WITNESS STATEMENT OF

Faith In Strangers

We, **Jeremy Duffy and Richard Randles**, make this statement jointly, in the knowledge that it will be placed before the Thanet Licensing Committee as my evidence and that the contents of this statement are true to the best of our knowledge and belief.

Introduction

- 1. Our names are Jeremy Duffy and Richard Randles, we are the licence holders and designated premises supervisors of the music venue in Margate known as the **Faith In Strangers, 17 Ethelbert Cres, Cliftonville, Margate CT9 2DY**
- Faith In Strangers is a 350 capacity bar, kitchen, music and arts venue combined with a workspace for creative individuals and small businesses, based in the heart of Cliftonville, Margate.
- 3. For reference of Faith In Strangers general aesthetic and public image we have attached photos on exhibit FIS01.
- 4. Faith In Strangers does not operate like its predecessors Franks and Starlight, in that it also carries out cultural, artistic, community and business support activities. This includes supporting numerous local freelancers and small, local enterprises who use the venue as a workspace during the traditional working week. Faith In Strangers has supported the immediate local community by facilitating the NHS, PoW (Power of Women), Our Kitchen On The Isle Of Thanet (food charity) and lots more, for free. These activities are a strong part of the businesses artistic and social ethos, however, they do not generate revenue to enable the business to operate. Faith In Strangers' main income is generated by bar sales on a busy Friday and Saturday night.

Directors Background

5. On 11/1/18 Jeremy Duffy and Richard Randles incorporated Faith In Strangers Ltd. The pair had known each other for over 20 years, becoming friends at school and bonding over a love for all kinds of music. Jeremy's mother was a special needs assistant and then became a social worker, his father taught Karate in North London. Richard grew up in a family who fostered children in need, his mother a social worker and his father an engineer. Jeremy and Richard later went to college together with Jeremy going on to have a career as a touring musician, promotor and record label owner. Whilst Richard took a different path, working with Children's Social Services and doing outreach work with gangs in North London. In their mid twenties, Richard changed career and joined the London Fire Brigade as a Firefighter, whilst Jeremy opened a workspace, coffee shop and restaurant in East London. The business that Jeremy operated later became an initial elementary template for what they would open in Margate. It was on a recreational trip to Margate, when Jeremy and Richard came across the old Franks nightclub and started to make enquiries. Later in their journey they were joined by investor Thomas Twigg, who came from a background in marketing, technology and music.

Licensed Venue History

6. The licence to sell alcohol can be dated as far back as 1868, the Cliftonville Hotel served the affluent classes of the Victorian era, who would typically flock from London to enjoy their holidays and second homes in Margate. It had views across a public garden populated with statues, the Cliftonville Hotel was a landmark in Kent. After a few decades of declining popularity, the hotel sadly burnt down in 1952.

Background to Faith In Strangers cultural project

- 7. Faith In Strangers was founded in January 2018, by two school friends who fell in love with a dilapidated building with inspirational views and a long history of bringing people together. The 60's modernist building was previously the home to Starlight Lounge members club and more recently Frank's nightclub, but had been sadly forgotten and left to decay. By September 2019 the building had been refurbished and began a new chapter in its history, as Faith In Strangers.
- 8. As we all emerge from the troubles and tragedies of the Covid pandemic, we count ourselves fortunate that we are in a position to re-open to the public. We want Faith In Strangers to be a place where people reconnect; come with an open heart and a willingness to accept each other's differences and you will be welcomed.
- 9. As part of returning the building back to public use, we sought planning permission and a premises licence to suit the activities that we planned to carry out. As can be seen from this timeline, Faith In Strangers Ltd did not commit itself to invest so heavily in the building and area until after TDC had agreed both planning and licensing.

10. A brief timeline of that process follows:

21/2/2018 - Pre-planning meeting with Gillian Richardson (TDC)

20/6/2018 - Planning application submitted

2/7/2018 - Planning application validated

23/7/2018 - Meeting with Christopher Brown (TDC) to discuss soundproofing.

14/8/2018 - Planning permission granted

29/8/2018 - Premise licence issued

5/9/2018 - 20 Year lease signed

Response to Submission and representations

11. Main complainants (Flat 3)

The main complainants Ms Beth Pritchard and Ms Georgina Wilson-Powell, who own a home in the London Borough of Southwark see exhibit FIS11, bought their second home above Faith In Strangers around June of 2019 for £120k. At the time of their purchase, Faith In Strangers who are directly below their flat, had both planning permission and their current premise licence in place. The price of their 2 bedroom flat was significantly lower than the market rate, owing to the commercial premises below.

Ms Pritchards complaints have extended beyond Faith In Strangers, as she has also made complaints relating to noise from the cafe called Rendezvous, which is located below Faith In Strangers.

After Ms Pritchard and Ms Wilson-Powell had made complaints about both Faith In Strangers and Rendezvous, the freeholder of the whole leisure complex including the residential block, GE Bowra Group, generously offered £150k + legal costs for the purchase of flat 3 in order that they could move on. This offer was refused and a counter offer of £300k + legal costs was made. This heavily inflated price was refused by GE Bowra Group and was described as an opportunistic attempt to profit from the situation.

Letters of support

- 12. The notice TDC posted on the entrance to our premises stated "All representations must be in writing and be made within a 28 day period commencing on 21st October 2021 and ending on 17th of November and must be sent to: licensing@thanet.gov.uk"
- 13. This notice asks for representations to be made by email, it does not state any other prerequisites for representation. Faith In Strangers received over 130 letters of support of our venue, sent to the email address on the aforementioned notice.
- 14. We attach the letters of support as exhibit FIS03
- 15. TDC then proceeded to make efforts to deny that these letters could be included as part of the hearing based on formalities which were not consistent with their own documentation.
- 16. As far as we understand, TDC did not reply to a single letter of support to say they didn't believe the letters were sufficient to be a representation.
- 17. It should be noted that Faith In Strangers cares deeply about the regeneration of the area and as such, arrange to meet Louise Askew (Director Of

Regeneration) to discuss the matter. It was after this meeting that Faith In Strangers decided to refrain from announcing the Licence Review and Noise Abatement Notice publicly, as this would be seen by private investors both into Faith In Strangers and other local businesses, as a red flag. This meant that we were not able to gain wider support, create petitions or raise awareness by any means other than the letter on the door.

- 18. The letters of support gained the attention of local councillors Heather Keen and Alan Currie, who were invited to come and see the venue for themselves and were given the opportunity to ask questions about music and soundproofing. Both were impressed with the operations of the business and endorsed Faith In Strangers as a positive business within the community. Clir Heather, Clir Alan and Clir Rob Yates all wrote letters of representation to support Faith In Strangers.
- 19. In regards to the letter from Woodswhur in representation of Flat 3 complainants, they claim to have lived above Faith In Strangers two and a half years prior to its opening. This is plainly misleading; Miss Pritchard and Miss Wilson-Powell purchased Flat 3 in June 2019 and started renovating in July 2019. This should be compared with the planning and licensing for Faith In Strangers. Further, the first recorded complaint was received on 27/7/19. This was followed by complaints about a soft launch and halloween event at the end of September and October 2019 respectively. Then on 23/11/2019, complaints were made by email to us about the level of our music, yet in actual fact it was sound from the restaurant below Rendezvous, who were holding a wedding. Both Faith In Strangers and Rendezvous have been severely hampered by covid

whilst in their infancy, with lockdowns and restrictions meaning that oftentimes there were periods when the businesses were closed. However, now Faith In Strangers, Rendezvous and the new Black Axe Throwing venue are preparing for a busy 2022, we do wonder how the tenants of Flat 3 are going to deal with living in a Cliftonville Leisure Complex and their apparent buyer's remorse. In the tenants representation from Woods Whur, they have stated "Faith In Strangers changed its business model from a private members co-working space to a nightclub". This is inaccurate, as can be seen from the planning and licensing permission granted in 2018. However, during covid restrictions Faith In Strangers limited its business activities to mostly co-working, for legal, health & safety reasons.

Further, Wood Wuhr goes on to make reference to planning and licensing being granted for "spoken word poetry and academic talks". Again, this is misleading. Section H of our licensing application lists these activities, whilst sections E and F of the same application refer to live and recorded music. We have indeed piloted our inhouse spoken word night 'Loose Tooth', the book launch talk 'Long Relationships', along with the Margate Science Festival talk with Robert Macfarlane, the award winning author of 'Underland'. These events are loss making and thus carried out purely for cultural value.

The letter then goes on to refer to anti-social behaviour outside of our premises. It is important to note that we are on a main thoroughfare and many people, inebriated or otherwise, walk past our premises at all hours of the night, often in groups and often making noise.

In our planning and licensing applications, reference has been made to music being played most frequently on friday and saturday nights, thus 34 out of 20 weeks is not out of step with that original application, as has been claimed by Woods Wuhr.

It is claimed by Wood Wuhr, that the building's previous operations as a nightclub, as 'Franks', benefited from greater sound attenuation materials. Faith In Strangers refutes this entirely, see evidence relating to the use of best practicable means.

In response to the other objections.

Car Park

20. The adjoining car park is for public use and is not the property nor under the control of Faith In Strangers Ltd. We have CCTV coverage of the carpark and have not witnessed any of our patrons spending any length of time there, other than to access bike storage or car parking. The car park is often used by young people as a place to congregate, which has been the case long before the inception of Faith In Strangers.

Hand Dryers

21. In order to reduce noise break out via our hallway windows we have installed a second set of doors between the toilets and the windows.

Furniture Noise

22. We have installed rubber feet on the majority of furniture and will carry out the same treatment on the remaining. EHO is aware of this.

Increased Music since December

23. Ms Pritchard States: "Emboldened by the lack of sanction for their behaviour, the nuisance from Faith in Strangers has increased in its intensity since December." - However, Faith In Strangers closed from 17/12/22 until 29/01/22.

Family Moving Out

24. Ms Pritchard wrote: "As a consequence one family has moved out of the building permanently because of the cumulative effect of the sleep deprivation on their toddler and a further 3 families moved out temporarily until a resolution is found." If this refers to the owners of Flat 1 - we direct your attention to exhibit FIS04 which shows the leaseholder of Flat 1, Nigel Pope, selling to GEBG (Freeholder) for purely financial reasons. Note that the owner states "As a previous owner occupier, I was fortunate that the location of my flat meant that any noises from these premises were outside my property and did not affect me."

Klispch speakers

25. Ms Pritchard wrote: "Social media posts where the nightclub have twice promoted themselves by linking their speakers notoriety for 'pissing off the neighbours'". We were not aware of the company's tagline and do not purchase products based on such trivial aspects of marketing. In any case, it is fair to say that the tagline refers to the famous Klipschorn speakers invented in 1946, not the domestic Hi-Fi system that Faith In Strangers owns. It is also noted that these speakers are for an audiophile experience, meaning that it is for very high quality sound, with valve amps for colouration of sound. This is predominantly for listening to jazz, soul and classical music earlier on in the evening, akin to 'listening bars'' in Japan.

Not responding to emails

26. We have numerous email threads with the complainant spanning over 2 years. However after a particularly inflammatory and accusatory email sent from Ms Pritchard, we have been advised by our legal counsel to refrain from contact. FIS14.

Broken glass

27. We do not allow patrons to leave the premises with glass. However, we have found broken glass, cans and other rubbish on the streets outside our premises that are from products that we do not sell. It is fair to say that this is currently a wider social problem, which we do not contribute to.

Complaints from Flat 2 Cliftonville Court

28. We believe that the complainant, Ms Katherine Cox, does not currently reside at the address and may not even reside in the UK. Ms Cox suggests that her mother Ms Mary Strachan was complaining about the noise from Faith In

Strangers, however, we never received such a complaint and were only met with support from Ms Strachan - see her online review a few days after one of our first events.See attached image on exhibit FIS02 A

29. Ms Cox also goes on to comment that Faith In Strangers is negatively affecting the cleanliness of the area. We would ask for evidence of this? This is then loosely backed up by hearsay from her brother, who is yet to complain. Ms Cox then goes on to regurgitate the narrative created by the residents of Flat 3, surrounding Faith In Strangers soundproofing.

Dispersal

30. We have included exceptionally clear and prominent signage reminding customers to leave quietly. The below sign is a screen we designed for when patrons are leaving the premises. We use our lobby as a waiting area for people who have called for taxis. See attached image on exhibit FIS02 B

<u>Violence</u>

31. We are not aware of any violent incident outside and certainly not inside our premises involving our customers. Further, the only incident of police attending the venue was to meet with a female patron who had been using Faith In Strangers to shelter from a domestic violence situation. Crime Ref: KP-20211002-1403.

Public Urination

32. We have more than adequate facilities to mitigate this issue and would again raise the fact that there are numerous bars and establishments along this area; with that in mind, we would like to see evidence that these incidents relate to our customers.

Sound System Specifics

33. Our venue has been designed around having a large number of small speakers (25 x 35cm), as opposed to having a small number of large speakers. This method allows us to play music at a lower level, with greater coverage of sound and reduced need to increase the volume when more people are in the venue. In addition, we have a high fidelity stereo pair by Klipsch. These are akin to a large domestic stereo system, which are designed for listening to music at high quality.

Franks Venue was quiet/quieter

34. Frank Thorely owned several of the flats above the venue, including Flat 3, which he used to house his DJ's and staff. Franks operated primarily as a late night venue 4 to 5 nights a week. This has been confirmed by former management. Former patrons, staff and occupants of the flats above have described Franks to us many times, in the exhibit FIS05 a former patron states on public Facebook forums 'I lived in the top floor flat for 2 yrs....flat 11 I think... the whole building used to shake on a saturday night when Franks nightclub moved in" The level of soundproofing has been confirmed by highly regarded local contractor Techno Timber Construction, who carried out the work and wrote a letter of support annexed, from Kelvin Joy.

Flat 3 Lobbying other residents

35. We state that the objections of all but one have come from the flats above. There were 9 in total, that we believe were mainly instigated by the main complainants at Flat 3. Flat 3 have lobbied other residents for support as part of a campaign to show Faith In Strangers in a negative light, see exhibit FIS06 which shows the residents of Flat 3 attempting to gain support and influence the opinions of residents of Edgar Road Whatsapp group. We also note that part of one representation admits: *'I support my neighbours'*, which indicates the same.

Flat 3 also claimed that they had been able to use Shazam to identify which tracks have been playing in their flat. However, our CCTV shows Ms Pritchard and Ms Wilson-Powell ascending the ramp to the car park on the other side of the building, then crouching down by our windows and using Shazam with a phone held up against the window. We believe this to be quite a cynical method to record sound breakout. (CCTV footage available on request).

Operations

36. We strive to be the best and safest run establishment we can be, which means consistently updating and reviewing our operations, policies, strategies and risk

assessments. We want to put the venue and therefore Cliftonville on the map as a world leading project, with innovation at its heart.

Crime and disorder

- 37. The premises already have a robust operating schedule We attach a copy of the venue's operating policies and security policies.
 - FIS07 Operating Schedule
 - FIS10 Door Supervision Policy

Public Nuisance

- 38. The premises already have a robust Sound Management Plan and Dispersal
 - Policy. Attached as;
 - FIS09 Dispersal Procedure
 - FIS08 Sound Management Plan

Public Safety

39. The premises have been purposely renovated to the highest standards and are fully compliant with all health and safety and current Fire Safety Legislation. Annual certification and Fire Risk Assessment are available on request.

Protection of children from harm

40. The premises already operate a robust set of conditions in respect of the protection of children from harm, including a Challenge 25 policy and refusals book.

Best Practicable Means

41. When taking on the premises Faith In Strangers Ltd found a building that had been subject to years of water damage and delapdation. A method of soundproofing was specified and agreed to by TDC's environmental health. The scheme included a large suspended ceiling, doubled up (2 x 15mm) plasterboards, 100mm mineral wool and a large air gap before the flats above. The ceiling was suspended on a metal framework, decoupled with acoustic hangers, specified by industry leading Christie and Grey. In addition, upright pillars and several walls were treated in a similar manner. Whilst the speakers themselves are on purpose made rubber acoustic isolators to negate direct vibrations into the structure.

TDC set planning conditions in relation to sound breakout, which were met and surpassed in all tests. This led to the conditions being released prior to first operations.

Over and above these conditions, we voluntarily reduced the hours that our terrace would remain open by 1 hour, in order that less noise emanating from patron conversation would reach the tenants.

Further to the conditions, secondary glazing has been installed to the east side of the building and in the skylights to further reduce breakout from the venue, this was not a required condition but done so to improve on our scheme. The cost of soundproofing goes beyond £50,000.

Cultural impact of this application

- 42. The UK government has invested 1.57 Billion pounds into one of England's best assets, culture. The lockdown has given us opportunities to reassess, to become more progressive as a society and the regeneration of coastal towns in particular have seen a sharp increase in development that give councils an opportunity to shine through with progression, protective policies and planning that will defend the very soul of a thriving town or city.
- *43.* As part of the 1.57 Billion, Faith In Strangers received support from the Cultural Recovery Fund (Department for Culture, Media and Sport) for what they deem to be a project of cultural significance.
- 44. We are living in a post lockdown society and economy, the hospitality and cultural industries are facing their biggest challenge yet. They need as much support as possible and large markers need to be made known to future investors and entrepreneurs that Thanet is a place to invest.
- 45. In various documentation produced by both local and national government, hospitality, leisure, arts, culture and creative workspaces were stated as routes to regeneration and would benefit from public support in the form of finance and policies that enable, as opposed to hinder, businesses and projects that operate

in these sectors. This is particularly true in relation to the regeneration of coastal towns. Faith In Strangers took this into consideration and after receiving the fiscal support of Kent County Council in the form of an innovation loan, took over a position of the Cliftonville Leisure Complex, with the expressed aim of being successful in the aforementioned areas.

- 46. It's patently clear that for the organisation to be economically viable, busy Friday and Saturday nights with music and dancing are what generate the revenue. The money generated by the creative workspace is only ancillary to the main source of income. Whilst, sadly people don't tend to spend money when attending spoken word poetry nor academic talks - these are loss leaders for the business.
- 47. The cultural importance of live music in the UK is often overlooked. The export figures for UK music show that music is one of our country's biggest exports and one of London's foremost tourist attractions. Small independent grassroots venues have been subject to many attacks from NIMBYism and opportunistic land grabs. We believe that Thanet District Council should look at progressive planning principles, such as 'The Agent of Change' to protect venues from these risks.

