay Beach Kiosk as it is likely to increase crime and disorder. The location is close to quiet residential housing. About 75m from our house and holiday flats and close to our beach hut. Where alcohol is involved, the possibility for illegal behaviour is increased. The increased numbers of people and vehicles, playing of music and the consumption of alcohol in the evening significantly raises the risk of criminal and disorderly behaviour. Stone Bay has often been used as a place for young people to gather and drink on summers' evenings. This has led to much unsociable behaviour in the past. I personally have had the wing mirror on my car ripped off by a pedestrian and strips of wood pulled off my beach hut to fuel their bonfires. The licence and consumption of alcohol can only increase these occurrences.

As the only toilets are at up a very long flight of stairs at the top of the cliff some 200 yards away and these are locked

in the evening there is a high chance of urinating in public with dangers of committing indecent exposure.

Acts of vandalism have occurred on the beach including arson of beach huts, the licence can only increase these occurrences.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

I am the nearest resident to the premises in a house that includes 2 holiday flats and a Stone Bay beach hut owner. I strongly object to the granting of an alcohol to Stone Bay Beach Kiosk as it is highly likely to increase public nuisance. Where alcohol is involved, the possibility for unsocial behaviour is increased.

The late evening licence will mean the kiosk opening late and as they have a Caribbean theme music is bound to be used to attract customers. As there is no inside area, this will definitely be heard by us and the other nearby residents of Eastern Esplanade and will affect our right to peace and quiet and enjoyment of our own homes, without excessive disturbance from others.

We have 2 holiday flats that attract tourists all year round with a near 100% occupancy during the summer months. Many of our guests state they like the peace and quiet. I feel that music, drinking and possible unsociable behaviour in the evening will have an adverse effect on the enjoyment of our guests and hence an adverse effect on our business and on tourist numbers.

The consumption of alcohol and playing of music on the beach in the evening will lead to noise and anti-social behaviour in local streets at a time when most local residents are enjoying quiet nights in.

We don't want to have to have our windows shut to block out the noise from both the beach bar and from customers wandering home, talking, slamming car doors and starting their cars.

As the only toilets are at up a very long flight of stairs at the top of the cliff some 200 yards away and these are locked in the evening there is a high chance of urinating and worse in public with dangers of committing indecent exposure and disease.

In a normal pub situation, the licensee will be vigilant for any unsocial behaviour or drunkenness and will take steps to stop things escalating, this will not be possible on the beach situation

As the premises is going to be open until 10pm the character of the premises will be changing from beach kiosk to a bar.

Protection of Children from Harm

I am the nearest resident to the premises in a house that includes 2 holiday flats and a Stone Bay beach hut owner and I strongly object to the granting of an alcohol to Stone Bay Beach Kiosk as it may be harmful to children. Stone Bay is very much a family beach but where alcohol is involved, the possibility for inappropriate behaviour is increased.

As the only public toilets nearby are locked in the evening there is a high chance of urinating or worse in public with dangers of committing indecent exposure and disease.

Public Safety

I am the nearest resident to the premises in a house that includes 2 holiday flats and a Stone Bay beach hut owner. I strongly object to the granting of an alcohol to Stone Bay Beach Kiosk as it is likely to be a danger to public safety. Where alcohol is involved, the possibility for reckless behaviour is increased.

The alcohol licence will increase the chances of customers swimming after drinking with the many dangers that includes.

According to the RNLI, alcohol and water don't mix. One should never go into the water after drinking. Alcohol is a contributing factor in many water related incidents as it seriously impairs judgement, reactions and ability to swim. Around 1 in 8 coastal deaths in the UK involve alcohol, and it is a contributing factor in many more water-related incidents.

The beach, sea and cliffs can be dangerous places if judgement is impaired by alcohol.

The sale and supply of alcohol will conclude at 21:30pm daily, allowing a 30 minute grace period before premises closure at 22:00pm.

Waste Management

Staff are responsible for the cleaning up of any flyers/rubbish/litter/bottles that have been left within the red boundaries of the attached site plan.

Staff will do a litter sweep covering the total are of the attached site plan at the end of each days trading

The licence holder and DPS shall ensure that the arrangement for the storage of empty bottles prevents unauthorised access to those bottles.

All tables and chairs are to be removed and placed in a secure compound at the end of each day's trading. This will ensure that they are not stolen or used as weapons.

CCTV

- 1. CCTV will be provided in the form of a recordable system, capable of providing pictures of evidential quality in all lighting conditions.
- 2. Cameras shall encompass the areas where the sale and supply of alcohol occurs (within the seating area of the red boundaries of the site plan.)
- Equipment must be maintained in good working order, be correctly time and date stamped, recordings MUST be kept on the hard drive and kept for a period of 31 days and handed to Police upon reasonable request.
- 4. The premises licence holder must ensure at all times a DPS or appointed member of staff is capable and competent at downloading CCTV footage in a recordable format to the Police and Local Authority upon reasonable request.
- 5. In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the premises licence holder or DPS must report the failure to the Police Licensing Officer within 24 hours unless the CCTV will be repaired before that time
