

The Wildlife of Foreness Point



Lady's bedstraw

The management of the chalk grasslands at Foreness Point aims to increase and improve the richness and abundance of wildflowers and the insects, birds and other wildlife that use this designated Local Wildlife Site. The flower-rich grasslands are an important's tepping stone' wildlife habitat to connect the site with other green spaces along the Thanet coast to encourage the spread and return of rare species such as the Shrill Carder Bumblebee, Cutting and removing vegetation helps to reduce nutrient levels in the soil and encourages an abundance and diversity of wildflowers. Cutting is carried out on rotation to ensure that there are always areas of shelter and forage remaining for wildlife.


Wildflowers to spot

Yellow Rattle - The 'meadow-maker'. This attractive annual plant takes some of its nutrients from surrounding grasses. It reduces their dominance and allows more wildflowers to grow.

Kidney Vetch - A low-growing plant that is often found in coastal locations and prefers chalk soils. Clusters of yellow flowers appear

Pyramidal orchid - The pink-purple flowers form a pyramid shape. It is attractive to a variety of insects including butterflies and moths.

Common Restharrow - A low-growing coastal and chalk grassland plant that produces attractive pink-white flowers in



Bees of Foreness Point

Kent's bee diversity can be linked to its varied habitats and land uses and mild climate. Kent is the best county in the UK for bumblebee species with 22 of the 24 UK species.

As well as the common and widespread bumblebee species. Foreness Point is home to a number of rare and scarce solitary bee species such as the Long-horned bee.