Impact of Restrictions

48. Faith In Strangers management had been operating the sound system at a greatly reduced volume since the Noise Abatement Notice was issued. The impact of this led to customers complaining that the music was too quiet

causing many to leave, subsequent damage to the venue's reputation and earnings has been noted. The knock on effect of this has meant that staff hours have been cut and job roles cut off. The long term damage to the reputation of the brand is hard to quantify precisely but we forecast that it runs into tens of thousands of pounds.

<u>Wider strategies and policies - Tourism, the Night Time</u>

Economy and Local Planning Policy

- 49. The facts and data are clear on the benefits of a healthy night time economy, and we don't see any mention of this in any of Thanert's policies or strategic planning. A vibrant and mixed night-time economy encourages tourism and contributes to shaping places where people want to live. Nationally, the night-time economy makes a significant contribution both to the economy and employment.
- 50. TDC state in their Local Plan 2020 strategy;

'35. Strategic Priority 1 - Create additional employment and training opportunities, to strengthen and diversify the local economy and improve local earning power and employability

'Support the diversification and expansion of existing businesses in Thanet, with a focus on advanced manufacturing, emerging technologies, **tourism, culture and leisure**, **and provide the right environment to attract inward investment**'

- 51. Cliftonville is going through growing pains, businesses and projects like ours need as much support as they can get.
- 52. There's a major lack of employment and career opportunities in Thanet, that's also coupled with a lack of activities and venues to excite, attract or keep persons in their 20's living in the area. Young adults are a workforce needed to help drive the ambitions of Thanet and Kent's wider strategies and policies surrounding investing in and developing the arts, culture, hospitality, leisure and tourism sectors.
- 53. Faith In Strangers mainly hired young adults who grew up in Thanet, who showed ambitions of opening their own businesses. They are being trained to do this. We are fulfilling numerous local and wider strategies for Thanet, Kent and the UK and strive to be a positive and considered part of it's regeneration. We are also only operating at a fraction of what we believe we can achieve. Without obtrusion we believe we can reach a point of employing over 20 members of staff and many more indirect jobs, along with contributing heavily to the local economy via taxes, free space for charities and non-profits and creating the kind of environment that attracts inwards investment and for small businesses and the self employed to grow, therefore employing their own teams and further contributing to the local economy.

Music Tourism

54. UK Music published Wish You Were Here 2016 reports reveals the vast contribution of live music and music tourism to the South West economy.

- 55. The South East region generated £455 million from music tourism visits in 2015. This came from a total of 890,000 tourists which helped support 5,032 jobs in the local area. Cities and towns mentioned in this report attracting visitors within the area include Brighton, Oxford, Reading, Portsmouth, Southampton, Milton Keynes and the Isle of Wight. Since 2016 Margate has been significantly regulated and when the next report is undertaken it will form a significant part of the music and culture offer in this area. This is why protesting live music and cultural venues in Margate is so important.
- 56. A copy of this report is attached FIS12

Music Venue Trust survey of grassroots music venues

- 57. Faith in Strangers is an active member of the Music Venue Alliance which is a trade collection of the Music Venue Trust.
- 58. The music venue trust conducted a survey of its 500 plus members before the pandemic, and a copy of this survey is attached at **FIS13**
- 59. The key points that resonate around the whole grassroots music sector, is that as a rule live music and arts is underfunded, on its own venues such as Faith in Stranger arts program don't make a profit and often run at a loss. The other activities such as 'club' nights give us the ability to subsidise the arts offer at the venue, and this is the fundamental reason why reducing our hours or ability to provide live or recorded music as a result of this review would effectively result in a licence revocation.



Dear TDC licensing officer, and whomever else this may concern,

I am a journalist, novelist and screenwriter. I was born in Thanet, and went to school here. I come from a low-income family, and lived here before the area was regenerated. My goal, growing up, was always to escape Thanet. It didn't used to be a nice place; it was an uninspiring place to live in; there were very few positive role models; holding onto aspirations was difficult. I left to go to university in London. While in the city, I started writing for newspapers. Now, I write for the Guardian, the Observer, the TLS, the Spectator, the FT and others; I have a novel coming out next year with Hachette, Penguin and Harper Collins and a screenplay in development with Heyday.

I chose to come back to live in Thanet, seeing how the area was changing – and I don't mean the change that has led to there being more nice cafes and restaurants and yoga studios in the area; I mean the change that has made the area more inclusive – more inclusive of different races, of people of different sexual orientations, different aspirations in life. I chose to come back because I thought that this inclusiveness and openness to the arts and to the sciences, to studiousness and aspiration (which were all things that felt actively discouraged and disparaged while I was growing up here), would mean that Thanet now would be a good place to invest in property, to raise a family, and to – in the future – invest in the area.

Faith in Strangers is located in the building that, while I grew up, used to be Frank's. It is a symbol of the positive change Margate has seen. Frank's used to be the heart of Cliftonville, and represented a lot of what was wrong with Cliftonville – it was a violent place. Two school friends of mine, on separate occasions, were beaten up at Frank's by grown men because they were gay. I am mixed-race; as a person of colour – who felt a lot of hostility in Thanet growing up just because of my appearance – I never stepped into Frank's, not because of the fact that I didn't like the music, but because the nightclub felt like a more extreme extension of the hostility and aggression I saw on the streets during the days. My parents and I drove past Frank's often on Friday and Saturday nights on the way home from classical music activities I was involved in. Even driving on the road in front of Frank's in a car with the windows closed, the music was unbearably loud; the car literally shook (this is not an exaggeration), and my dad would have to slow to a crawl because of the drunk people in the road in front of the establishment.

I feel mostly proud stepping into the building now – proud of my hometown which has developed from being such a hostile place, particularly for children who were in anyway different to the norm, to being somewhere that is so welcoming. This change is all reflected in this one building. A site of violence for my friends has become a site of openness, celebration of the arts, accessibility and refuge. Faith In Strangers is not only a workplace, where people from all kinds of professions (professions this area previously didn't have representatives from – people leading in their fields, people engaging in and pushing the boundaries of creative industries, sciences, journalism etc), it is a community. For the first time in my life, I have felt welcome in this building, as someone who is mixed-race, quiet, and in the arts – and this is reflective of how someone like me now can feel in this town and district at large. Faith In Strangers is a part of the tapestry of this area we all live in, and just simply by existing, it is questioning how things were before; its doors are open, as are, I hope, the town's.

Growing up, I thought I didn't like night life at all. It's quite easy to think this way when growing up in a town in which the night life is representative of the worst kinds of people – the people who spit at your mum because she looks different, the people who bully kids who are trying to study, and the people who fear any sort of difference and are violent towards anyone not like them. It turns out, though, that I do like nightlife; I like nightlife that is not excessive, that doesn't spill out into roads, where violence and hardcore drugs aren't prevalent, where music is considered, and where conversation is possible – Faith In Strangers is all of these things, and more. Faith In Strangers hosts events and festivals that I never thought would come to this area, reflecting the town's new embracing of positive change, of difference and diversity, the arts, and education. It is finally a good use of this building that has quite a troubled and violent history.

I think that the support an area gives different types of establishments is a reflection of the sensibilities, priorities and trajectory of a place. In Totnes, a while ago, locals protested the opening of a Costa and the council, eventually, blocked the Costa from opening. In that event is reflected the character of Totnes – a place that cherishes and supports independent businesses and community. I moved back here believing that this area was on a good trajectory – that the establishments being supported were ones that would help this area continue to lead as an example of positive regeneration, that would show that the area does not abandon the arts even when the arts have done their bit in regenerating the town, that would continue to bring positive change, opportunity and inclusivity to areas in Thanet still defined by the opposite. I believed, moving back here, that spaces like Faith In Strangers – where festivals celebrating the work of women, and celebrating science and the arts take place; where nightlife is inclusive, considered and unobtrusive; where cheap workspaces mean people of all kinds of professions can live and work in this area, lifting the area up – would of course be supported, not threatened. Now, I worry that what I believe is true – that the support an area gives different types of establishments is a reflection of the sensibilities, priorities and trajectory of a place; I worry that the threat faced by Faith In Strangers is reflective of sensibilities and priorities that do not reflect my own, and that the trajectory of this area is not what it seems, from the outside and from the numerous articles written by the international press about this area.

Faith In Strangers is run by very kind people; they run the workspace and the bar – however, as people who are engaged fully in the lives and careers of their customers, who express genuine interest in the projects and futures of the people who use their space, they are involved in and lift up many individuals' businesses. As a writer, I cannot stress the value of this.

Had Faith In Strangers existed while I had been growing up in this area, it might have been less difficult for myself and my friends to hold onto our aspirations, which – at the time, particularly since we were all from low-income families, and had nothing around us to inspire us – felt like impossible dreams. When I was a teenager, I told a local librarian that I wanted to be an author, and she sarcastically said "good luck with that" and said that I'll end up back in Thanet. I have ended up back in Thanet, but being in Thanet no longer negates the possibility of being an author. I am back here as an author, knowing now that a place like Faith In Strangers – where any young person who says they want to be an author (or a scientist, or a journalist, or a musician) will find not discouragement but encouragement, role models and, likely, mentorship – exists I hope that Faith In Strangers can be supported from now on so as, at the very least, to reflect a community that is aspirational, diverse (and welcoming of diversity), and open.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing further to the Premises Licence Review of Faith In Strangers (FIS), 17 Ethelbert Crescent Cliftonville, Margate CT9 2DY. I am writing in my capacity as a local resident and user of FIS.

I was informed a matter of weeks ago that my workspace, FIS, was issued with a Noise Abatement Notice which triggered a Premises License Review. This is both deeply worrying and frustrating for a number of reasons which I've briefly outlined below. I implore you to take note of the implications of closing this space, and/or limiting its activities.

Firstly, I would like to introduce myself. I was born in Margate, and have grown up between Glasgow and London. The reason I chose to return to this town last year was primarily due to the growing cultural and creative scene – the galleries, the bars, clubs, coffee shops and inclusive spaces which are being born every week. The many residents I have met since tell me they were propelled by the same.

In the ongoing pandemic, a key consideration was finding a place in which to work and integrate myself into the community – **FIS has fulfilled this need entirely**. I work for the Public Interest Law Centre <u>https://www.pilc.org.uk/</u> based in London, but active across the country. We legally represent the most vulnerable people in society to give them access to justice. FIS has housed my work very successfully and allowed me to connect with local people - both old and new. Myself and my colleague are considering how we can grow our legal practice for local residents who require legal advice and representation, and how we can integrate this work with FIS's willingness to offer its space to community groups.

Should FIS be closed or restricted, it is not an exaggeration to say I will have to reconsider my location - I have a demanding job which I will not undertake at home. I will have to look elsewhere, and will most probably leave Margate.

Margate's Night-time Economy and Culture.

The actions brought against FIS are very reminiscent of the decimation of the night-time economy in London. In a report by the Greater London Authority in 2017, the following stats were recorded¹:

- London has 103 fewer nightclubs and live music venues than it did in 2007, a decline of almost a third.
- London has lost 35% of its grassroots music venues.
- According to the Campaign for Real Ale, London continues to lose pubs at a rate of 140 every year.
- According to University College London, London's LGBT+ nightlife spaces have seen a recent intensity of closures. Particularly at risk are longstanding venues and those catering to women and Black, Asian and minority ethnic groups.

I quote this not to be London-centric, but as a stark warning of what may come if Margate's nightlife economy is not protected by the Local Authority. It is no mystery why we are presented with such dramatic statistics – it is the direct result of nimbyism.² These particular residents are happy to reap the rewards of property price inflations due to a booming nightlife culture. Yet they are first in line to close down the very same once they are personally economically gratified.

The money brought into the local economy by this nightlife and culture must be recognised and respected. What research has been undertaken as to the percentage of local jobs which arise directly from these areas?

Homeowners, landlords and multi-property owners should not be platformed above this vital element of Margate's economy. If they are, it will only be a matter of time before those people who arrived in Margate to proactively contribute to a blossoming town, will leave.

I am writing to show my support for Faith In Strangers as a business, including their late night activities.

I work in the events industry, which was absolutely decimated during lockdown, and we, as an industry, need all the venues we can get to get back on our feet.

My own business, Soulsound School Limited, trains live sound engineers and supports all live event technicians throughout their careers. I also freelance myself, and am the Production Manager for Power of Women Festival, which takes place in Thanet in March each year, and the Ramsgate Festival of Sound, which takes place in September.

Without suitable venues, it is impossible to put on successful festivals – festivals which provide opportunity for local artists, musicians, and performers as well technicians and other "behind-the scenes" staff to earn a living. Festivals and events also bring people to the area, which is one of the reasons for the recent influx of new people to our Thanet towns.

Faith In Strangers is a particularly important venue for events in Margate, as they have invested heavily in suitable equipment. In fact, without them, the Power of Women festival would not have happened at all in 2021 as we were able to go fully online this year using their top of the range equipment. It is also a venue we will be using for live events for future festivals.

Having spent quite some time in the venue, I can attest (in my capacity as a sound engineer) that the sound system is, in fact, very small and compact. I also see that although they have some daytime business, it is the night time business that makes the whole venture viable.

The space has a long history of being a night time venue, which any new buyer of the properties above would have been aware of if they'd done their due diligence before purchasing.

I am also a resident of Edgar Road, and we have had no problems at all with people leaving the venue. Edgar Road is, indeed, noisy at night, but this has always been the case with the social problems we have around here and cannot be attributed to Faith In Strangers.



I have chosen to be based in Margate, and work from here (Faith In Strangers) in my role leading business development for our international client base that includes Warner Brothers, Apple TV, MTV, Dubai Expo 2020, The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Eurovision, Beyonce Tours, Lady Gaga Tours and many more.

My ability to do business in Margate is directly related to the fact that Faith In Strangers exists. Without this specific workspace and evening venue specialising in innovative live event technology and progressive cultural programming, Margate would be severely under resourced to cater for the new migration of digital technologists. This group can essentially work anywhere, but are seeking spaces that are at a professional level of design, comfort, community and cultural programming as they weigh up which location to settle in.

We need spaces that champion culturally diverse programming and allow for socialising, ideashare and economic development in the region. This is essential for ensuring the digital workforce keep spending their GBP in Margate, and are not taking them to London as a preferred location to socialise and engage in cultural activities.

I am a member of Faith In Strangers and it is with much distress and disappointment that I have learnt that its licence is under review and it is threatened with closure due to a noise complaint.

As a freelancer who works a lot from home, even before lockdown made it a more common occurrence, I have personally found Faith In Strangers a lifeline. Freelance work can be terribly precarious and isolating and to have a community of likeminded people who you can share ideas and conversation with, or even just share space with, is incredibly enabling and provides untold benefits both personally and professionally. Faith In Strangers is not just a business opportunity for its founders or a networking opportunity for its members - it is a support structure and a community and, at the risk of sounding slightly pompous, a place where you can find your 'tribe'.

It strikes me that Faith In Strangers is exactly the kind of place Margate needs - a space where strangers come together, encourage each other to be more creative and industrious and end up no longer as strangers but as colleagues and friends. It is a place that originates ideas and generates livelihoods. We have all seen how Margate's economy nose-dived over the last few decades and left locals in a wasteland of deprivation and unemployment. Now there is finally a buzz and an excitement about the place, things are happening again and these fledgling businesses and cottage industries need to be encouraged, not extinguished before they have even had a chance to flourish.

I'm writing to voice my support for Faith in Strangers, which I understand is subject to a Premises License Review.

I am an author and journalist (writing for The Guardian, The Financial Times and The Spectator, among other publications). I've been living in Thanet since 2016. I discovered Faith in Strangers at the end of a lengthy search for a workspace, and I have been blown away by what the management provide there. As a writer, finding a good place to work can sometimes feel like an impossible task, but Faith in Strangers has far surpassed my expectations on every front. I've found the workspace to be a welcoming and creative place that, thanks to the ethos fostered by the management, possesses a real sense of community without sacrificing its professional atmosphere.

The meeting room, where I have access to high quality microphones, has also been such a valuable facility. For my book, which is being published by Picador, I am currently in the process of interviewing more than 70 leading environmental scientists from around the world via zoom – being able to do this in a soundproofed room, with a high-speed internet connection and professional microphones has made this usually fraught process as smooth, stress-free and, ultimately, as productive as I could have ever wished it to be. I've also found the space to be ideal for face-to-face meetings with my editors, as well as other collaborators who have visited me in Margate. Comparatively, there aren't any other spaces in the area where I would feel comfortable conducting face-to-face professional meetings like these.

The sense of community that exists within the workspace also extends to the bar, after hours. I am a bit of a quiet type, so it's rare that I find a bar or venue that I feel totally relaxed in, but that's what I've found here. I don't know if it's due to the ethos of the place, the name, or the passion for culture and community that the management have managed to instil, but Faith in Strangers seems to attract positive, friendly people, and bring those same qualities out of everyone else who visits

To wrap this up, finding a space where I can work alongside and meet other passionate and creative people, many of whom are doing extraordinary things both professionally and for

the local area, has made a huge difference to my own work. It is the kind of space where ideas and inspiration just flow, and I've honestly never experienced this in a workspace before. If Faith in Strangers must close it will be sorely missed by myself and others. I also believe that this closure would be profoundly detrimental to the local community. Most of all, I'm most concerned about young local writers, who would lose this uniquely nurturing and highly accessible facility. In so many ways, there really is nowhere else like it.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing today in support of Faith in Strangers, Margate after the venue received an abatement notice in regards to public nuisance from noise pollution. The reasons for doing so I will get to, but first I think it's important to understand as to where I'm coming from, as I feel it's not only relevant to, but instead exactly why it would be detrimental to the reinvigoration and development of Margate to re-evaluate the terms of the premises licence at Faith In Strangers.

I was born in Margate and spent many of my formative years in Thanet. I attended Dane Court Grammar school and then studied art at UCA Canterbury before attending the University of Westminster. When I was twelve I took the first of what would become a long line of jobs in hospitality, blowing up lilos on the beach for people down in Thanet for the Summer. (Hold the violin; I had a machine.)

Ever since that first job, I realised the value of working hard and loved the way that hospitality allowed me to have my own money at a young age and gave me a real sense of community outside my family and school. The friends I made in my teenage years working in Thorley Taverns pubs I still see regularly today and have a strong bond with. Many young people in the area I know have had a similar experience with hospitality. Pubs, bars and restaurants are clearly critical to the economy of Thanet, but also to the development and wellbeing of young people gaining meaningful connections and being introduced to the workplace in a way that inspires confidence and independence.

During my teenage years, I also got my first taste of the venue that was to become Faith In Strangers, though you wouldn't know it at the time. The floors felt as if they were coated in tar, and the speakers would blare out bass so intensely you could feel it in your organs. I couldn't say much about the decor as I don't think I was really ever able to make it out for the clouds of smoke which meant visibility limited me to see even my own hands at the best of times.

This was Chaos, an under 18s night true to its name by its nature. Part of Franks nightclub, and most people my age will have memories of being there. Before that my parents remember the Starlight Club and the Bowler's arms, where I am reliably informed they spent many a night sat in lines on the ground performing the dance to 'Oops Upside Your Head' (I assume the floor was a little less sticky at this point).

This is a common theme in talking to anyone about the venues that have accommodated the youth of Thanet for generations, and people tend to light up when thinking about them and the times they have had in them. I never got to attend the over 18s part of the club on the first floor, as it closed shortly after I was old enough. The years following this I considered the boarded up old purple blot on the seafront which was Frank's in the same light as many other locals; a contributor to the degradation of Margate and Cliftonville in particular, an area in which you didn't feel safe at night. During the 90's I remember witnessing first hand the atmosphere of tension in Cliftonville in particular due to unemployment, alcoholism as well as racism and lack of opportunity. Cliftonville, an area which has some of Thanet's most beautiful town houses and once thrived on the success of people taking summer holidays at home in England, had become dilapidated. I remember the divide between local people and the increasing number of refugees being housed in the area as the London boroughs found it cheaper to do so here and Nigel Farrage gaining a seat in the town. I also remember the well documented increase of incidents of knife crime and other violence. As part of my job looking after students who came to study English here, I witnessed an incident in which the atmosphere of intolerance in Cliftonville led to locals violently attacking some students.

After leaving university, I, like most of my friends, left the area to find new opportunities. My area of interest was in Art and music, and at that time in Thanet there wasn't much going on in the Arts, and to make a living in that field, I would have to go to London or further afield.

In the end, I went to Australia and lived there for 8 years up until last September 2020. Here I was able to forge what became a career for me in hospitality. In England, I thought like many people that hospitality was a job that you had whilst studying or part time, one that was fun but ultimately didn't have much scope for progression.

By the end of my time in Australia I had been running a bar and restaurant and was inspired by how people were able to earn a good living through working in the industry. Because of the pandemic I was forced to move back home. My plan was to spend a bit of time here and then move to London. After living in a bustling community in Australia with so many opportunities in hospitality, I never thought that Thanet would be able to provide me with a career in the field anywhere near comparable, and I wasn't prepared to compromise on that.

During my time away I visited Thanet and each time was impressed by the improvements of Margate, especially the old town and the opening of many galleries, schools and Arts venues. I'm so glad that the investment in the Turner Gallery and high speed rail connections has sparked a regeneration in the area. Having been back for a year now I have been pleasantly surprised by the fact that many of my friends have started to move back to the area, partly due to the fact that there is a lot more to offer here since the late 90's and early 2000's. One of the positive things to come out of the pandemic is that many young professional people living in cities have re-evaluated what they want from life, and this presents seaside towns such as Margate a unique opportunity. Young professionals moving from outside the area have created demand for different tastes and needs which has in turn created new opportunities for locals to make money and boost employment.

For people such as myself, there is now a chance to use the skills that I have learned elsewhere to make a living right here in Thanet. If it were not for this regeneration in the area, I would now be in London or back abroad. Instead, I am now working at a venue that champions the Arts and Music, and does all in it's power to create an environment that's inclusive of all people from all walks of life, and has supported me in my personal development and my aim to open my own venue in the future. If I was told this would be the case two years ago, and that place was in Cliftonville, I'd have laughed.

Faith In Strangers relieved me from my time in lockdown, and after not being able to find any employment and claiming Universal Credit for the first time in my life, I took a chance on taking an interview for what I thought would be a bar job for a few nights on the weekend to keep me busy in April earlier this year. Upon meeting Richard and Jeremy, I realised that they shared a vision for what a hospitality venue could be, and what it could offer in terms of lifestyle to both workers and the wider community. Since May I have been employed full time by FIS, and have had the privilege to help mould our offerings as a venue, as well as being able to learn some elements of the business that I will need in the future when it comes to opening my own business.

I am now a manager at FIS, and have settled back into life in Thanet. This opportunity has allowed me to remain in the area and fulfill my desire to be part of something meaningful and unique. To me it is venues like this that offer an experience that breaks the mould and stands in stark contrast to the traditional nightclub format of debauchery and drunkenness that can really make a town special. Nightlife can generate huge revenue for an area such as Thanet, attracting people from all over England, but venues too often head down the route of what I touched on earlier; music louder than you can talk in and dark, dingy dance floors, with cheap drinks promotions, all of which contribute to not much more than sore heads in the morning.

Faith In Strangers is a place where great conversations can be had in a relaxing setting, with amazing cocktails and beautiful decor, and what's clear to me is that Jeremy and Richard have poured their heart and soul into the venue making no compromises in their vision. I have had the opportunity to be a part of some amazing events including (but not limited to) book launches, community talks and presentations as well as some amazing live music and nights where people have come to take part in experimental music making. This to me is the heart and soul of everything good about the changes seen in Margate over the last fifteen years. It's rare that you can pick out one place that can say so much about a town and it's potential for growth, but if anywhere, it's right here.

The last few years has been unprecedented in terms of its effects on the mental wellbeing of the general public all over the world, and I think most people have re-evaluated the way they feel about going out, spending money and socialising as the world recovers from the pandemic. For this reason I can't stress enough the importance of venues such as Faith In Strangers that offer a safe space to re-integrate and socialise once more, where everyone is welcome regardless of sexual orientation, gender or nationality. Faith In Strangers is one of the first venues in the area to offer something different to what many are used to in terms of hospitality in small seaside towns, and will certainly not be the last.

Throughout the summer I spoke to so many of our customers that had come from all over to see the venue, and had many great conversations with locals who love the venue and its unique offerings.

Having worked in many large bars open late at night, FIS has pleasantly surprised me in showing what is possible. On a Friday or Saturday night, you'll find FIS bustling with locals having a great time and dancing or chatting on the sofas. Our customers are lovely and always compliment the service and the cocktails as well as the fit out and it is a far cry from the former Frank's nightclub or any other venue for that matter.

During my years in pubs and clubs, my ears have taken a beating, and as a result, I suffer from Tinnitus. Because of this and other reasons I ended up quitting my job in Australia running a late night bar, trading it in for a restaurant where the hours were a little more civilised and I could hear myself think. Now at FIS I have the best of both worlds, as the music is always toned down so that conversation is never a chore, and as a result I don't have to wear any ear defenders.

It is for that reason that when FIS received a notice of application for review of premises licence in October I couldn't understand as to why this would be necessary. To my understanding the measures that have been implemented during the build have gone above and beyond what is generally required for sound proofing and Faith In Strangers has done everything within its powers to meet it's Licencing objectives. Not only does it keep noise to sociable levels, we have a strict policy on verifying I.Ds, and we encourage a responsible service of alcohol through our offering of low and no alcohol drinks, and making sure that patrons are required to adhere to based on mutual respect for the venue, it's neighbours, staff and other patrons.

If Thanet wants to invest in hospitality and tourism, wherein to me lies it's greatest chance to prosper socially and economically, this is exactly the place to start. Venues such as this offer a blueprint for increasing employment, and have offered a place for us to re-socialise in a post pandemic world. Now is the time for Thanet to embrace new opportunities as people rethink their ways of living and how they spend their money. Retail in Margate has been fading ever since the introduction of Westwood Cross and the demise of the high street in general as people change the way they shop. As a society we need to be reactive to changes such as this, and proactive in our efforts to look ahead and see the opportunities that lie before us.

During my time at FIS I have worked in the workspace during the day and met countless people who have moved to the area, citing its beautiful beaches, scenery and increasingly good restaurants and bars as inspiration. If we are able to continue to attract people like this from outside the area as well as encourage young professionals who grow up here to stay in or return to the area, Margate can enjoy the revival it deserves. Thanet is at a pivotal moment in time and we have to be forward thinking and encourage businesses like FIS as best we can to ensure that Thanet and the surrounding areas are able to provide a shining example of the potential for small seaside towns to offer a better way of living in the post pandemic era.

Having managed Restaurants and Bars in Australia, I have become acutely aware of how hard it can be to make money in the hospitality industry, and as the manager of FIS during service, I can say with absolute certainty, that it is imperative to the financial stability of the venue that we are able to continue to operate within the constraints of our existing licence. The vast majority of our custom currently comes between the hours of 1030pm and 1230am. This is, I think, due to the fact that we are a little out of the way in terms of a lot of the venues in Margate, and people tend to make it their last stop after visiting the bars on the seafront. Faith In Strangers has so much more to offer, and with plans for a kitchen and countless more cultural events, I am deeply concerned that if there were any changes implemented to our licence, it would affect all of our staff that we currently are able to employ, as late night trade is currently the only time we are able to get enough sales to financially justify the need for them. I'm also worried that without this trade, we will be unable to fulfill our future plans for the venue, and if this is the case, then the area will lose an iconic cultural venue which offers locals opportunities to showcase art, opportunities for employment and regeneration in Cliftonville as a whole.

It is therefore that I ask that upon reviewing the premises licence, that you are sure to balance the public's great need for venues such as this against any opposition, as I'm sure

that the former will vastly outweigh the latter. Thanks for reading my concerns and I sincerely hope that Thanet council will invest in this great and historical venues' potential.

As a staff member it concerns me that the venue is at risk of closure or having severe restrictions on our licencing which will have a direct impact on my livelihood. As an expectant mother and someone who is saving up to be a first-time home-owner keeping my job and being able to maintain working the number of hours per shift I currently do with our late licence is critical to me as no other venues in the Margate area offer this whilst also paying an hourly rate which is above the national minimum wage.

Not only am I concerned as a staff member but also a member of the community, I have always been local to Margate. I am passionate about preserving our local history having worked with Save the Margate Lido, a group invested in having the site re-developed into a multifunctional venue. In recent years we have seen some tremendous progress to the area, it would be deeply disappointing to see a venue close down so soon after opening, especially one as unique as Faith in Strangers. We are located on a site historically known for its nightlife, many of our customers are delighted upon arrival to see the old Franks nightclub refurbished and re-established as a late night, live music venue, a scene which sadly died off in the Margate area in the last few decades due to lack of economy. We have seen a huge amount of progress to the Old Town area of Margate and now Cliftonville is also improving after many years of neglect.

The last thing local people want is to see the site once again empty and stagnant especially as Faith in strangers still has so much more to offer, the owners are planning to function as a restaurant in order to offer even more to the community and ensure there is something for everyone to enjoy out of the venue. They are already operating by day as a shared workspace for many local people who work from home to have a relaxed office space, without this this would have a huge impact on many local independently run businesses. The night life side of the venue gives an opportunity for many artists to play again and also for people to enjoy again as the recent years in the pandemic majorly shut down the live music industry.

All in all, it is important to meet the needs of many rather than the needs of the few, a huge fraction of the local community relies on this space either for work, for downtime or as a safe space to dance and listen to music on the weekends. Dear Licensing Review Board and Thanet Councillors,

I am writing to express my support for Faith in Strangers (FIS) run by Jeremy Duffy and Richard Randles, which I believe has a proven track record of providing a platform for a wide variety of creative practices and enormous potential to continue bringing benefit to our community. I am aware FIS has been issued a Noise Abatement Notice and Premises Licence Review, both of which have the potential to jeopardize the venue's business plan and consequently close down the establishment.

Firstly as a professional sound designer and having performed at Faith in Strangers as a artist, I would like to comment on the quality of the sound system Jeremy and Richard have designed for Faith in Strangers. In distinction from other 'night clubs' the speakers at FIS are carefully calibrated to produce a high quality and broad range of sound -rather than just bass- which coupled with the interior acoustic treatments they have gone to great expense to install, creates a very carefully considered sound experience.

Beyond this detail which addresses the specific issue of noise, I would also like to highlight the need Cliftonville has for a cultural hub that integrates local charities, tech makers, and national talents. Faith in Strangers have only just had the opportunity to begin these activities -due to COVID restraints- and have a holistic business plan which relies on the bar and DJ night income to provide this. A good example of such an activity is their hosting of the POW! Thanet, Thanet's major annual multi disciplinary arts festival celebrating International Women's Day, who used broadcast facilities at FIS to stream their festival online free of charge along with contributing the cost of the British Sign Language presenter.

Secondly, I want to point out their openness to the community. As many community projects often don't penetrate real society because they are too specific and selective of their activities. Faith in Strangers have the proven interest and ability to intercross between communities and politics using art, design and tech as well as (almost more importantly!) food, drink and music to bring people together. We rarely see cultural hubs to cover all these activities; Jeremy Duffy and Richard Randles have found the way to run this adventurous activity with modest means but on an ambitious scale which could gain this unique venue in Cliftonville local, national and even international recognition. Such potential successes provide local residents with a platform to show their work and meet others and local businesses with potential revenue from tourists and visitors drawn to Clftonville by Faith in Stranger's activities.

Finally I would like to point out the original use of the building which Jeremy and Richard personally renovated to house Faith in Strangers was Franks Night Club which shut down in 2009. The building thus has <u>always been a music venue</u> which the neighbouring flat owners would have been aware of when purchasing and renting their properties. This is a national issue which is repeating time and again and is causing a key part of the UKs cultural scene

to disappear. I feel it is worthwhile looking at the Agent for Change principle introduced into UK planning in 2018. While this legislation specifically addresses new building developments located near music venues, it also does follow that a resident who moves next door to a music venue would, in law, be assessed as having made that decision understanding that there's going to be some music noise.

As a resident of Margate, as a creator and as a designer, I cannot express more strongly that to remove the licence of Faith in Strangers will be a huge loss for the local community but a huge investment loss from Thanet.

Jeremy and Richard are committed to work over the next decade to build a true culture hub which has the potential to put Cliftonville on the map -don't let this entrepreneurship and passion to improve our local area go to waste.

I hope my comments are helpful and a sensible decision can be reached.

I write to you as a member of the Faith In Strangers workspace, and also as someone who enjoys the social space, in support of the venue after their recent noise abatement notice and notification of licence review.

As a member, I use the space most working days (if not all), and rely on it for a comfortable, productive working environment. I work completely remotely and live alone and so there were times in lockdown where I did not see or speak to anyone for days. My work-life balance was also suffering, finding it hard to separate work and home life, and finish the working day at a reasonable hour.

It was, therefore, so very important for me to start my membership at Faith In Strangers as soon as I'd had both my Covid-19 Jabs. I moved to Margate not knowing anyone and, through Faith In Strangers, I have met some lovely people, all from incredibly interesting and creative backgrounds, with whom I can network but also socialise and make friends.

The impact of seeing and speaking to people every day, and perhaps having conversations which are not necessarily work related, are unmeasurable. Equally, I live in a basement flat, with very limited views to the outside and Faith In Strangers offers natural light with a stunning view and being close enough to the beach that I can go for lunchtime walks, even in winter. These factors are all so important and, without Faith In Strangers, I would genuinely be concerned for my mental health.

I moved to Margate because it is a vibrant town with links to art and culture and an active live music scene. These things are very important parts of my life and I wouldn't want to live somewhere that did not have this. It is also this which has attracted so many others like me, as well as thousands of tourists from different areas of the country - and beyond - each year. The new residents and the visiting tourists are fundamental to the local economy - contributing via council tax, inputting into the community, as well spending time and money with local restaurants, bars and entertainment venues.

Faith In Strangers is one such entertainment venue. Having previously been the home of Frank's Nightclub, the building has always been used as an entertainment venue. Faith In Strangers was always intended to be an venue in the evening, and, as such, the owners have done everything to adhere to planning regulations and limit noise disturbances.

They are also doing their bit to give back to the local community, ensuring that the majority of employees are local to Thanet or Kent, and by supporting local initiatives, such as the Power of Women Festival, by hosting art and cultural events and offering up the space for free to local charities and non-profit organisations.

It is also just a great place to kick back after work, socialising with new friends from the workspace membership, or to visit at the weekend and enjoy the Margate sunsets.

I am truly concerned that if this review is upheld and their licence is revoked that it will have a massively detrimental impact on Margate. If Margate loses venues like this, then I would seriously consider whether it was the right place for me to live.

It has been an incredibly busy and important year for science communication and at the Royal Society we have been at the forefront of providing government guidance on the science around COVID, facemasks and vaccines. Being able to have a workspace with business-quality internet capacity available to me whilst living in Margate has been incredibly important to me as I had a very limited internet capability at home. I have been able to run meetings and daily work/video and event management from Faith in Strangers. I would not have been able to do this without the ability to work from there.

Faith in Strangers has also been very important to me as a relatively new full-time resident in Margate. The social aspects of being able to meet and work with others who live in the area has really helped me to feel more settled in the town and the efforts of the owners to create a positive cultural space that is open and welcoming to all types of people is something I strongly believe is increasingly making Margate a resurgent town. It is vital to the wider community in Margate that places such as this are allowed to flourish and are encouraged as they make a real and positive difference to the lives of many people living in the area. It is places such as Faith in Strangers that have brought me to the town in the first place and in order to continue to restore Margate to a thriving cultural and welcoming town we need to support these ventures rather than threaten to close them down.

I hope that the Council considers the wider implications to the community and what this says about the new Margate that people are finally coming and investing in before rescinding the licence of Faith in Strangers.

I am writing ito give my full support for Faith In Strangers Itd.

My name is Thomas Ranger, I live in Ramsgate and currently work for Forum Birmingham / Percolate Live but used to work for Dreamland Margate as Senior Programming Manager from Jan 2018 - Dec 2020 and I am still involved heavily in Thanet's music scene with projects The Dance UK working as a music promoter for Ramsgate Music Hall.

Previous venues I was working for in London also had various issues with noise abatements and neighbouring complaints with a consistent risk of closure hanging over the founders and team. I know first hand how stressful and damaging to mental health this is to people involved working tirelessly early mornings to late at night just to provide a platform for the community to utilise, creating jobs and - as FIS put it - bringing people together (age, gender, sexuality, race) as one community. People who run venues aren't doing it for money, they are genuine community champions who wish the best for their community and understand how important socialising and giving young and old inspiration and ambition is

Usually late night venues would have a much greater impact to neighbouring residents in terms of disturbance because of the nature of what they provide, however every time I've been to FIS it's hardly even noticeable that it even exists - a blessing and curse for the owners! You can barely hear the music from outside so I can only assume this is from the neighbouring properties directly above, who I know moved in afterward the building was taken on and the license was secured with TDC. This may not be relevant, particularly because the whole complex has such a history of late night entertainment but this is a very common story of people moving right next to or above businesses and venues knowing full well the history and (normally) is part of the reason for moving in the first place. It's short sighted and selfish in my opinion to only care when this is directly affecting the complainer and not thinking of the wider consequences to the community (let alone the employees) and the legacy the area loses if the project closes abruptly.

I've found throughout my career that environmental health have always seemed to be very one sided in which they have not been adhering to the parts of the licensing act that states the department should show the recognition of a businesses economic, social and cultural impact. It seems clear to me that in this scenario an abatement notice swiftly followed by a license review is proof of my experience to be true.

As a person with 15 years experience in this world, I would hope my thoughts will be taken on board and that you will not consider giving in to pressure from an aggrieved neighbour who knew what they were getting into when purchasing the property - if they didn't, I would be extremely surprised!

Dear Thanet Council,

Upon hearing of the review of its hospitality licence, I'd like to offer my support to Faith in Strangers (FIS) on Ethelbert Terrace, Cliftonville. Without a licence, FIS would be under threat of closure and I want to share with you why I feel this would have a hugely negative impact on the area.

From a personal perspective, I have been a member of FIS' daytime workspace for nearly two years and have witnessed the growth of this venue, not only as a workspace, but as a diverse venue for music and the wider arts scene. Historically, this site has been a leisure and hospitality space – Rendezvous Restaurant, Olympia Café and Bugsy's Bowling are resident in the same building now and Frank's nightclub was where FIS is now for a number of years. Frank's, in particular, was an extremely busy seaside nightclub, with upwards of 1,000 people over two floors – quite a different noise and street impact to FIS single floor establishment with a completely different tone and purpose. I have witnessed the extensive soundproofing FIS has undertaken over a few years (likely a hugely significant investment) all out of consideration to the local residents and trying to reassure of their commitment to being of good character in the area.

FIS has become a genuine community to many Thanet-based workers in recent times, especially during the pandemic. With restrictions on travel and enforced separation from my colleagues, when it has been allowed to open, I cannot overstate how crucial FIS has been to my work life and personal wellbeing.

From a wider perspective, I think removing FIS licence would set an incredibly dangerous precedent that would threaten the prosperity and financial outlook for the area.

What happens if someone buys a flat above a busy seafront pub and complains about noise? Is that pub's licence removed? What happens if someone living opposite one of the well-established pub in The Old Town and complains about the noise? Is their licence removed?

In three years as a Thanet resident (**1999**), I've met literally 00s of people who've actually chosen to move to the area (and in many cases, bringing London wages with them), because of the development of the social, leisure and hospitality scene. They've invested personally and financially in Thanet, and in doing so making an enormous contribution through Council Taxes and supporting local businesses. Equally important are the people I know people **from** Thanet who've chosen to stay in the area for the same reasons, they feel like there's something for them here.

Some other pertinent points:

- FIS has provided free of charge meeting space to the NHS
- FIS has provided already employed a number of people in the area
- FIS members contribute hugely to the local economy, not least local shops, cafes, restaurants and bars
- I understand FIS has plans for a workplace mentorship programme for young people in the area

- FIS has partnered with the Power of Women and Margate Science Festival

If the area wants a thriving night time economy of bars, restaurants and nightspots (recognising that many of these venues open during the day too), then common sense judgement needs to be applied, **especially** when dealing with objections from the tiniest of minorities, and I hope FIS retains its licence.

As far as I can see the winter economy needs saving and the only injection that seems viable in my opinion is a healthy night time economy. These venues need protecting.

Faith in Strangers

I have lived in Thanet for fifteen years. In that time, I have studied for a PhD and a lack of local job opportunities would have forced me to move if it were not for Faith in Strangers. I am currently employed by Brunel University and can carry on living in Margate because I can use the facilities that are offered by FIS. The inability to connect to fast Wi-Fi would have meant me moving closer to Brunel if it were not for the facilities that FIS offer such as UNIFI. Being able to access their facilities does not only allow me to overcome connectivity issues it allows me to alleviate the negative impacts that working from home has on my long-standing mental health issues that are a consequence of complex PTSD.

For several years while studying for my doctorate I was exempt from council tax, and it would be a shame to move now I can repay the investment that Thanet has made in my education because of the lack of infrastructure in Margate that is symptomatic of coastal towns. I do not want to leave but if I cannot connect digitally to my workplace, I will be forced to move. I pay council tax and the money I spend in the local economy would be lost if I had to relocate. It is now perceived that Margate is within the computer belt but the lack of investment in things like UNIFI that FIS offers will cause issues as more pressure is put on local connectivity. Withdrawing the license from FIS is a short-sighted remedy to an issue that needs to be considered in a wider community context.

I am writing regarding the License Review (and related Noise Abatement Notice) that has been issued against Faith In Strangers. I would like to wholeheartedly support Faith In Strangers in this matter.

Margate, and the wider Thanet area, has a vibrant and growing nightlife economy, and it's vital that the industry is supported by the council - it is a very significant employer and engine of local economic growth, and a major part of the draw the area has in terms of both tourism and folks choosing to live here.

In this case, and potentially more in future, a resident who has moved in near to a venue operating within the terms of their license (and operating a well defined dispersement and noise management plan), objected to the operation of that business, and is now threatening many jobs and economic benefits to local suppliers and businesses. As I'm sure you're aware, Faith In Strangers operates as a community hub and space for charities and local groups to meet and work (such as the use of the space for the recent PoW festival), and this work is supported by them being a thriving business on weekends - it would be a terrible shame to lose the faculties they are able to offer because of the objections of one neighbour who were aware before moving in that they were purchasing above an entertainment complex.

We are writing in support of the above business, Faith In Strangers in respect of their forthcoming License Review.

Whilst we are sympathetic to the concerns of local residents, we have experienced first hand both here in Thanet and in London how devastating noise abatement can be to local emerging and fully fledged businesses and their economies.

The potential negative impact cannot be underestimated because of the way in which local business eco systems evolve and the individual businesses and people support each other directly and indirectly.

Faith In Strangers, operating both during the day and night would seem a perfect example of this, feeding into the local economy in a variety of ways.

Through offering a diverse range of services from daytime meeting and work space to recreational evening events, they offer something for local people of all ages.

To achieve this FIS employ a variety of staff, both skilled and unskilled from the surrounding area and have created a unique and successful business mix.

In the 'always on' economy we all now inhabit, this isn't easy but it's vital for the future of the area that local business continue to prevail and even more so in these uncertain times.

As we said at the start, whilst we are sympathetic to the impact on locals of any business, whether it be the arrival of the Tesco HGV to unload cages of goods or the local store that opens their shutters at 6am, when you move next to/live by a business you do so knowing there will be noise and the potential for disturbance.

Consequently we must put our support behind the continuation of FIS as a business in its current form.

My name is Will Donoghue and I am a freelance graphic designer and a member at Faith In Strangers in Margate.

I just wanted to put forward my thoughts on the current situation regrading the Abatement order at Faith in Strangers and give you some context on how this venue impacts my life.

I currently live on) with my wife Phoebe and 1 year old Etta, we have been living in Margate for four years all over, from Trinity Square to Prices Avenue and like many moved from London to find a better way of life for our family.

I joined Faith in Strangers in October 2019, at the time I was working for a company based in Asia in the footwear industry, working remotely on my laptop from local coffee shops. My wife was working at Walmer Castle in Deal and between us we were not meeting many new people so I decided to join a co-work space to treat as a base and to hopefully meet some people with similar interests. Since joining my entire social circle in Margate has been formed through Faith in Strangers, it has meant that I have worked collectively with others on projects professionally, go for lunch and meet up on the weekend with new friends I have made and frequent the building daily to work and to get out of the house. To be quite frank I would be lost without it.

Over the pandemic it was very hard for us having a baby and not being able to socialise or leave the house, no NCT or help from family was tricky for my mental health and Faith in Strangers provided a space I could work from with no distractions, provided friendly faces and conversation and was a massive help in keeping me sane through a very trying time.

This summer myself, wife and baby spent a few months back in our home town Cambridge to share some time with grandparents, uncles aunts etc. We were thinking about potentially moving back there to be around loved ones. After 1 month we really missed Margate and for me personally Faith in Strangers was a big part of what I was missing. Needless to say we decided not to move back to our home town and made the decision to stay in Margate and raise our family here. We are now to looking to buy a family home in Margate after selling our previous house on Prices Avenue. We currently live and rent on Dalby Square and our flat looks out on to the building where Faith in Strangers is based, we have seen no trouble and experienced zero disturbances from the venue and it is fantastic to be so close to a place where we can pop in for a drink to meet friends on the weekend.

I'm truly confused about the abatement order that has been issued, it seems to me that Jeremy and Richard (who run the venue) could not have done any more when it comes to considering others. They took a closed public space once used as a nightclub, refurbished it with their own money to and incredible standard and now provide a space for cultural, social, professional purposes employing local staff and being welcoming to all. Surely Margate needs more spaces like this? I must be missing something?

This space is a massive reason so many people (not just me) are able to work from Margate, live in Margate, pay council tax here, shop here, eat here etc etc.

The list is endless of how this space benefits Margate and the people who live here and frequent it. It seems a real shame that there are noise disturbances to those living above, I can empathise that if living above the venue there may be vibrations and noise from below. However, is this not going to be the case if you live in a space above a venue designed for the community? Surely it must have been much noisier when it was a night club? Perhaps this should have been considered by anyone buying above such a venue?

Faith in Strangers has genuinely impacted my life in a positive way, it's given me a place to work, new friends, a place I am proud to show others professionally as my working spot, it's supported me through the pandemic and even helped me to decide not to live near my family and hometown but to choose Margate as my home. My family love Margate and all it has to offer, Faith in Strangers has played a large part in this for me.

I'm very happy to discuss further, or not, but wanted to put forward my views.

I hope that potentially collectively the council can look at this case with a sensible perspective, seeing the huge negative impact it would have in closing such a venue, not just to me but to the rest of the community that has been built around it. Without evening trade on the weekends how can a space like this expect to survive, it's a miracle they weathered the storm of the pandemic, it would be such a shame to see this place disappear and I believe it is an inspiration to new businesses in the area setting the bar high.

I have become aware of the issues that Faith In Strangers and Thanet District Council are having with neighbouring residents. I understand that this has led to a Noise Abatement Notice and triggered a Premises Licence Review. I would like to show my support for Faith In Strangers and all other businesses that may be affected by this type of issue.

I am a professional Engineer/Technologist working across industries e.g. defence, art, education and across disciplines e.g. software, electronics, prototyping and innovation. My accolades include a Scientific Achievement Award by NATO Science & Technology Organisation and I held an official World Record due to a project I delivered for Sony. I have been running my own technology company for almost ten years, half of those from Margate where I also run Thanet Technology group with monthly socials, skill-sharing and educational events for free by our network of enthusiasts.

I was one of the earliest members of Faith In Strangers and used their daytime facilities for my day to day work. Until they opened their magnificent facilities workspaces were very limited in Margate. Sharing studio space with artists, hot desking in another business' office or working on my kitchen table did not really offer what I needed. Faith In Strangers supports scores of businesses by offering unique venue very well suited to freelance knowledge economy workers and a varied and vibrant community of entrepreneurial ambition. That community is beginning to make it possible for people to move here to live ***and*** to work without keeping one hand in the pocket of another area.

Faith In Strangers offer extends beyond workspace with their cultural programme. They supported our Raspberry Jam event where we had lots of electronics, coding and Raspberry Pi computer experiences for children. This was free, supported by enthusiast members of Thanet Technology and Faith In Strangers was an excellent venue (not only because it was offered for free). Remarkably, although there are hundreds of these events around the world, this is the only one to have run in Kent. Venues such as Faith In Strangers, when operating as they do with a strong community-mantra have a lot of hidden influence and potential.

They are also encouraging others to open their own workspaces to cater for various workers' requirements. Dear TDC Licensing Officer,

I'm writing today to voice my concern about the upcoming Premises License Review for Faith in Strangers. I am was born and have lived in Thanet for 59 years. As a local person from a working class background who has made a successful career in the arts, I hope that my testimony will be helpful to TDC in assessing the benefits that this organisation brings to the area.

(I've been told you need some basic information about me, which follows below) My name is Paul Hazelton and I work as an artist. My work has been exhibited internationally, including at the Museum of Arts and Design (New York), Thomas Olbrecht Collection: ME Collectors Room (Berlin), and Guildhall Art Gallery (London). My work has also featured in several exhibitions at Turner Contemporary. My full address is

As a lifelong resident of Margate, I've witnessed the regeneration of the area over the past decade. I've seen the difference that the influx of new investment and businesses has made to local people, not least of all, to young people. In the 1970s, when I was growing up, educational opportunities for people like myself, who were interested in the arts, were virtually non-existent. In the 1990s and early-2000s, when my daughter was growing up, things had barely changed. Now though, Margate has become a place uniquely situated within the British cultural scene: possessing a world-class contemporary art gallery, a vast network of smaller, satellite art spaces, an art school, internationally acclaimed artist residents, and a community that largely embraces the arts. There are also now far more opportunities available to young people in a broad range of sectors beyond the arts, thanks to the economic uplift provided to the entire area.

At the heart of all these successes, I believe, has been a close working relationship between Thanet District Council and the local arts and cultural scenes. I've seen this, first-hand, during the work I've done myself to develop the local art scene. In 2002, I founded Limbo – an artists' studio and gallery space located within the old electricity substation on Margate high street – which I also managed for over a decade. Before this, I was on the founding group committee of Margate Rocks Art Festival, and was its exhibition coordinator in 2003. More recently, I've also made an effort to exhibit my own work at local, non-arts venues, to encourage public engagement with art outside of the confines of traditional gallery spaces.

So often, throughout my involvement in the local arts scene, Thanet District Council seemed to understand the value of the arts and the economic benefits they attract, especially within deprived areas. However, I believe that the Premises License Review of *Faith in Strangers* represents a colossal misstep in this regard. Not only is it a backwards step for the local arts scene, but a loss for every resident of Cliftonville, who stand to miss out on the broader economic uplift that an organisation like this brings to an area (as has been demonstrated time and time again, over the past decade).

I cannot imagine the difference it would have made to my life if I'd had access to somewhere like Faith in Strangers while growing up. But I can look back and tell you what came before it. More specifically, I remember the violence that spilled out onto the streets on Friday and Saturday night when the space was called 'Franks.' I remember the deafening sound of the music as I drove past, and the weary faces of local residents who had to put up with this as part of their daily lives.

Faith in Strangers could not be more different to this: a friendly atmosphere and carefully curated music, played at a reasonable level (and at a fraction of that at Franks). Add to this a cultural programme of events and exhibitions (not only within the arts, but the sciences and other fields, too) that entertain and educate, and draw visitors to a corner of town far off the typical tourist trail. Then, during the day, the space transforms into

an affordable, accessible workspace for people of all professions: the kind of resource that has been proven, especially in the current, 'work-from-home' era, to improve the mental health of users enormously.

That anyone from the local community can so easily access all of this from one organisation is something that Thanet District Council should be celebrating, rather than jeopardising, and I sincerely hope that your licensing decision will reflect that fact.

I am writing to you in support of Faith In Strangers (FIS), one of the most innovative and professionally run venues I've come across. I have visited as a patron, as well as hosted two after show events there for the recent Dreamland concerts I put on. It is no overstatement to say that Faith In Strangers is a shining light not only for Cliftonville but in all of Kent.

I'm in charge of organising events in Kent with Live Nation UK and a director of Last Dance Festival, Funk & Soul Weekender and Soundcrash concerts, plus am currently being consulted by my company on investing in larger venues in the area.

I have around £1m-£1.2m budget for concerts at Dreamland in 2022 with a pending partnership with FIS along with numerous other plans in the pipeline, however the news of Thanet potentially restricting FIS's license seems to send out warning signs over whether music destinations are important to the local economy and certainly makes me consider my own long term views on investment. I personally think that Margate is at a crossroads, it could become a key music destination within the UK. Something that other councils that I currently work with spend millions in trying to achieve.

I was and still am increasingly surprised and deflated by the news that Thanet could issue a planning and license permission and then back out of it, and in particular to a building with such history and obvious commercial and leisure use. Hampering a business such as this sends alarm bells. I would highly recommend using FIS as a way to promote Thanet and market to future investors and it seems to me to be the type of business that the local council should be proud of and support.

(On more than one occasion someone from my group has asked the venue management to turn up the volume. It is a venue that you feel very safe in, which as a woman is a hugely important factor when choosing a place to socialise. My colleague is one of the owners of faith in strangers and has been known to me for many years as we are based at the same station. He told me good things about Margate and definitely a factor in me moving there. He told me how inclusive Margate had become and more multicultural, with an array of restaurants and chic coffee shops not too dissimilar to London.

Since being in Margate I have seen this to be true and have enjoyed my experience so far with exception to the lack of recycling facilities available for regular household items within a fairly close proximity. This along with the eyesore of over spilling bins awaiting collection.

So Faith in Strangers has been perfect for me. Being a writer, I need someone that is quiet that allows me to focus, but I also find that sitting by myself all day can be a bit isolating at times. Faith in Strangers allows for those little chats while making a coffee or having lunch, the sort of working environment that I've found really lacking as a self-employed person when I do try and work from home. The rates are extremely reasonable, and the flexible hours and welcoming space really allow me to get on with my work. I've found it a very productive, inspiring place to be since I've joined, and I had really hoped that it would be available to me for many years. It's also been a great way to get to know people in the local community.

A bit about me: I work for a wide variety of newspapers and magazines, including *The Guardian, The BBC, The Atlantic* and *Granta.* My first book, *The Kings of the Yukon*, was published by Penguin in May 2018, and tells the story of a four month canoe trip across Alaska, examining the decline of the king salmon and exploring how that decline is impacting on the many communities, and the ecosystems, which depend on it. I was especially surprised that the impact of this visit resulted in me moving back to the area permanently.

Richard and Jeremy have grown Faith in Strangers from humble beginnings, delivering upon all their promises of such a unique, multi-use venue. They have navigated the closures brought about by the pandemic, continue to provide a far-reaching community platform, and offer enviable event programming of all varieties.

As a business owner myself, something that they don't advertise is the support they themselves provide for local businesses. For myself and many others like me, it is often the first port of call when seeking advice, feedback, and collaboration. Faith In Strangers is an amazing workplace, with very warm and supportive colleagues, manager and owners. I feel very lucky to have been offered a job here through an old friend who is currently the manager. Over the past year I have suffered a lot with my mental health having to be stuck at home for a long-time careering for my sister who is extremely vulnerable, having almost died from covid 19 last year. Once my sister had improved and my mother received more support for her care, I started to look for work but after many months no avail, until Faith in Strangers had a position available, and I can honestly say, being back to work and working in an environment like this has had a dramatic positive effect on my mental health.

Faith In Strangers as a business is one of the most exciting opportunities in the local area, offering a warm inviting workspace, exciting bar with a great drinks menu and a venue space which has been used for a number of events, including birthdays, wedding parties, anniversaries and live music. Since working for FIS, I have heard no negative feedback about the venue, if anything the complete opposite, many of our new customers are there by recommendation, and are thoroughly surprised to find us and what we have to offer. As FIS is only open as a bar Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, my hours for these days are crucial to keeping me financially stable, and if our music were to turned off after 11 then people would not wish to visit our venue and the lost in customers would mean earlier closing and therefore less hours for me, which simply isn't an option, it would eventually put me out of work because I could potentially loose up to 12 hours a week. Most of our customers choose our venue for its later opening hours, making our most profitable time later in the night but recently I've been noticing an increasing number of customers asking staff or the owners to turn the music up and then leaving when they owners feel restricted due to this current situation and can't do so, having a hugely negative impact to the business.

Please understand the impact that this will have on the business and to the people that rely on this business to live, also to the impact on the community denying them the experience of amazing venue with so much potential.

I've just heard some rather sad news, and resultantly I'm writing after being informed by some friends in the Margate community that Faith in Strangers is at risk of losing its license and subsequently, I suppose, it's ability to trade full stop.

I'd like to make it clear that I have no personal affiliation with the venue and would rather you keep my correspondence private altogether. Whilst not directly related, I do however feel an affinity to the venue, and a sense of sadness crept over me when I learnt of its possible closure yet it's with my own interests, I'm rather more concerned.

I keep a very keen eye on the Margate scene and regularly enjoy the burgeoning culture that has been bubbling away for some years, and before the sudden revival in the area 'Franks nightclub' that was FIS's predecessor. Although years of sea air and low trade clearly took their toll, Franks was a wonderful place to meet locals and let off some steam and enjoy oneself into the early hours.

I'll get to my point. I run a very successful establishment in East London and we have been keenly looking into the feasibility of opening another venue in Margate.

We have used the FIS co-working space extensively since it opened and through it, have been fortunate enough to meet many wonderful local artists (some of which we have brought to perform at our London venue), as well as many small business owners and charities with whom we planned to work.

The uncertainty surrounding the future of FIS as a physical entity, and moreover and perhaps more pertinently, the diverse community inhabiting it, has given rise to some serious concerns as to the viability of our proposed endeavours.

In a similar vein, we would be looking to establish a nightlife entertainment venue which would operate at a very similar level, in terms of quality, ethics and safety as FIS.

We have run and now owned venues for years and it's concerning that if a safe and well managed space such as FIS is at risk of potential closure, despite what I hear is an almost overzealous approach to crowd and patron safety, what would stop the council imposing similar rules on business following suit.

Can someone in planning please call me on Monday to put my mind at rest and shed some light on the situation. The rumor mill is rife and I don't want some second hand news ruining our opportunity if it's nearly hearsay.

I hope for the guys at FIS it is, I have only met them once but they seem jolly nice.

I hope this email finds you well. My Name is Nigel Patrick Cruttenden, I live at Chapel Hill Close, Margate. I am a self employed Business Technology Consultant

I am writing in support of Faith In Strangers for which I use both professionally and for recreation purposes.

The reasons, I choose to rent space at Faith in Strangers, was it offers a wealth of advantages for the self employed, including networking opportunities, daily structure, and increased productivity.

Here are 9 bullet points, in no particular order, of the benefits achievable at Faith in Strangers

- 1. Networking and community events
- 2. Reduce loneliness; increase connection
- Access to shared and private spaces
- 4. Flexibility and cost savings
- 5. Remote access
- 6. Enhanced productivity
- 7. Breaking out of your comfort zone
- 8. Wellness and work-life balance
- 9. Bring structure to your day

These benefits of course depend on your business needs.

Until the pandemic I used to rent an office at Discovery Park in Sandwich, but with restrictions I found this was not viable. After Lock down I need to get out of my home office for my sanity and chose to go to Faith in Strangers. This had an economic benefit to me, as it was cheaper in rent; and my travel costs and carbon footprint were vastly reduce. This was important to me as being self-employed I was not entitled to any grants from any of the covid schemes. If Faith in Strangers closes due the consequences of the review I will again have to find other office accommodation or go back to working alone in my home office.

I have used Faith in Strangers for recreational purposes for networking and relaxation. I am sure that the licensable activities help to fund the drop-in workspaces and should be allowed to continue.

The closure would bring not only financial problems for the owners of Faith in Strangers but cause business difficulties to the small business community who benefit from the share offices space.

I remember before Faith in Strangers it was "Frank's Nite Club" and it was a constant problem of disorder at closing time. The Music played there was a far louder then than it is now. I don't recall noise complaints then. Since Faith in Strangers opened I do not recall hearing of any public disorder offences being associated to the premises.

I appreciate that noise can have a negative effect on health or the quality of life. People tend to be more sensitive to noise at night, when there is likely to be less background noise. If I was a key worker on night shift and lived in Marine Terrace would you close the arcades on that road because they kept me awake during the day? Taking this to it logical conclusion would you restrict or ban the ringing of church bells or silence the chimes of Margate's iconic Clock Tower if a person complains?

People move to Margate, to take advantage of our lower house prices, should do their research first before buying, to find out about the neighbourhood. There are reasons why a flat commands a lower price in one part of the town than others areas.

Remember any decision you take in regard to licensing matters you could be setting a precedent, which could have ramifications to the town.

It has come to my attention that my workplace /office is under threat of closure. This has come about due to Thanet Council licensing issuing a nuisance order, unacceptable noise levels license revue.

I operate a Buildings Structural CAD draughting Service and was previously operating out of my office in London and occasionally coming down to Broadstairs but it was never feasible or practical for me to operate from Broadstairs or Thanet as a whole.

I did search for a suitable office but there was nothing available. By chance a friend of a friend recommended inquiring at Friends In Strangers, who were just starting up in Margate. On the first visit it was clear that this was a very different office set up and the plans to grow their business were/are extremely positive and beneficial to the area.

Because Friends in Strangers offer a very high-level office environment it prompted me to move my business and myself down to Broadstairs and this is now my base. Over the following months I've watched Richard and Geremy transforming a very rough building space into a very high level office environment attracting a high level of innovative and creative business people (many of whom have now relocated to Margate). providing invaluable contacts for my business; their attention to detailing making sure everything is compliant, environmentally friendly and properly sound proofed within the limitations of the buildings structure in this particularly neglected and delipidated part of Margate is commendable.

I also understand that the person making the complaint recently purchased their property at a very low cost and in my opinion looking to make a profit in the future, this is fair enough however they would have been well aware of the fact that they were purchasing above an entertainment venue (that was previously a dedicated nightclub) and as such there would be an increased noise level.

The nature of Friend In Strangers is to provide a working space during the day and also host cultural events in the evenings and the weekends, making the business viable as a whole.

I've attached the Margate investment plan for those who have not read it, and basically Friends in Strangers fit directly into that plan and also feature in the plan above.

In a nutshell Friends In Strangers are:

Investing in and making use of what would be just another run down building in a run down location.

Bringing innovative and creative people into the area.

Hosting music and cultural events that attract people into the area.

Bringing businesses like myself into the area.

Bringing investment into the area.

Supporting other businesses in the area.

Attracting younger professional people into the area.

Advertising and spreading the word that Margate and Thanet as a whole is progressive and open for business. I also believe they are involved in various community projects.

I have been a resident of Margate for 14 years, although I was a regular visitor for 4 years before my move, so I have memories of 'Franks Nightclub' which operated out of the same space Faith in Strangers now occupy for many years, in fact the whole building when it was originally designed had that first floor space designated as a club.

Since 'Franks' closed down, that space became derelict, fell into disrepair, and became yet another empty, unloved, eyesore, a blot on the community, and was used for illicit and illegal activities.

Richard and Jeremy's vision for the space, and the realisation of that dream has created the most incredible, technologically advanced work and play space unrivalled by anyone or anything in Thanet and as such they should be getting applause, credit, thanked, celebrated, marketed and enjoyed, yet it seems they are being demonised and picked on for completely the wrong reasons.

I live in Cliftonville and I have seen in these past years, a part of Margate that was many times considered 'no-go', to dangerous to be in, it was a space of disrepair, of incredible deconstruct and decay. Yet these recent years it has become a destination, a creative quarter even, the phoenix is rising and it is considered a bohemian, cool, effervescent place to live...it really has had new live breathed into it's ever expanding lungs, and Jeremy & Richard, with Faith in Strangers are part of this regeneration....DO NOT LET THEM GO!!!!

For 12 years I commuted into London daily for work. However commuting came to a halt in March 2020 and from that moment, not only did my work style change, so did my understanding of what work meant to me, what family meant to me and what living in Thanet meant for me and my family.

My business partner and I became a members at Faith in Strangers in June last year when I founded our new business Questae Collective, an organisation wholly concentrating on, and promoting wellbeing in the workplace. I in particular was struggling with working from home and the feelings of claustrophobia caused by living and working in the same space 24/7, so Faith in Strangers was an absolute god-send and a space for me to travel to and separate work and rest.

The concept and culture of the Faith in Strangers community was realised by me and my business partner almost immediately. We were meeting other people, other small business owners and humans who were experiencing the same, or similar, day to day challenges of running a business, having a professional space in which to work, having those un-planned networking conversations and socialising experiences that working from home could never offer.

The community grew and we started to socialise within the space, it became a space for work, creativity, thought, concentration, fun, socialising, coming together, sharing of ideas, testing ideas, having a coffee, eating and breaking bread together, it became an absolute haven and heaven.

I use Faith in Strangers to work, I also use the space to attend events that are designed for ALL the community, I use it socially for a drink (best negroni ever!), it really has become a home from home, at home here in Margate and I would be devastated if we were to loose such a jewel. Cliftonville would be deprived of a most incredibly welcoming, warm and wonderful space, a huge loss to Margate and Thanet.

I really do hope that my words will be heard and that sense, justice and community will prevail.

I also am a consultant on regeneration versus gentrification who started up the anti-gentrification campaign Reclaim Brixton in 2014 and am also a co-director of Peckham Palms- a multi purpose business retail hub set up to preserve existing Black business in Peckham and to primarily support Black female-led business within the community.

Whilst I do not deem to say I know the borough of Thanet intrinsically, I have had the pleasure of visiting Margate regularly over the past few years. These visits have been in part because of creative outlets like Faith In Strangers who have in my opinion, reinvigorated the image of Margate as an inclusive, progressive place for all to visit in Britain.

I was saddened to hear that FIS may now lose their business by way of a minority of of objections to licensing hours as in my opinion, they have, in their short tenure, actively endeared themselves into both the creative and wider residential community.

I have learned that Faith in Strangers (FIS), the co-work space I use for my business, is under threat. A noise abatement notice has been issued, followed by a premises license review.

I am deeply worried that Faith in Strangers is at risk as I feel it is a key hub of the vibrant creative culture in Thanet and a huge draw for new business in the area.

During the day I work as a strategic design consultant and creative director from FIS. I have hosted many successful meetings and creative workshops for global tech clients (eg Google) in the space. They love the change of scenery and immersion in the thriving creative culture that Margate is now famous for. I have also made strong connections with creative businesses, found new collaborators and developed great relationships with local freelancers and business owners.

During the evening I have also entertained clients and hosted events at FIS when it is a bar and music venue. The service, the decor, the attention to detail and the quality of the music programming is more impressive than any global member's space (eg Soho House) I have been to and more inclusive due to a far more welcoming door policy. Typically a members venue would exclude the less privileged and create division, but FIS provides access to all.

The owners obviously care deeply about their responsibility to help put Margate on the global creative map, and it's clearly working. Some of the clients I have brought to the space were so impressed with what's happening in Margate they are strongly contemplating a move to Thanet to set up operations. Many of them now visit Margate, Ramsgate and Broadstairs regularly as tourists.







Good afternoon,

I have been concerned to hear about local music venues in Thanet receiving noise complaints, and particularly concerned that Faith in Strangers (FiS) has had a Noise Abatement Notice issued against it and a Premises Licence Review by TDC on the cards. FiS has reasonable operating hours and has rejuvenated a beautiful building in Cliftonville - and is contributing to the renewed interest in the area - bringing more people to live and visit there which ultimately funds the council. What are the advantages of responding to the complaints of a minority who clearly have no interest in being part of the community here?

My family moved to Thanet from London in 1995, and even as a child I remember noticing and regretting the relative lack of creative activities and opportunities in the area, especially in the autumn and winter seasons. This resulted in me and many of my peers moving out of the area as soon as we could - meaning an ongoing lack of diversity in the community, less money, less variations of culture. Thanet was forgotten and had a reputation as a bad place to live.

Now, Thanet people are moving back to their home towns, along with new families and individuals, all feeding into a palpable sense of pride in the area which overall benefits everyone, not least the young people here, who have more opportunities. There is still a great deal of work to do - Thanet ranks high in the Indices of Deprivation - but studies show that engagement in cultural assets is consistently and positively associated with subsequent life satisfaction and negatively associated with mental distress. For example, a recent study proves this and also shows that relationships between engagement in community cultural assets and well-being were stronger in more deprived areas (Mak HW, Coulter R, Fancourt D., 2021 https://discovery.ucl.ac.uk/id/eprint/10133969/1/CCE%20IMD%20moderation.pdf).

I want to see Thanet District Council leading the way in a regeneration of this area which is clearly loved by many. <u>This must include protecting cultural venues</u>, which are spaces for community and attract visitors and attention from further afield. People moving into the area must understand (as they do, in general) that they are joining a community as well as a vibrant, creative and hopeful are! The seafront of a lively town, its high streets and artistic quarters cannot be silenced - and there are plenty of more remote and residential spots about.

I will be following these developments with interest and will support the protection of FiS and other venues every step of the way. It's time that TDC had a refresh and put more efforts into celebrating, nurturing and protecting the communities, residential and commercial spaces <u>and</u> green spaces in Thanet - there's so much potential for it to be a healthier place to live.

I am emailing to voice my support for Faith in Strangers in advance of their License Hearing.

My name is Georgie (alias jaw-g). As a young musician and DJ, the venue has been one of the few to offer well-paid DJ opportunities in the area, and offer a platform for me to grow and experiment. I know from hearing the owners ideas about growing in the future that they will only continue to provide this platform for musicians in the area, which I think will inspire the next generation of Margate's youth to fulfil their potential, because the opportunities are on their doorstep, not far off in a city. We need Margate to be a place that young people want to stay and contribute to, not run away from. If their license were to be changed, this would seriously damage the musical community, where young artists need as many supportive local venues to foster talent. Without the infrastructure (I.e. venues), Margate's artistic community will seriously suffer. I believe this artistic regeneration is a huge contributor to the recent upsurge in visitors in Margate.

I wonder what kind of message these actions send to others considering investing their time and money into Margate's creative and night economy? What will others with the funds to do so think of the council squashing entrepreneurship in the area over a very small minority of residents who moved into a flat above a **historic** music venue space. This is the cultural heritage of Margate. These spaces are hugely important for improving the livelihood opportunities of young creatives, and provide valuable economies to the area (both night-time and creative) that aren't solely reliant on tourism, which I would argue is a fickle economy and not sufficient for residents who need year-long, not just seasonal, employment.

That all it takes is a single resident, who *chooses* to move near a music venue, to shut it down entirely if they so wish, and in so doing destroy the community and employment opportunities it provides, is shocking and appalling.

I very much hope you will allow the venue to operate at their full capacity, and reach their full potential. The amount of hardwork, sacrifice and determination that has gone into spaces like Faith in Strangers should be celebrated and nurtured in our society, not down-trodden because it doesn't suit the whims of a very small minority.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing to you to express my concern over the ongoing licencing review for the venue Faith in Strangers, 17 Ethelbert Cresent.

The regeneration of Thanet by independent businesses and the arts community is what attracted me to invest in this area and build a home here, as a member of the creative industries who works remotely and lives alone. From what I understand, this is also something that the local government is also heavily invested in – and therefore I am concerned to see that closing down an independent business at the heart of the arts community, in such a deprived area of Margate, is under consideration.

I work remotely as a brand manager and consultant in the fashion industry, currently building a start-up brand and formerly working on events and marketing for Victoria Beckham, Topshop, Reiss and others. I also hope to offer mentorship to young members of the community in which I live and work, who may not otherwise have access to the industry that I work in and the opportunities that come along with it. When I discovered Faith in Strangers, I was encouraged and delighted to have found a venue that shares the same ethos and that offers a safe and accessible space for me to both work and socialise and, in the future, somewhere I can support and share my resources with. In addition to remote working opportunities, Faith in Strangers is the only nightclub in Thanet that, as a young woman, I would feel comfortable and safe spending time in, and to take my friends and colleagues to.

The owners of Faith in Strangers are incredibly kind, caring and conscientious, with a passion for supporting local and, in particular, marginalised communities through their business, whilst also investing significant sums of their own money into regenerating one of the most deprived areas in the country. To see their hard work go to waste over the demands of one resident would be an incredible injustice, and a huge loss for the area and, of course, also for the local members of the community who have been employed by the venue.

Given that the building in question has historically housed a nightclub, as well as a bowling alley, one has to question how it is fair that one resident can command the closure of an entire venue, that contributes so much to the local area, when they chose to purchase property above a commercial building that has always been used for that purpose. Having recently bought a property of my own, I don't understand how due diligence was not carried out prior to the resident in question making that purchase.

I sincerely hope that you will take my thoughts into consideration.

I am a local freelance writer, resident in Cliftonville since 2017. I am writing to communicate my concern at the proposal to review the licence of Clintonville-based venue Faith in Strangers, and to express my support for this business.

Faith in Strangers operates as a co-working space during the week, of which I was a member for eighteen months. It offers a vital facility to local professionals who are freelance, do not travel into work, or are unable to work at home. In turn, members purchase lunch and other items in local outlets, thus contributing to the local, daytime economy.

Operating during licensing hours at the end of the week and weekend, Faith in Strangers also makes a not insignificant contribution to the night-time economy locally; a matter that I believe should be considered. Having visited and walked past Faith in Strangers on numerous evenings, I cannot comprehend the reason for the noise abatement order, as I have never personally seen or heard anything to give me cause for concern.

I was very upset to hear that Faith in Strangers was under threat of having its licence reviewed and restricted. As a local resident and small business operator in Cliftonville, I know how important it is for the council to support residents in creating new businesses that add to the community and create employment. I live nearby from the workspace and I've never experienced any issues relating to their present situation. And to be honest you don't even notice the venue is even there when you walk nearby. It's incredibly discreet.

I'm a frequent visitor at Faith in Strangers, I'd never have thought such a venue would have appeared in Cliftonville. The courage and out right balls shown, to come and invest in an area of high deprivation, only to be shut down by the council appeasing a handful of residents doesn't make any sense.

I grew up in Lewisham, a culturally diverse part of London and was really apprehensive about moving to Thanet in light of the lack of spaces and venues where a black man would feel welcome and not intimidated. Equally, when moving here I didn't want to just socialise in places that were exclusively for Londoners. Uniquely Faith in Strangers has managed to successfully unite the local community in Cliftonville and it's an asset to the area. Faith in Strangers represents a progressive, diverse option in a town that is lacking many things. Faith in Strangers was a key reason that I stayed in Margate. Cliftonville in particular needs a night time economy to create jobs and employment, which is exactly what Faith in Strangers is doing, I believe all of their staff are born and raised in Thanet.

I've suggested that the owners buy the flat above that is complaining in order to come to a compromise but I was told that the flat owners have asked for double the market rate.

I am writing regarding the License Review (and related Noise Abatement Notice) that has been issued against Faith In Strangers. I would like to wholeheartedly support Faith In Strangers in this matter.

Margate, and the wider Thanet area, has a vibrant and growing nightlife economy, and it's vital that the industry is supported by the council - it is a very significant employer and engine of local economic growth, and a major part of the draw the area has in terms of both tourism and folks choosing to live here.

In this case, and potentially more in future, a resident who has moved in near to a venue operating within the terms of their license (and operating a well defined dispersement and noise management plan), objected to the operation of that business, and is now threatening many jobs and economic benefits to local suppliers and businesses. As I'm sure you're aware, Faith In Strangers operates as a community hub and space for charities and local groups to meet and work (such as the use of the space for the recent PoW festival), and this work is supported by them being a thriving business on weekends - it would be a terrible shame to lose the faculties they are able to offer because of the objections of one neighbour who were aware before moving in that they were purchasing above an entertainment complex.

I hope that this matter will be resolved in favour of Faith In Strangers - while I do have sympathy for the affected residents, I hope that we will be able to set a good precedent here for future cases where people have 'bought cheap' in the knowledge that they are likely to be affected by venue operations, and wish to stifle local business in the interest of their own property values, and continue to make Thanet a world class destination for hospitality.

Faith In Strangers is one of the most forward thinking businesses I've worked with and the owners are highly professional. It's provided jobs for numerous people and it's only myself and another colleague that aren't originally from Thanet, the rest of the team are, which I think is an important part of positive regeneration. Part of the reason I moved down was because I got made redundant from my job in London and I'm so grateful that Faith in Strangers invested time and money to train me and the team up, to become part of the Faith in Strangers family. They are the kind of progressive and thoughtful employers that Cliftonville is so desperately in need of.

Our customers are respectful members of the community and we have never had any trouble, in fact going to work is pure joy! Customers don't usually arrive until around 10 or so, and we have artists providing the music on Fridays and Saturdays. If the license was taken or restricted like demanded and we don't have any entertainment available then customers will leave or just not even bother coming at all, which basically means I and the team all lose our jobs.

I have also had the opportunity to perform there myself, it has been an absolute dream of mine to get back into performing again and has been so important for me after the lockdown and especially at the beautiful Faith in Strangers and the seaview backdrop.. The venue is all about great quality sound rather than super loud, which creates a much nicer atmosphere for people to meet each other and network, which I also believe to be so important after what we've all been through with covid.

So much time and money has been spent making the venue what it is, and I was surprised they took such a risk to potentially pave the way for other venues of their size, but in fact there needs to be lots more places like this for Margate to thrive and is a huge travesty that they are being threatened with being shut down, rather than growing, which I can only imagine would scare off other venues to open.

The owners have always told us they have so far only been operating at a small scale and that we would eventually be a much larger team of staff and now that has the potential to be crushed. Which is so sad and also will reverse the positive regeneration that's been happening in Cliftonville.

Faith in Strangers has so much more to offer than what it has been doing so far, and we really can't let personal gain rein over community gain, the impact that Faith In Strangers is having is far greater than the minority above.

It has come to my attention that my workplace /office is under threat of closure. This has come about due to Thanet Council licensing issuing a nuisance order, unacceptable noise levels license revue.

I operate a Buildings Structural CAD draughting Service and was previously operating out of my office in London and occasionally coming down to Broadstairs but it was never feasible or practical for me to operate from Broadstairs or Thanet as a whole.

I did search for a suitable office but there was nothing available. By chance a friend of a friend recommended inquiring at Friends In Strangers, who were just starting up in Margate. On the first visit it was clear that this was a very different office set up and the plans to grow their business were/are extremely positive and beneficial to the area.

Because Friends in Strangers offer a very high-level office environment it prompted me to move my business and myself down to Broadstairs and this is now my base. Over the following months I've watched Richard and Geremy transforming a very rough building space into a very high-level office environment attracting a high level of innovative and creative business people (many of whom have now relocated to Margate). providing invaluable contacts for my business; their attention to detailing making sure everything is compliant, environmentally friendly and properly sound proofed within the limitations of the buildings structure in this particularly neglected and delipidated part of Margate is commendable.

I also understand that the person making the complaint recently purchased their property at a very low cost and in my opinion looking to make a profit in the future, this is fair enough however they would have been well aware of the fact that they were purchasing above an entertainment venue (that was previously a dedicated nightclub) and as such there would be an increased noise level.

The nature of Friend In Strangers is to provide a working space during the day and also host cultural events in the evenings and the weekends, making the business viable as a whole.

I've attached the Margate investment plan for those who have not read it, and basically Friends in Strangers fit directly into that plan and also feature in the plan above.

In a nutshell Friends In Strangers are:

We are currently renovating new premises at the upper end of Margate High Street where we both own flats in The Man of Kent. The rear of our building overlooks Dreamland Amusement Park where live music events happen on a fairly regular basis, this is a precedent that has existed for much longer than we have been leaseholders. The music is at times very loud and almost always audible but being members in a community in which the economy is significantly based on tourism encourages us to enjoy and accept these rather than fight them.

We are writing in support of our fellow business owners at Faith in Strangers, whose license is under review but also we support any current or future, responsible entrepreneurs who could potentially face backlash from residents who do not understand nightlife and the valuable cultural and financial benefits it can provide to a community.

Throughout this summer we sent customers to Faith in Strangers because we trust they can provide a safe, enjoyable and cutting edge experience for guests. Their door policy is highly

inclusive with a good mix of locals, tourists, older people and younger people. The general vibe is relaxed and the large size of the interior ensures things stay calm rather than raucous as can happen in rooms that are more tightly packed with people. Our understanding is that Franks Nightclub operated in the same location as Faith in Strangers for years so there is a history of this venue being an anchor for this part of town. To whom it may concern,

I am writing to express my concern of the Noise Abatement Notice and Premises Licence Review issue by TDC against community hub and venue, Faith In Strangers.

As someone who has co-worked in the space from the outset, visited the venue at night and watched as the team struggled to get through Covid, I am deeply saddened to hear that this cultural and creative space is at risk of not being able to operate fully. The work that has gone into this space is undeniable and relies heavily on being able to operate on a weekend.

My own experience of visiting here is that it is chilled, laidback and a positive evening space. I have experienced disruptive behaviour elsewhere in Margate, but never here.

If people choose to buy property above commercial spaces, they should understand that those businesses operate. Do we really want to start wiping out community spaces and go backwards with the development of Margate? We're not far out of the woods of most units being completely empty, and just because the area is now seen as "trendy" does not mean that the rejuvenation can be monopolised by people who just want a slice of the investment potential. It's so important that we protect these unique spaces that make Margate home for so many.

I hope that you will take the above into consideration when reviewing this license.

Let me state clearly my deep concern at this and the negative impact this will have to Margate and Cliftonville. Rather than dwell on the negatives, allow me to talk about all the good that this space does

My Name is Henry Maddicott. I am a 27 year old poet, playwright and community based artist living at

. I moved to Margate 2.5 years ago, initially only for a couple of months though I soon fell in love with the area as so many others have done. A huge part of this was the sense of community I found in a town where I knew almost no one, at this community was found at Faith In Strangers.

As a workspace, it was massively beneficial for my mental and physical health, providing me with a well equipped space to work in, away from home and encouraging me to get out of the house everyday during a period of mental ill health. The warm, safe and inviting environment they have fostered there made me feel right at home. Richard and Jeremy themselves were vital to this, always checking in with me in their relaxed and friendly manner while introducing workspace users to each other. This space has allowed me to make friends while increasing my output of work drastically to the point where as an emerging creative I can make a sustainable living. They have even offered to support me inhosting poetry nights to give local artists a platform to develop alongside industry leading poets from around the country. Had it not been for all of this, I would not still be here.

However, the workspace alone is not solely responsible for the sense of community that now thrives on this patch of road. The evening venue is just as, if not more, important. Where the workspace caters to those in certain industries, the evening venue is open to everyone and is imbued with the same sense of warmth, community and safety as its daytime purpose.

For adults of all ages, but particularly for younger demographics, it provides another reason to stay, live and grow in a small town like Margate instead of moving to the city (not to mention the jobs it creates for bar staff/ managers/ DJs/ musicians). Female members of my friendship group especially request to go there due to how safe they feel compared to some other venues in town (particularly with the current stories in the news).

Before Faith In Strangers opened, I myself used to feel unsafe walking home along this road at night after visiting friends or seeing a show at Tom Thumb Theatre. Now, it always feels safe and welcoming. Faith In Strangers is managing to rewrite the reputation of this part of town.

It is a destination bar and those who travel to it also spend their money in other venues around this area contributing to the local economy. The night time economy for the bar allows the workspace to stay open and affordable, without it, either the cost would be unaffordable for someone like me or the whole place would have to close.

The community would cease to grow, work would be less sustainable and the draw of safe but exciting nightlife would fall apart.

Is that somewhere you would want to remain? Please support Faith In Strangers to remain open and continue to grow.

I am writing to you in support of Faith in Strangers and their license review. It has been extremely worrying to see how swiftly this has happened and seemingly without due care and considerations.

I am a member of the workspace at Faith In Strangers the opportunity and benefits it has provided me with are huge. It allowed myself and my business partner to setup our design practice with a professional and affordable space – one where clients, from around the world, are excited to come to. Without a space like this we would more than likely be travelling into London and working at design agencies there. Instead we have been lucky enough to have a base where we can run and grow our business from – something Margate should be encouraging. Spaces like this are hard to find and it should be protected at all costs. The space is thriving with talented people, who are all adding to the community here. Also, consider the knock on effects to surrounding businesses should Cliftonville lose a space like this – the amount of coffee's purchased, breakfasts, lunches etc – as place for other businesses to operate and grow, Faith In Strangers has provided a boost in the local economy and local businesses.

There are also the mental health benefits that having a space like this has. During the pandemic when human contact has been extremely limited, the fact that the team at Faith In Strangers were able to continue to operate a safe environment should be commended. As someone who has had mental health struggles throughout their life, having a space to go to where I felt safe and also allowed for a form of connection and social contact with others was hugely important.

This is not just about a physical space though, but about what that space represents and creates – a culture. The cultural impact of a venue like this is huge – the opportunity for events, art, music, technology etc is huge and should be encouraged, not shut down. The growing community of Thanet needs spaces like this. The team at Faith In Strangers have such an exciting vision for putting on a programme of events that will not just make waves in Margate, but across the UK.

The space was designed and built for 'leisure' and has historically been a nightclub. I have regularly visited the space in the evening and found it to be nothing but an exciting, welcoming and safe space – we live on a neighbouring street and not once have we seen or heard anything from here. The staff are brilliant, the musical acts that they have put on are exciting and diverse.

Without a space like Faith In Stragers, the opportunity for people growing up in the area to start businesses of their own, or to have a space that is professional and specified properly for remote working is lost. A space like this grows entrepreneurial culture, it attracts talent and creates it. People need to see that it is supported and know that they have the opportunity to stay and work in the local area rather than leave to find work.

For the sake of Cliftonville and it's development I hope that the big picture is taken into account here and that an exciting, welcoming and culturally relevant business is supported rather than penalised.



To Thanet Licensing,

I am writing to you as the main contractor and current customer of Faith In Strangers and former customer of Franks. I'm born and raised in Thanet and the improvement in this area is important to me.

I met Richard and Jeremy in 2018, when they were asking my firm Techno Timber Construction to quote for the initial work to bring the old Franks club back into working order. Part of their spec was to install a lot of soundproofing. One of the reasons they went with us is because we had experience of this type of fit out having worked on other buildings with this kind of soundproofing and we agreed to take on the job with FIS.

Soundproofing adds a lot of additional labour costs, we used furniture and fittings from Christie & Grey along with their tech specs and some additional acoustic neoprene sheet materials from delta rubber. The structures are all light weight metal frame stud work that absorbs less sound. Plasterboard is 15mm, doubled up and overlapped, with a thick rockwool slab (RW3) behind and an airgap of minimum 100mm between the rockwool and the structural concrete. We also lagged down pipes that run through the floors and into the flats with acoustic pipe wrap. Walls and permanent structures such as the bar sit on acoustic pads, which again is from Christie & Grey. The main acoustic ceiling itself, which is under the flats is on rubber acoustic hangers, which carry on into the kitchen. We even went to the unusual length of isolating the AC units on acoustic springs. It has to be said none of this was required for building regs PART E, their approach to soundproofing was a touch OCD and I don't think anyone else would of done what they did and to the details, they clearly wanted to protect themselves and others from any future problems. Above and beyond what I have come across before. We have pictures of a lot of the build process and are happy to share.

As a customer of FIS and Franks, I love music and this building has been a big part of my life growing up in Margate and now its back in use will be a big part of my life again. What is noise to some people is music and socialising to others. I can only offer support to what those boys are doing and hope that TDC work with them. The work we did for them has been a factor that my firm has been able to grow into what it is today.

I'm writing in support of the vital role of Faith in Strangers and the need to retain their nighttime licence. During the day I work in the shared workspace and value their nighttime programme of live music and events; it was a key reason why I chose to move to Margate.

Without culture, society lacks its life-blood; we need music, art, literature, tv, film, design and fashion to make life what it is! Yet, many of the creatives that produce this live on precarious incomes making it impossible to sustain in the expensive cities. Towns such as Margate offer the opportunity for us to do what we love and believe in; and an influx of creatives to the seaside towns across the South East are creating thriving creative hubs, with new economies that are rejunivating local infrastructure and communities. Venues such as Faith in Strangers are vital to this regeneration; a place for creatives to meet and be inspired.

Margate will become an incredible, culturally rich and diverse exemplar for the possibilities of cultural and economic rejuvenation in the UK, providing an inspiring environment for locals and tourists – but only if the council supports this. Allowing creative hubs such as Faith in Strangers to fall under threat sends a dangerous message out to other creative organisations looking to invest in the town. Why Margate, when Hastings or Folkstone offer a more supportive and secure environment from the council?

We all want to see Margate thrive. As a visual art curator, with 16 years experience in major London and international venues, it gives me great hope to see artists moving to Margate:

Artists will only continue to move here though if there is a cultural infrastructure that supports their work. Faith in Strangers is a key venue for this. It offers a vital, close-knit and supportive work environment, bringing together creatives who share and support one another in a way that I have never experienced elsewhere. It is the only venue in Margate that brings together a professional, active hub of creatives.

Margate needs culture and community to thrive: public funding for the arts is being slashed across the board nationwide and communityminded businesses like Faith in Strangers are being depended on to take up the slack. As a local resident, I am alarmed to learn that just one complaint by a resident can put licences like this at risk. Even more so, to learn that this can happen even if someone moved in nearby when the venue already exists. If this is the case, does this mean all our venues are at risk of closure from one complaint? We know businesses cannot be viable without these licences, as evening entertainment and nightlife are what makes venues like this economically viable.

As the CEO of The Aplastic Anemia Trust (https://www.theaat.org.uk), a charity registered and operating out of Margate, I fully support all aspects of the work Faith in Strangers does. Jeremy and Richard have offered us access to the space for events and professional meetings and I can't wait to take them up on this offer as we move back to in person events.

Spaces like this, with music and drinks licences, are essential for charities like ours to bring people together and fundraise.

As an artist and performer, I am also a member of a poetry collective (Orangesrhyme.com) which is taking part in the Power of Women festival next year, and Faith in Strangers will be an essential venue for making this vital festival a success. Having access to such a high quality workspace and network of professionals, was one of the key drivers for me setting up my own business in Margate in September 2021. Before that, I was working for a company in London and commuting regularly, spending little time in Margate. I write to you as an extremely concerned patron of the local business "Faith In Strangers", of 17 Ethelbert Crescent, Cliftonville, Margate CT9 2DY (to be known throughout this e-mail as "FIS")

I have been a member here since they first opened and also I have worked for the owners of the business, so I use the facility personally in 2 ways, primarily as a patron for use as an office and also in the evenings for events, but secondarily as a client.

Along with many other small businesses in the area, I have been struggling to make ends meet and found that the excellent facilities and like minded forward thinking people that run and attend FIS have been a lifeline.

Not only this, but in the area where I live and work, I have long felt that cultural differences have not been integrated in any meaningful way. This is not true at FIS and there is a wonderful open minded, all inclusive ideology that permeates through the business and pleasure sides of this venture.

I have personally networked with many of the members here and feel that the unfair treatment of the business owners because of unsubstantiated complaints is completely outrageous and should not be upheld under any circumstances.

I understand it is alleged that there have been issues with volume levels and the conduct of customers. I have been to many events here and have not witnessed any situations that this could be an issue. Everyone attending the premises has always been nothing but polite, orderly and respectful to the local environment and neighbours.

I must stress that this venue was used as a nightclub for many years and I cannot understand why anyone that lives above such a venue would expect to live in unadulterated silence at all times. I myself have lived above venues and upon taking over the property it was understood that I walked into the contract fully knowing the operating hours and usage of the venue below, which is what I understand this situation to be, therefore I simply cannot understand why any complaint can be upheld.

As far as I know, it is completely ungrounded and therefore is just putting immense pressure on the owners to somehow justify their business in a situation that should never have arisen, but because TDC have decided to honour the complaint, we now find ourselves possibly about to lose one of the best things to happen to this area for a long time, IT IS OUTRAGEOUS!

We live in a depressed area that has only partially recovered from the hotels closing in the 1970s, being left to rot, then being converted into bedsits by slum landlords who have ruined many beautiful buildings in this locality. I am aware that some buildings have been renovated, however, the area remains culturally gridlocked without cohesive services for those who may have moved to this country and do not have English as a first language.

When I see young entrepreneurs that not only have excellent business ideas but have their heart on their sleeve and work unbelievably hard to attempt to swim against the current of the degradation of the past 40 years and try to make something positive that is a shining beacon for inclusivity across all areas of society, whether it be the LGBTQ community, empowering women or ensuring all ethnicities and cultures can feel safe and welcome in a beautiful environment, I support them fully and unreservedly.

They have created work for local businesses IN A PANDEMIC where they have overcome many financial challenges for the benefit of their members and the wider community, they have innovated with the amazing electronics and systems within FIS that is cutting edge, unique and has attracted musicians and talent from all over the world to the venue, where no one else locally is doing anything similar, especially in such an intimate and fantastic acoustic environment.

I also do not understand why anyone would uphold a complaint against this venue, when only recently they were awarded a financial boost from Arts Council England, meaning they would have been scrutinised and vetted with the due diligence process, which they won and deservedly so. They will NOT BE ABLE TO OPERATE purely on income EKS Partnership Mail - Unfair treatment of Faith In Strangers, Cliftonville.

from members with the venue being used solely as a co-working space, so the license and use of the venue for evening and weekend events IS VITAL TO THEIR SURVIVAL.

Should any decision from TDC to take the license away from the venue be upheld, this will have a profound and long term effect on members and patrons of the venue.

It is my understanding that there has been a Noise Abatement Notice issued against my shared workspace and local arts venue Faith in Strangers, and that a Premises License Review is due to take place soon.


I am shocked and extremely disappointed by this news as Faith in Strangers is one of the most professional and considerate venues I've ever visited and provides **outstanding support to me and the wider business community** here in Margate and beyond. Jeremy and **Richard are kind and considerate business owners who keep the community at the heart of their business**. If they are unable to play music later into the evening, then their business is no longer sustainable and they would be forced to close. This will have a **devastating impact on a wide range of businesses and charities as well as our local community** who love having such a brilliant arts venue in Cliftonville.

In my role as business consultant and strategist for AG Comms - I support a number of high profile global businesses - including the Research and Development Team at Astra Zeneca who were responsible for developing the Covid vaccine. My work is extremely confidential and often very reactive, and so I rely on secure and super fast wifi at FIS for client video calls and presentations. This simply wouldn't be possible from my home as the services available in CT9 are so limited. The facilities and community support for business owners at FIS are essential, and without them - growth and collaboration opportunities would be extremely limited.

Another important benefit of using a shared workspace is the **support and connection I get from other members**. It's a tough gig running a business on my own as well as living alone. That can feel overwhelming at times and have a negative effect on my mental health. If this happens, then I'm unable to do my job. **Having other business owners to connect with at FIS really does make a difference** and even the most basic human connection can feel like therapy on a bad day.

We should be encouraging and supporting arts venues like this in Cliftonville. Faith In Strangers is safe, is well-managed and provides employment to young local people. It's great to have a brilliant space that offers such a variety of music and entertainment - located less than a 10 min walk home. I've seen some incredible musicians play there since it opened and it's creating really positive interest in Cliftonville as an arts location. The customers FIS attracts are always so lovely and respectful - so I'm really struggling to understand where noise complaints are coming from? I've never witnessed any noise outside and you can easily hold a conversation in the bar over the music.

I would like you to understand and consider just how many businesses and livelihoods are affected by this review. It would have a devastating affect on the local community groups who rely on their facilities too. Please respond by return to update me on this case:

To whom it may concern,

My name is Jakob Horstmann, I currently reside at **Sector Control**, and I have lived and worked in Margate as a freelance commissioning editor for academic books for nearly three years now. This is regarding the Noise Abatement Notice and subsequent Premises Licence Review against the workspace and events venue Faith in Strangers (FiS) on Ethelbert Crescent. With this letter I'd like to show my strong support for the venue on several grounds.

Firstly, on a purely personal level, FiS has been absolutely instrumental in my individual well-being during the Covid-19 pandemic as well as incredibly helpful in the process of my becoming part of an active, vibrant community here in Margate, where I was, frankly, struggling to find much social cohesion before joining FiS. Especially during the first lockdown, when FiS was able to remain open while all of the cafes I would usually seek refuge from my tiny home office in were shut, FiS was essentially the only connection to an outside social world worth mentioning, and the positive effect of that on whatever sanity I was able to retain throughout that period cannot be overestimated.

Also after the lockdown ended, FiS has proven to be a major cog of social and professional life for myself and many other workspace members. I find this point hard to overstate: There is now a real community of brilliant, successful people in the heart of seafront Cliftonville where before there was none, and the intangible benefits of this on what the Daily Mail recently so charmingly termed the 'hipster renaissance' of Margate must be, in my opinion, simply off the charts. FiS has already become a hallmark of the 'new Margate' way beyond town limits. When I speak to Londoners about where I work, for example, many will already have heard of FiS without knowing much else about the area.

Leading on from this, and on a much less personal level, it is completely clear to me that the existence of FiS in its current form is of enormous benefit for other businesses in the area, and consequently the town as a whole. To state the most obvious, if smallest, example first, the amount of money the workspace members like myself spend every month on lunches, coffees etc. alone must amount to many thousands, keeping surrounding businesses afloat.

But on a much grander scale, the effects of a first-class event space like this on the town's nascent reputation as a cultural hub are surely something other District Councils would, metaphorically speaking, kill for. I'm not sure to what extent TDC is aware of just how special, well-equipped and, frankly, ridiculously sophisticated FiS is even among comparable venues. When allowed to operate without constraints, pandemic-related or otherwise, FiS is certain to attract some major artists, brands, tourists and – again – business to a part of Margate that if we're being honest has not had a ton of good things happening for itself over the past few decades. The idea that TDC would work towards closing such a space with apparent zeal is entirely incomprehensible to me.

I very much hope that FiS will be allowed to remain open and keep providing the wonderful services to the community it has managed to create against the odds and despite its relatively brief existence already. The potential of this place is considerable, and its closure would surely send a terrible signal to other innovative entrepreneurs considering their options of investment in the area.



Description of Premises

The old Franks Nightclub is on the north-east corner of the Cliftonville Leisure Centre Complex. The site also contains Bugsy's Bowling Alley, Cains Amusements, Olympia Cafe, Rendezvous and Black Axe company, as well as twelve flats known as Cliftonville Court set back from the front. The site also benefits from being under one ownership.

Franks has been vacant since the early 2000s. The rest of the site is active and in full and diverse occupancy. The facade, which faces out onto a beautiful coastal vista, has recently been refurbished to its original 1960s glory. Both levels were previously occupied by a traditional pub called The Bowlers Arms, for nearly 40 years.

Faith In Strangers provides a place for freelancers, small businesses and entrepreneurs to develop their practises along with a 350 capacity music, arts and cultural venue in the evenings and weekends. A commercial kitchen is currently being built so it will also operate as a restaurant in the near future.

Access

Entrance Is from the mainroad, Ethelbert Crescent, under the Bugsy's Bowling signage. Door access is controlled through a smart lock system. Patrons have to either ring the doorbell or security staff can let them in. We try to promote reservations where possible, so that we have a greater awareness of who is in the venue. This will greatly increase when we offer food. We will also be launching a loyalty membership programme soon that will register the patrons identity and use of the venue.

Layout

The space is predominantly used as B1 Office space Monday to Friday daytimes. Members use the space to carry out the tasks associated with their individual companies and businesses. During evenings and weekends the space adapts into a social space, which will fall under a mixture of uses A3/A4/D1.



The premises is 550 sqm in total, of which 297.50sqm is used for licensing.

Office and Mixed Use Areas - 251.9sqm Terrace - 29.6sqm Bar area - 16sqm

Lobby - 30 sqm Kitchen area - 25sqm Toilets - 15.1 sqm

The venue is also offered for free to local charities and nonprofits.

Bar Offering

High quality alcohol ranging from craft beers and ales, fine wines, rare liquor and house cocktails are served.

Food Offering

Yet to be developed.

The Owners

Jeremy Duffy has owned and operated a successful bar/restaurant/cafe in Shoreditch since 2013. During this time Jeremy has overseen the numerous licensed events.

Richard Randles has 6 years experience in child protection and 10 years experience in fire safety and emergency response.

Jeremy and Richard have personal licences as well as having paid for the manager Jack Eastwood to do his.

Appearance

Housed on the first floor of a restored 1960's building, Faith In Strangers will have minimal impact on the public highway.

Licensable activities

- Playing recorded music (as background music)
- Performance of music, dance, plays, film screenings etc
- Sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises



Steps to Promote the Licensing Objectives

<u>General</u>

During the working week (Monday-Friday 0800-1800) Faith In Strangers is primarily a member lead workspace, promoting innovation, social responsibility and community. It's a place for creative professionals and artists to work in an environment suitable for and conducive to the forward thinking industries that they are part of.

Our aim is to create a familiar and familial membership base that has a vested interest in the space and *the surrounding community.*

During the evenings and weekends we operate as a bar and venue for events, which can be artistic, cultural, educational or charitable. The bar operations account for the majority of Faith In Strangers income.

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The owners and managers of Faith In Strangers are aware of the problems alcohol presents in terms of violent crime and anti-social behaviour in the district and more beyond. The following steps have been taken to prevent problems arising as a result of our business operation.

- Comprehensive CCTV is fitted throughout the premises, internally and externally. This can be monitored both on and off site and recordings are kept for one month and made available to the police on request. Cameras cover all entrances and exits, the bar, and coverage of all licenable areas.
- Signage is displayed advising customers that CCTV is in operation.
- Drinks are not promoted irresponsibly.
- There is an outdoor terrace for smokers. After 2100, when the terrace is closed, smokers will be directed to use the area outside our front door.
- Free drinking water is offered to all customers.
- Staff will be trained to look out for unusual behaviour and check toilets for signs of drug taking during social periods.



- The management is aware of problems with gang related crime in the area. Because of the nature of the premises, we do not anticipate any gang related problems. Nonetheless, staff will be made aware of potential issues.
- Faith In Strangers is located on the main road, patrons will be able to walk down well-lit streets limiting the danger to people leaving the premises.
- Our location is served by various taxi companies and we will publicise their contact details on internal signage.
- All staff with alcohol serving responsibility will be trained in the licensing objectives.

Public Safety

- All building works comply with up to date Building Regulations.
- The capacity of our events comply with the parameters set by building regulations, fire safety and associated risk assessments.
- The premises are inclusive and will be designed to comply with approved document M – 2010.
- A suitable and sufficient Fire Risk Assessment has been carried out and will be reviewed annually.
- A suitable and sufficient Health and Safety Risk Assessment has been carried out.
- First Aid equipment is kept on site.
- Records of annual fire testing and electrical equipment testing are kept onsite.
- Unfortunately we are unable to provide wheelchair access to the first floor.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

Planning and licence conditions were passed;

14/8/2018 - Planning permission granted

29/8/2018 - Premise licence issued



- Bins and glass recycling take place in the morning after 8am.
- Commercial waste is collected Tuesdays from the private communal bin store area at the back of the building. Collections will be increased if necessary.
- We have an 11 metre hallway entrance / lobby that help reduce queues.
- Deliveries come after 8am.
- Several local taxi firms serve the area. Customers are asked to wait inside our lobby until their taxi has arrived. Taxis will be able to collect from the main road, outside the premises, which should not disturb local residents.
- Patrons are asked to come inside once they have finished smoking.
- The premise is served by a public car park, which can be used by customers.
- External light will be restricted to the front entrance area and balcony. External light will be selected and sited so as not to cause light pollution that will not negatively affect local residents
- We do not anticipate crime nor disorder being a problem at our establishment, we aren't an obvious venue from the street entrance and our patrons know where they are going.
- Patrons are reminded that external CCTV will be checked If there is anyone ever causing a public nuisance, they will be banned indefinitely.

Protection of Children from Harm

- Children are only permitted to be on the premises when accompanied and supervised by an adult.
- Children are generally not permitted on the premises beyond 18:00, unless at a dining or performance/community event.
- If alcohol is served at a food event during the day, a Challenge 25 scheme is employed and all staff are trained in respect of this.
- Children are not allowed in close proximity to the bar.
- There will be no entertainment of an adult or sexual nature or gambling on the premises.
- Children will not be in the premises when any film screenings or live performances that come with an 18+ certificate or are otherwise unsuitable for children are showing.



Our operations will also consider the following:

Waste, Recycling and Sustainability

- Faith In Strangers display signage for all appropriate waste and recycling procedures to make sure staff are aware of all regulations.
- Faith In Strangers have mixed recycling for cardboard waste and will have a weekly glass collection.
- Glass recycling will be dealt with in the allocated time slots to avoid noise pollution in the evening.
- Faith In Strangers clean areas of the street outside and notify the council of any waste left on the street nearby by external sources.
- Faith In Strangers avoid the use of plastic cups, straws and utensils wherever possible.
- Energy efficiency will be considered at every aspect of our daily operations.

1.0 Location

Address: Faith In Strangers LTD 17 Ethelbert Crescent, Cliftonville, CT9 2DY

Faith In Strangers is located within one of the only large hospitality buildings in Cliftonville. It's situated in a prominent position on the seafront and mainroad. The building consists of five occupied commercial entities, 12 residential flats and a public car park.

1.1 Site History

The building is on the site of where the Cliftonville Hotel stood, before it was destroyed by fire. The new building named Cliftonville Leisure Complex was built in the 1950s to host a purpose built pub, nightclub, bowling alley and petrol station. Over the years the bowling alley and licensed premises have remained in essence despite changes in ownership.

1.2 Hours Of Operation & Activity

08:00 - 18:00 Monday to Friday

Faith In Strangers operates as a workspace for designers, artists and creative professions during the traditional working week.

On the evenings and weekends the venue operates as an event space with licensable entertainment with a sound system.


18:00 - 01:00 - Mon - Thursday 18:00 - 03:00 - Friday 11:00 - 03:00 - Saturday (and on Bank Holiday Sundays) 11:00 - 01:00 - Sunday

Faith In Strangers is a 350 capacity cultural venue and creative hub. The cultural programme consists of live performance, amplified music, science, technology, screening events and art exhibitions. Along with a cocktail and wine bar and soon to be fine dining restaurant. Licensable activities are situated internally.



Faith In Strangers have an outdoor terrace, located in the North East section of the building. The planning permission allows for the terrace to be used until 22:00, however in order to reduce sound affecting neighbours we have informally agreed to close the terrace at 21:00.

2.0 Dispersal Procedure

- 1. Faith In Strangers Ltd is aware of the importance of ensuring as far as possible that patrons leave the venue as quietly as possible.
- 2. Faith In Strangers Ltd is committed to implementing and consistently improving it's Dispersal Procedure and will maintain routine assessments on improvements.
- 3. Faith In Strangers Ltd is also aware of the importance of managing the outside space during trading times.



2.1 Dispersal Timeline

3.0 Layout & Design

The layout of the premises can loosely be described as open plan, furniture is used to divide the space, with toilets and two meeting rooms accessible via a branch corridor. Where practicable, structural pillars, ceilings and walls have been treated acoustically to reduce the transmission of sound throughout the building.

3.1 Planning Permission: Condition Release


Planning Application F/TH/18/0875 - which relates to the business activities of Faith In Strangers was approved with the following condition relating to noise.




Prior to first operation of the premises a scheme of sound insulation shall be submitted and approved in writing by the local planning authority. The scheme shall be designed to ensure that Entertainment noise (noise from the amplification of human voice and music) (LAeq 15mins) should be controlled to 5dB below the background noise level (LA90 15 mins) without the entertainment noise present, in each octave band at the facade of any noise sensitive location'

The balcony area at 1st floor level shall only be used by patrons between the hours of 08:00 am and 21:00 pm Sunday to Thursday and 08:00am and 22:00 pm Friday and Saturday.

The section of our ceiling that supports the footprint of the flats above, has been protected with a floated ceiling. However, this has been damaged and repaired several times due to ongoing leaks from the flats. This area can be seen in blue, whilst acoustically treated walls and glazing can be seen in pink zigcag.

3.2 Additional Reduction Measures: Post Planning

Permission

Further to the release of our planning permission we have installed acoustic solutions and continue to investigate ways to improve the acoustic performance of the building and our sound system. Whilst it is not incumbent upon us to carry out further acoustic treatments to meet planning conditions, we do so to promote good relationships with adjoining occupants.

- We have added secondary glazing to two skylights, with approx reduction of 50db.
- Rubber feet onto chairs to reduce noise of movement

3.3 Sound Reduction Design

Outlining all of the sound reducing materials and treatments used in the business 'Faith in Strangers', with the aim of controlled sound levels to that set out in planning REF: F/TH/18/0875.



3.4 Historic Sound Transference

The Cliftonville Leisure Complex building is constructed of poured concrete, reinforced by steel bars.

Prior to the existence of Faith In Strangers, 'Franks' operated as a nightclub several days of the week including Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. The soundproofing installed by the operators of Franks' was insufficient; this is demonstrably true as Franks was subject to ongoing complaints relating to sound that were only resolved by the owner, Frank Thorley, purchasing 4 of the flats himself. Testimony from residents at the time said 'the entire building would shake' when music was playing at Franks.

The suspended ceiling was constructed by a single sheet of ½ inch plasterboard and attached directly to the main concrete structure with timber and screws. The walls surfaces were clad by a mixture of dot and dab plasterboard and mechanically fixed plywood. The speakers were also connected directly to the structure, without isolation.

Faith In Strangers has greatly reduced transmission via the following means.

3.5 Refurbishment

- 2 x layered 15mm Fireboard
- Decoupling Neoprene rubber
- Speaker Isolators
- Christie & Grey Sub isolators
- Christie & Grey ceiling hangers
- Christie & Grey Neoprene rubber for floors and frameworks with neoprene rubber screw grommets
- Metal frame studwork

3.5.1 Communal Building Services Shaft

Narrow shaft approximately 200x100mm, was uncovered. The shaft, that runs from the premises ceiling up through the north facing flats, was hidden by a piece of 12mm ply. This will have been a weakness in the premises soundproofing dating back many years. To resolve this issue and meet current fire regulations. 3 sheets of Rockwool PROROX SL930 (RW3), Fire



Rated expanding foam and 2 pieces of 15mm fireboard were installed from below. Access from above allowed us to install loose fill Vermiculite to pack any gaps.

Further, the owners of the flat immediately above the premises were in the process of renovating and instructed a builder to seal the whole thing with a 6-inch concrete cap. We are unable to verify whether this was done nor to what standard.

3.5.2 Walls

Acoustic walls are constructed on Christie & Grey studflex mats, secured to the floor with fixings isolated with Christie & Grey rubber grommets. Walls are constructed of metal frame (MF) stud, insulated with 100mm rockwool slab and clad in two sheets of 12.5mm fireboard. The stud walls stand off at least 100mm from the structural wall that they shield. Where supporting connections are necessary, acoustic wall ties by Christie & Grey are used.

3.5.3 Ceiling below flats

The ceiling is constructed of metal frame hung on Christie & Grey acoustic ceiling hangers (ACH), attached to the concrete ceiling. The ceiling is clad in 2 layers of 15mm fireboard, with 100mm rockwool slab resting on top and between 100-400mm air gap before the concrete ceiling. The perimeter of the hung ceiling stops 8mm short of the perpendicular walls. This gap in ceiling with a band of rubber and acoustic mastic, in order to stop vibrations from the ceiling transferring onto the walls.


3.5.4 Lobby

The lobby allows us to contain customers who are waiting for transportation which will reduce large crowds waiting on the street outside of the venue.

3.5.5 Digital Signage

As the dispersal timeline explains, digital signage has been placed in prominent areas such as the exit route on the stairs. The signage is designed to remind customers to be considerate of our neighbours and leave the venue quietly.





4.0 Sound Management


4.1 Sound System Design

Through the use of a multi-array speaker layout, consisting of 12 speaker positions, we are able to play amplified music at a lower level, as no matter where the listener stands within the venue, a sound source is close by. This is for lowering damaging sound levels, and reduction of sound transmission and also for a high fidelity sound.

As part of that wish for clarity and high quality we also have high end EQ and Digital Signal Processing units that can deal with problem frequencies as well as limit the maximum volume. In order to protect our customers' and staff wellbeing as well as reduce the impact on neighbours, our sound system will never exceed 100db - but anticipate being played at significantly lower volumes for the majority of events.



The speakers are also placed on neoprene rubber mounts if secured to the main building structure or to an already decoupled metal framed studwork. As seen in image below.



4.2 Audio Processing

The mixing console used is an Allen and Heath SQ5. The digital processing functionalities include, compression/limiting, EQ.

4.3 Performance monitoring

The audio levels of the monitors are controlled by the sound technician not the performer. This ensures that the performer cannot put the volume louder.

4.4 Amplification

Full Fat Audio 6004



4.5 DSP Processing

The Full Fat Audio amps have built-in DSP control. They are Full Fat Audio branded but manufactured by NST audio.

4.6 Acoustics

The room acoustics and sound system was designed to work together so that enhanced clarity of sound will mean that a lower overall volume is required.

We have spent time designing acoustic treatments and layout design that help reduce sound wave reflections and deter standing waves, therefore to achieve a higher clarity of sound at a lower volume. This also reduces the need of customers having to shout above each other which in turn reduces the need for the venue having to play sound at a higher overall volume.

Acoustic treatments include perforated birch ply with high density rockwool behind, along with acoustic ribs along the top perimeter of the site.

The new layout was designed to include walls, glass and hung ceiling to be at various oblique and obtuse angles to reduce standing waves. This in-turn lowers the necessary volume required by reducing the cacophony effect.






4.7 Testing and measuring

Testing is carried out, measurements recorded and made available to the local Environmental Health Office. A class 1 Castle Sonus sound level meter was hired for the initial measurements taken below.

4.8 Background Sound

The sound measured from three locations. In accordance with the planning requirements, A weighted background sound measurements were taken for a 15 minute duration - LAeq 15. It was noted that the west side, which is elevated away from the main road was less affected by vehicular activity.





Results below were taken on Friday 13th September 2019.

6.0 Management

Management operations found in operating schedule and door supervisor policies.

6.1 Staff Management

After being made aware of the noise transference from our premises into Flat 3 caused by moving furniture, we have instructed staff to lift furniture where possible and generally minimise the need for moving furniture at late times.



6.2 Travel

Unfortunately, there is no public transport along the main road where we are situated. However, 3 local taxi firms are aware of our location and regularly drop off and collect patrons from our door.

<u>6.3 CCTV</u>

Faith In Strangers have installed multiple CCTV cameras, many of which are covering the entrance and exit, the surrounding perimeter of the building and internally. There is a member of staff operating the audio, visual and video equipment who also monitors the CCTV. Recordings of video and audio are kept for 30 days and then destroyed.

6.4 Waste Disposal

We have sufficient waste and recycling storage within our premises for the general business operations of the business. Collections are carried out by Thanet District Council within the working week. Staff are instructed to only decant waste, such as glass bottles, between the hours of 09:00-18:00 to reduce noise disturbance within the immediate vicinity.

6.5 Disorderly Behavior

As a venue that purveys progressive art and culture, whilst cultivating a diverse audience that includes various ethnic groups and members of the LGBTQIA+ community, we are very rarely subject to alterations within the venue. Faith In Strangers staff and third party door supervisors are trained to be vigilant towards and swiftly handle disorderly behaviour. All door supervisors are SIA trained.



6.6 Lighting

Lighting is sufficient in all areas to enable staff and the public to navigate in and around the building easily and avoid collisions with obstructions.

6.7 Deliveries

Suppliers are instructed to carry out deliveries during working hours, in order to reduce noise disturbance to neighbours. 0800-1900 Monday to Friday 0900-1800 Saturday and Sunday

1. Licenses



All door staff are SIA licensed and registered

2. Security reviews

An annual review of this document and the policies surrounding it will take place. An interim review may take place if a significant incident takes place.

3. Preface

Faith In Strangers is not obviously located. It is on the first floor so our patrons tend to know where they are going. The door automatically locks and patrons are required to either ring the doorbell to be let in or door staff will open the door.

A door control policy in place to prevent overcrowding and to ensure that potential troublemakers are excluded from the premises, should they enquire what is up the stairs.

- Notwithstanding fire exits, we have one entrance only for customer access/exit.
 Our premises are accessible only via Ethelbert Crescent, main road entrance.
- A comprehensive CCTV system is in operation and live monitoring via three screens are in operation. One monitor for the bar staff, one for the management team and one for the security staff down in the lobby.
- We assess the number of door staff in regards to tickets or predicted busyness.



4. Managing Capacity

- Our Maximum capacity is 350.
- Door staff are to make management aware when capacity reaches 200 and then again at 50 person increments.
- After 9PM or at busy times all customers will be clicked into and out of our premises.

5. Age Verification

The bar operates a challenge 25 policy. Where the person seems under the indicated age they will be asked to produce ID. This can include passport, photo card driver's license or PASS photo id. Non photo IDs will not be accepted.

6. Management and Logging

Management and Door Staff will use Radio systems to maintain communication during service.

Daily debriefs entered into the manager's report including all incidents.

End of shift reports, completed by management, contain sections which will require

input from door staff. This includes the necessary records of:

- Capacity monitoring
- Venue Safety Check Log
- Enforcement Visit Log
- Refusals
- Lost Property



7. Refusals


- A refusals log will be maintained and written up at the end of the night.
- These should be noted on paper at the door.
- It is a basic log of the time, number of people and reason for refusal.

8.Search Policy

All searches to be conducted in the main foyer before the stairs.

If you are positioned on the front door it is your responsibility to:

- to actively monitor and control all noise levels from customers, and passersby.
- Ensure the safe queuing of all customers in a controlled manner.
- To be informative in relation to entry cost
- To ensure that any underage, intoxicated or abusive guests are pointed out to the head of security/management.



9. Internal Patrols

Carried out on average every 30 minutes.

- Toilet checks.
- Fire exit checks
- Route through the entire building.
- Make eye contact with bar staff to check they are ok.
- Dancefloor
- Welfare checks on customers to determine over intoxication as required.
- Usual diligence checks for the possibility of drugs, over inebriation, fire hazard,


smoking and general state of the bar.

10. Ejection

A guest may become over intoxicated or behave inappropriately. Where this

happens the Security Officer will have to make a judgment on how this is affecting

the other users of the immediate area, the licensing objectives of the venue, safety



- Inappropriate
- Intoxicated
- Breaks the law
- Use of drugs
- Failure to provide ID when asked
- Refusal to consent to search (management called first)

It should be noted we are not obliged to give a reason for ejection, however

from a diplomacy perspective one should be provided where possible.

When there are any safeguarding considerations the Manager on Duty will be contacted.

If a person is asked to leave the venue because they are intoxicated, an

assessment needs to take place, as to whether they are able to get home

without support.

This could involve a dedicated taxi company being called or ensuring that the person is accompanied home by a friend or group of friends.

<u>11. Under the Influence policy</u>

Faith In Strangers accepts a duty of care for our customers at all times and would always monitor alcohol consumption of everyone at the venue.

12. Community Intelligence

Faith In Strangers have attempted a communications group between other licensed venues in case there is any public disturbance etc. We will be attempting to get this working if other venues are willing to participate

13. Theft

All incidents of theft are to be logged and reported to the police. The log should include the time, date and a statement from the victim as well as any witnesses.

14. Lost Property

The management is to be informed of all Lost property, which is to be kept in a secure location until it is claimed.

15. Leaving the premises with glass or drinks

Customers can only leave via one exit, unless in an emergency. •

At our exit we have a strong, vigilant management presence.

Customers leaving the premises with alcoholic drinks are asked to finish the items before exit.

16. Transport

Refer to Dispersal Policy.

17. Evacuation/Fire Plan

On Hearing the alarm:

- 1. The order to evacuate will come from the Manager or the alarm system.
- 2. This will be based on the safety of the public and staff.
- Security on the main entrance are to ensure both sets of doors are retained in the open position. Security will direct staff and customers to evacuate the venue by the nearest safe exit and to meet at the designated area.
- 4. The designated area is the green on Dalby Square, turn left out of the venue and walk approximately 25m. All people will be instructed not to collect personal belongings on the way out. The first person reaching safety will ring 999 to call



for fire/police/ambulance according to the nature of the event.

- 5. No one will assume the fire brigade have been called, it must be confirmed
- 6. The fire marshals will be the last to leave (if safe to do so), so they can confirm

- 7. the areas have been cleared of customers.
- Door supervisors must not attempt to enter the building and not move against the direction of customers and staff leaving the building.
- 9. Keeping a constant unblocked exit is the priority for door staff.

<u>18. Illicit substances/Drugs</u>

We have a zero tolerance drug policy.

Any users will be asked to relinquish said drugs for police collection. Failure to do so will result in ejection.

For any persons caught entering the toilet 2 in a cubicle, a manager will be

summoned for a search and drugs will be asked to be relinquished for police

collection. Failure to do so will result in ejection.

Any potential dealer will be detained, be told why they have been detained and will wait for the police to arrive.

Officers will be aware of the difference between individual use and that of a dealer.

In cases of individual (low volume) possession the person will have the items confiscated after a manager summons and they will be ejected from the venue.

dealer (beyond a reasonable consumption for 1 person), the person will be detained, a manager summoned advised why they have been detained and informed the police will be called to deal with the situation.

In the case this cannot be decided upon:

- An evidence bag will be used in all instances of a drug discovery.
- A note will be made of the identity of the person in possession.
- The police provided form will be completed and counter signed by the manager to verify it has been seen going into the safe.
- The form and bag will be handed to the police and stored in the safe until such time.
- In the instance a person can not be detained safely, CCTV footage along with a report will be sent to the police.

19. Queuing Policy

Where safe and practicable, door staff are to make use of the large lobby space to bring queues to enter inside the building. It is the responsibility of the security to control noise levels outside the front door area and to inform passersby that this is a residential area and to keep quiet.

Three months on from a landmark announcement, changes to cladding policy has rung completely hollow for leaseholders

The Government's failure to change a bureaucratic technicality has undermined its landmark cladding policy and trapped thousands of homeowners in <u>unsellable flats</u>.

In July, then Housing Secretary Robert Jenrick U-turned on the Government's own building safety advice, announcing that lenders should no longer require external wall safety (EWSI) assessments <u>on buildings below 18m.</u>

This was the opposite of the stance laid out in its "consolidated advice note", published in January 2020, which had extended the EWSI requirement to virtually all flats, no matter the height of the building.

In theory, the overhaul should have freed hundreds of thousands of leaseholders in low-rise blocks. But in reality, three months on, the Government has still not removed its original advice note. This means that no lenders have changed their policy requiring an EWS1 form to grant a mortgage, according to trade body UK Finance – so flatowners are still trapped.



Many leaseholders do not have time to wait. Earlier this month, Beth Pritchard, 40, <u>received an £85,000 bill</u> for works due to start next month on her London flat. This was despite the fact that the building is under 18m and can be evacuated in one minute.

"It is such a hideously large amount of money I just can't comprehend it. Until the Government's amendment is made law, we are screwed," said Ms Pritchard.




Box office spend on tickets by music tourists in 2016



2016 was a landmark year for the fightback to protect, secure and improve GMV in the UK.

For the first time in ten years, the number of GMVs operating in London stabilised; the capital finished the year with the same number of spaces for new and emerging talent as at the start of the year, halting a 15-year decline in the number of spaces. This picture of a more stable sector was reflected across the UK, with regions reporting small but significant increases in audiences in the grassroots and small music venue sector.

That turnaround has been achieved by effective partnerships and specifically relies upon the partnership between UK Music and Music Venue Trust when it comes to evidence and research. Our work together is enabling us to accurately map activity in these venues in reports like Wish You Were Here and to tell the story of the importance of GMV to the whole ecology of the live music sector.

Understanding artists and audiences in these venues is a developing piece of work which supports us in building



SOUTH EAST

The South East generated almost £496 million from music tourism visits. The 9% increase in revenue on 2015 saw 899,000 visitors enjoy live music events in the region, helping to support 6,024 local jobs.

The area hosts some of England's most popular festivals including Wilderness in Oxfordshire, Bestival, the Isle of Wight festival and the Great Escape Festival in Brighton.

Just over seven out of ten music visitors come from outside the region, giving an important boost to venues in places as diverse as Oxford, Brighton, Reading, Southampton, Portsmouth and Milton Keynes.

The Great Escape's general manager Kevin Moore said: "In 2016 The Great Escape celebrated its 11th year as the festival for new music, welcoming 16,500 festival goers and 3,500 industry delegates to Brighton where over 450 bands played more than 600 shows. The live music scene in the South-East feels in a really healthy place. Brighton has always been strong but you've now got places like Margate that are starting to develop their own unique scenes."

Wish You Were Here is created on behalf of UK Music and its members to highlight the contribution of live music and music tourism to the UK economy.

2017 is the fourth edition of the report, which was first published in 2013.

UK Music is the umbrella organisation which represents the collective interests of the UK's commercial music industry - from artists, musicians, songwriters and composers, to licensing organisations and the live music industry. The members of UK Music are: AIM, BASCA, BPI, FAC, MMF,

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





I wouldn't normally send something personal like this but last night you made me feel uncomfortable and vulnerable. I requested to Jon, on 19 Aug, that access to my flat was limited to professionals, to avoid such a situation.

Despite this you insisted on coming into, and snooping around 3 Cliftonville Court because you wanted to give your 'opinion' on Mr Copeland's recordings.

This was despite Mr Copeland advising he did not require assistance from you to make his observations.

It wasn't appropriate for you to put me in a position where I felt I had no choice but to let you both into my home or otherwise as you insisted on my doorstep, 'I was denying you access'.

How, in 2021, could you be unaware of a woman's personal space and feel entitled to demand access to her home, let alone her bedroom, to give your 'opinion' of objectively measurable sound levels.

We have tried to avoid confrontation with you, despite the much independently witnessed distress you have caused us and our neighbours, week after week after week (month after month). However yesterday's insistence of you both being in my home left me feeling intimidated and it would be remiss of me not to call that out directly. I find your approach particularly troubling considering your stated commitment to 'safe spaces' in your businesses' diversity commitment.

Please also note any photos / videos you personally took in 3 Cliftonville Court yesterday were categorically without my permission.

I would like to make it clear, we have no problem giving access to professionals, if necessary, to our home, however, this invitation does not extend to unfettered access to you both.

I note, also, that our repeated requests for the Residents' Association chosen, IOA registered acoustic technician, Andrew Frisby, to have access to your venue, have been ignored.

Finally, for the record, we note Mr Copeland declined my offer to provide additional access to other residents' homes as after taking recordings from flats 2, 3 and 9 Mr Copeland advised he had sufficient recordings for his report.

Neighbours, copying to advise recordings were made from your homes yesterday by Mr Copeland. Access to your homes was limited to observations by Mr Copeland, supervised by me, only. Nigel, Mr Copeland did not require access to your flat in the end as it was apparent from three observations that the soundproofing does not work adequately.
